Shuttle blasts to space today

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - After a day's delay, NASA's first female space shuttle pilot and her five crewmates prepared for an early morning liftoff today on an unprecedented rendezvous with the Russian space station.

NASA had five minutes to send Discovery on the most fuel-efficient route to the orbiting Mir station. It was the shortest shuttle launch window in 10 years.

To improve its chances of getting off on time, NASA got an early start Thursday pumping a half-million gallons of fuel into Discovery's external tank.

Among NASA's first female pilot, Discovery's crew includes Texas Tech regent Bernard Harris.

Discovery was supposed to fly Thursday, but NASA delayed liftoff to replace a failed navigation unit.

This is the first of eight shuttle trips planned to Russia's orbiting station through 1997. After that, NASA expects to build an international space station with Russia and other countries. The last time U.S. and Russian spacecraft met in orbit was in 1975 when the Apollo and Soyuz ships docked.

New Depot District theater shines with 1930 aura

The University Daily alking into the Cactus Theater means stepping into a world of Model T's, top hats and phonographs.


From the old-time marquee to the vintage flowery carpet, the theater screams 1930s.

"One of the goals of the board of directors of the Cactus was to run classic movies," said David Murrah, board member and director of Texas Tech's Southwest Collection. "We wanted the Cactus to offer Lubbock residents the opportunity to experience movie-going as it was in the 1930s and

"If people will support these movies, we plan to offer a Classic Cinema Series in the spring," Murrah said. "We will solicit nominations for showings from patrons at the 'Casablanca' showing."

The Cactus Theater was built in 1938 as a second-run movie theater. Its completion symbolized Lubbock's

a family-oriented theater, Murrah said. The theater's first movie was "Wings over Honolulu," starring Wendy Barrie and Ray Milland. Admission was 20 cents

for adults and 10 cents for children. April 6, 1958, the Cactus Theater

closed its doors. Later, the building was stripped of all movie equipment and became a store.

"The guy right next door bought the place, pulled everything out and used it as a storage area for his pipes," said Gary Belshaw, traffic manager of the Cactus Theater.

In January 1993, Lubbock musician and businessman Don Caldwell began making his dream of refurbishing the theater reality.

"When I first started thinking about it. I knew what we could do with the place," Caldwell said. "It had such a great stage and excellent sound."

Caldwell organized Cactus Theater, Inc., a group of 25 investors interested in helping restore the theater, and they began working. The focus of the new Cactus Theater was to be live musical and dramatic entertainment, and

The theater offers live music nostalgia nights, live acting and dancing, music reviews and, of course, the old black and white movies time can never forget.

Owners pledged to eliminate the cap and any other adjustments that would restrict players' salaries to 50 percent of their total revenue. Teams also would be able to set their own payrolls and be able to provide a proposed two-threshold luxury tax plan.

Players also would receive unlimited service time on disabled lists and an opportunity to be involved in decisions concerning inter-league play.

But the players turned the proposal down and will wait for further negotiations.

Owners said they expected a counterproposal, the first since November, from players today. But now President Clinton wants to be involved in the base-

ball salary scuffle. Clinton said if negotiations or movement toward an agree-

ment are not settled by Monday, legislative action will be taken. What's up, Bill? Will backing the Mexican peso be too bor-

ing for you by Monday? Maybe baseball needs a little presidential helping hand.

Or maybe not. Last time anyone checked, Clinton still had a country to run,

The list of national woes could fill this page and more. But maybe Bill would rather take himself out to the ball game and forget about the duties he promised to concern himself with when he became president two years ago.


Heck, watching White Sox first baseman Frank Thomas make a possible 500-foot home run is enough to make anyone forget their troubles.

But Clinton shouldn't be worried about what his leisure time activities include.



Clinton to ask for minimum wage increase

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Clinton will ask Congress for a 90-cent increase in the minimum wage — to \$5.15 an hour — over a two-year period, congressional sources said Thursday.

Details were to be revealed today by the White House. But the congressional sources, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said Clinton will propose a 45-cent increase to the current \$4.25 per hour minimum wage upon enactment and another 45-cent increase the following year.

In his State of the Union address, Clinton said an increase was necessary but avoided specifying then what he would recommend. The last increase, 45 cents an hour, was in 1991

White House spokeswoman Ginny Terzano said, "The president thinks that an increase in the minimum wage will be good for our workers, and they need more to live on than \$4.25 an hour."

Chances of Congress passing an increase are considered poor because of opposition from Republican leaders.
