IRA announces cease-fire; Major calls it ploy

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The Irish Republican Army announced a three-day cease-fire Wednesday. British Prime Minister John Major dismissed the truce as a public relations ploy even before it was announced.

The cease-fire will begin next Tuesday at midnight, the IRA said.

The British and Irish governments have been calling for a permanent end to IRA violence as the price for allowing the IRA's political allies to join in negotiations on Northern Ireland.

It was the second, brief cease-fire announced by the IRA since Major and Irish Prime Minister Albert Reynolds announced their peace proposals on Dec. 15.

The cease-fire at Christmas was followed within days by an IRA attack that killed a police officer.



Bank offers aid for NAFTA-related infrastructure

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Southern California will be headquarters for an arm of a NAFTA-spawned development bank which will offer loans to communities and businesses hurt by the trade pact, U.S. Rep. Esteban Torres said Tuesday.

Placing the North American Development Bank's Community Adjustment and Investment Headquarters in Los Angeles County will likely mean the region will set trends for how loans are handled nationwide, Torres and others said.

The NADBank, based in San Antonio, is to be operational Oct. 1, capitalized over four years at \$3 billion, said Torres, D-Pico Rivera, who advocated the bank as part of the North American Free Trade Agree-

Ninety percent of the binational bank's resources will be used to finance infrastructure development projects on the U.S.-Mexican border.

Ten percent will be used by the Community Adjustment and Investment arm to offer low-interest loans anywhere in the nation they are needed.



Houston gambling operation shut down

HOUSTON (AP) - A gambling operation that police say took more than \$13 million in sports bets over the past 13 months was shut down and two men were arrested.

Houston vice officer Larry Smith said the illegal gambling business, conducted from a car wash, was the largest in city history with more than \$1 million in bets placed per month.

Officers raided the operation March 17 and arrested Jung Ki Kim, 47, the car wash's proprietor; and Herry Suryapranata, 34.

Both were cited on felony gambling charges and have posted bail.



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




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Classical guitarist to perform at UC

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












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Defense headlines Red-Black game

 You must have a valid hunting 21 Red flare lights license and turkey stamp. You can purchase these at Wal-Mart, K-Mart and other hunting shops like 25 Pied -Hunters' Headquarters (748-1787) for \$18.

 The spring turkey season is different from the general fall season. In the spring you can only shoot gobblers (male turkeys). It is illegal to shoot hens (female 40 Vigoda or turkeys) bearded or not. The statewide annual bag limit is no more than three turkeys.

• The .22 caliber rimfire firearm may be used to take turkeys in all counties except for Houston, Jasper, Newton, Polk, Trinity and Tyler.

Shotguns are the only legal 53 Shoe part firearms for Spring gobblers in 55 India's neighbor those counties.

• If you wish to take a gobbler 58 Name with a bow you must use a broadhead 7/8-inch in width upon impact and have at least two cutting edges. Do not be a geek. Hone your broadheads to razor sharp ramifications.






