#### Officials say talks with Korea stale

GENEVA (AP) - The chief U.S. negotiator working to ease nuclear tensions with North Korea said Thursday he was heading back to Washington for consultations on breaking the deadlock after a week of talks.

"I cannot report we made any substantial progress," said Robert L. Gallucci late Thursday. But both Gallucci and North Korean officials cautioned against characterizing the talks as a failure.

Gallucci noted the talks were businesslike and devoid of past rhetoric. He said the two sides would continue to meet on a lower level until he returns to Geneva next week, possibly Tuesday or Wednesday.

Vice Foreign Minister Kang Sok Ju, head of the delegation from Pyongyang, plans to stay in Geneva, a North Korean official said.



#### Scientists search for buried treasure

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — With help from space shuttle Endeavour, scientists this weekend will search for buried treasure along the Silk Road once traveled by Marco Polo and map the mist-shrouded home of Africa's endangered mountain

The powerful radar aboard Endeavour also will be used to track oil intentionally dumped into the North Sea next week by oceanographers.

All this should have been done 1 1/2 months ago. But a lastsecond engine shutdown on Aug. 18 delayed Endeavour's flight until now.

The shuttle was scheduled to blast off on the 10-day flight at 7:16 a.m. Friday. Good weather was forecast.

The \$366 million U.S. and European radar will be used to study volcanoes, deserts, tropical forests, waves and rivers.

Scientists will also use the radar to look for now-buried mud walls and irrigation canals used by traders who traveled the Silk Road 2000 years ago.



#### Priest accused of sexual misconduct

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A former Episcopal priest, who is the son of a high-ranking West Texas diocese official, has been accused in Austin of sexual misconduct with two young brothers, authorities said.

The boys' father and another man responding by beating Christopher Mark Jennings, 33, until he was unconscious. Jennings was jailed Wednesday on a misdemeanor charge of displaying harmful material to children after his release from Brackenridge Hospital.

Jennings is the son of the Rev. C. Eugene Jennings of San Antonio, archdeacon of the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas, according to the Right Rev. John MacNaughton, bishop of the West Texas Diocese.

The brothers, ages 7 and 9, were skating with a friend near their home when a car stopped. The 9-year-old son said a man got out of the car and dropped several pictures of naked men and women, police said.

# O.J. case down to 304 jurors LOS ANGELES (AP) - The first

phase of jury selection in O.J. Simpson's murder trial ended ahead of schedule Thursday when lawyers and the judge agreed their pool of 304 potential jurors was enough to move on to personal questioning.

Over four days this week, 805 prospective jurors were called to court. Some were excused after claiming hardship. Some were returned to the jury pool for assignment to shorter

# Wind speed, velocity becomes controlling factor in Tech's entrance fountains

A large granite seal and a pool with water fountains greets visitors at the University Avenue and Broadway Street entrance to the Texas Tech campus.


Though it may be a familiar sight to Tech students and alumni, many may not know the fountains' history and operating procedures. Dewey Shroyer, director of grounds

maintenance, said the shooting up of the water in the fountains is controlled by a wind gauge. "If the wind is too high, (the wind

gauge will) shut down the pumps," Shroyer said. The wind gauge is on top of a light

pole, about 12 to 14 feet high, on Broadway Street. If the wind is 15 mph, the water will

go a couple feet high, he said. "The water will shoot as high as 6 feet, but the wind must be calm," Shroyer said. "If the wind is blowing turn it off." hard, the pumps will shut down automatically.'

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# **Education must** be taken to polls

Government isn't always the answer. In fact, it's rarely the answer.

So when the GOP had a g.o.p. to unveil its Contract with America (a one-sided contract at that) I tossed and turned about (at least) one of its promises.

Term limits.

CASEY I'm all for them, and I've always supported the party's anti-career-politician stance. Career politicians get stale and hose up progress. I mean who wants to see Phil Gramm in Washington forever?

But mandating early retirement for politicians isn't the answer. On Sunday's "This Week with David Brinkley," commentators discussed term limitations, coming to the conclusion that free elections in fact are the best way to limit the terms of career politicians.

Just look at the upcoming election.

The Democratic Party stands to lose a number of incumbents in November, seating Republicans in those spots.

It's the voters' way of saying "your term is up."

And sometimes the best change is no change at all.

While the idea of career politicians is frightening at best, there are more than a few Congresspersons who are good at what they

They are the mainstays that keep things working smoothly, the ones whose consciences govern their actions, and whose consciences are governed by the voters.

If terms were limited to two or even four elections, the House of Representatives could see a turnover of up to 50 percent every two years.

So what's the answer?

Education.

With elections drawing only 40 percent of registered voters in good years, the American free election system isn't being given the chance to do what it's capable of doing.

During the last few years, candidates — including President Clinton — have succeeded in targeting low-voter turnout groups and bringing them to the polls.

It's a great start. But, now that we've got the voters, we need to educate them.

Voters need to know more about candidates than what they look like and with which political party they are affiliated.

Those things don't matter.

Voters need to know what presidential candidates know about international issues, what Congressional candidates know about the medical industry and health care reform. And most of all, voters need to know that the candidate they choose in an election is the candidate who will represent the voters, not himself or his pocketbook.

So when the GOP secures a few more seats in Washington this November, write your Congressperson and remind him or her that you want to limit terms — with your vote, not a Congressional mandate.




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

#### Teachers under fire for TAAS test scores

AUSTIN (AP) - Round Rock els ementary school students say teachers' helped them pass a state skills test in May by pointing out answers and making gestures to indicate whether answers were correct, according to records of their testimony.

The Austin American-Statesman, citing Round Rock Independent School District documents obtained under the Texas Open Records Act, reported Thursday that school district staff has found "strong evidence" to support allegations of testing irregularities against three Round Rock teachers.

A lawyer representing two of the three teachers said their mistakes were unintentional and minor.

The Texas Education Agency is not investigating the incidents, which occurred at Purple Sage, Forest North and Gattis elementary schools in Round Rock, north of Austin.

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills covers reading, writing and math.

"It's not a paramount issue at this; time because we feel comfortable with. the action the (district) took," said Della May Moore, a TEA spokeswoman. "That doesn't mean we won't go back and review the incidents at a later time."

Moore said 32 reports of "testing irregularities" were received from the 6,300 sites statewide where the TAAS was administered in May.

Since May, the Round Rock school district has adopted a local policy reiterating the state's strict testing proce-, dures, said Rutha Leffel, Round Rock. coordinator of student assessment. She said not much more could be done.

The Texas Tech Red Raiders will square off with traditional rival Texas A&M Saturday in College Station. Kickoff is 1 p.m. and a capacity crowd (70,210) is expected at Kyle Field. The Aggies are three-time defending Southwest Conference champions and since late in the 1984 season are 54-3-1 at home. (35-1-1 in SWC home games). Their current home winning streak of 22 in a row is the longest in the nation.

In what is Texas Tech's second-oldest series, the Red Raiders trail 30-21-1 since play began between the two schools in 1927. The Aggies lead 17-16-1 in SWC encounters and Tech is 8-10-1 in College Station. The Aggies have won the last four tilts, their longest series winning streak since the Raiders joined the league in 1960. Tech's last win at College Station was 1984 when Dykes was defensive coordinator.





# THE SCOUT REPORT

## **TEXAS TECH**

Texas Tech's last two trips to College Station have been "close but no cigar" affairs. Four years ago, Robert Hall drove the Raiders to the A&M 15-yard-line but the effort stalled with 2:12 left and the No. 19-ranked Aggies won 28-24. Two years ago, Terry Ventoullias kicked a 21yard-field goal on the game's final play to win it 19-17 for the nations' fifth-ranked squad.

Last Year a strong pass rush and sticky manto-man coverage proved too much to overcome as the No. 14 ranked Aggies blew past Tech 31-6. Jon Davis tacked on a pair of field goals on the Raiders' first two possessions but the Aggies grabbed a 10-6 halftime lead before scoring on their first three second-half possessions to clinch the win. The Raiders were held to 169 yards in total offense -- still their lowest amount since 1990.

# AGGIES

Despite a new front three on defense, the Aggies are allowing only 55.7 rushing yards per game (no team has reached 100 yards this season) and is ranked among the nation's top 10 in total defense. With Leeland McElroy, A&M leads the nation in kickoff returns with a 41.8yard per kickoff average (five attempts).

The game pits the longest current winning streaks in Southwest Conference play: the Aggies' record 22-game league winning streak (longest conference winning streak in the country) against Texas Tech's six in a row.

This will mark the Red Raiders' third meeting against a nationally ranked team this season. The Aggies are No. 10 in this week's AP poll. Nebraska was No. 1 and Oklahoma was No. 21 when the Red Raiders played them.

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
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# Tech faces pair of matches this weekend

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
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
