# narrows Lee list

Nine names remain a mystery to Dallas County Detective Bob Veatch after interviewing about 200 people concerning the grave robbing of Texas Tech student Melinda Ann

It has been a week since Veatch left Lubbock with a dwindling list of possible suspects

Lee's diary, containing chronological events from Lee's three years at Tech, including dates, study sessions and fraternity parties—is the last clue to who might have taken her remains from her grave, he said.

"We were unable to identify nine of the names from Lubbock," Veatch said. "If these men would contact me, we could eliminate them as possible suspects or maybe they could provide us with the very information we are

Veatch said his trip to Lubbock provided him with more names of students Melinda had class with.

Veatch said the strategy of eliminating names will remain the same as the investiga-

tion continues. "The only thing I have left to do is to turn over every rock," he said. "One of the nine

names may or may not have the key to what we are looking for." Melinda Ann Lee was critically injured when a drunken driver hit the car in which she

was riding Oct.14, 1994. After 54 days in intensive care, Lee died

from her injuries.

Lee was buried at Restland Memorial Park in north Dallas Dec. 10.

Her body was taken from her unmarked grave Dec. 12 or 13.

Dallas county investigators came to Lub-

bock to interview Lee's college friends and acquaintances Dec. 14.

Three days later, a newspaper carrier found Lee's partially clad body and her clothes nearby. Her body was unharmed.

Lee was buried in another unmarked grave at Restland Dec. 18.

# Detective Tech will not let Holly fade away

25-item exhibit on display at museum.

n Sept. 7, 1936, the world welcomed one of the most famous rock 'n' roll icons of all time, Buddy Holly.

Fifty-nine years later, residents of Lubbock welcomed the only thing left of his legacy: his photos, documents, clothes and his Fender electric guitar.

Lubbock Mayor David Langston, along with Holly's widow, Maria Elena Holly, honored the rock 'n' roll legend by unveiling the single largest collection of Buddy Holly memorabilia in North America at the Texas Tech Museum Thursday morning.

"Needless to say it's very exciting, and I'm very pleased and honored that this is happening here in Lubbock," Maria Elena Holly said. "To me, this is one of the most exciting days of my life."

Holly, famous for songs including "That'll be the Day" and "Peggy Sue," died on Feb. 3, 1959, in a plane crash after his concert in Clear Lake, Iowa, at the age of 22.

Langston proclaimed Sept. 7, 1995, to Sept 7, 1996, the year of Buddy Holly.

"The museum marks the beginning of the rebuilding of Buddy Holly's memory, and his impact on this region," Langston said.

The impact will generate an album released with a few of the 88 pieces of music Holly wrote in his 18-month

Holly would be honored and touched he was being recognized this way especially by the city of Lubbock, his widow said.

"He loves Lubbock and he always mentioned Lubbock first when he was interviewed," she said.

Maria Elena Holly said she was pleased with the interest sparked throughout the city and Tech about her former husband.

"Buddy, wherever he is, would be happy and grateful," she said.



I love communication, which probably explains my strong ties to the telephone.


Life for me begins and ends with my last phone call.

TECH

QUARTERBACKS: Tech returns its first quarterback ever to start in a Cotton Bowl in sophomore Zebbie Lethridge. Lethridge, the Southwest Conference Offensive Newcomer of the Year, passed for 1,596 yards while rushing for 531 yards. The Nittany Lions counter with Wally Richardson, who played often as Kerry Collins' backup. Richardson has been compared to Collins, only he's more athletic.

RUNNING BACKS: Penn State features a pair of runners whose jobs is to make people forget Ki-Jana Carter. Tailbacks Mike Archie and Stephen Pitts averaged more than five yards per carry a year ago, while fullbacks Brian Milne and Jon Witman form a blocking tandem for them. The Red Raiders Byron Hanspard continues to improve his skills. The sophomore runner may be the best tailback that Penn State faces in 1995.

WIDE RECEIVERS: Bobby Engram was the nation's premier pass catcher last season and his opposite Freddie Scott led the Big 10 in touchdown catches. After recording the best season for a receiving corps, the duo returns for 1995. Despite the fact that most of the Raider receivers have a year of experience, Tech is hurt by the loss of Sheldon Bass, who broke his collarbone in August and is out indefinitely.

**DEFENSIVE LINE:** Defensive end Todd Atkins, a second team All-Big 10 selection anchors a veteran line for Penn State. Atkins will look for help from Eric Clair and Brandon Noble for help. The Tech line took a serious blow when end Tony Daniels injured his knee over the summer. A rag-tag group of linemen, headed by a true freshman, Montae Reagor, has to do well for Tech to be successful

LINEBACKERS: A tale of two teams here. Tech returns every member of its strongest unit from a year ago while Penn State must replace its three starters. Heading the list of linebackers here is all-American Zach Thomas. Thomas, the SWC defensive player of the year, is joined by Shawn Banks, All-SWC last season, Robert Johnson and Raider Marcus Coleman.

SECONDARY: Eight lettermen return to Penn State's secondary, while three members of Tech's defensive backfield have college experience. Leading the way for the Nittany Lions is cornerback Brian Miller, an All-Big 10 selection. Miller is joined by veteran corner Mark Tate, and safeties Cliff Dingle and Kim Herring. Should Tech corners Shawn Hurd and Verone McKinley struggle, a trio of freshmen, Corey Turner, Tracy Hart and Darwin Brown, lie in wait.







**TEXAS TECH OPENING 71ST SEASON** 

The Texas Tech Red Raiders will venture into the lions den, the Nittany Lions that is, as the school opens its 71st season of collegiate competition. It will be a dubious task for coach Spike Dykes, who is entering his ninth season as head coach, as he meets on of the game's legends, Penn State's Joe Paterno. Kickoff is 11 a.m.(CDT), televised by ABC-TV. An overflow crowd of 95,000-plus is expected at Beaver Stadium.

#### **TECH IN OPENERS**

The Red Raiders traditionally have been tough in season openers. The Raiders are 45-22-3 in season opening games but only 9-10-1 in road openers. Tech last opened on the road in 1990 with a 17-10 loss at Ohio State. The school's last road opener win was in 1977 against Baylor.

sive coordinator, has always produced an offense that was diversified, productive and imaginative. The key to it has been his ability to build around the people he has on hand. Our No. 1 objective is to not turn the ball over. When we have played well, we have had very few turnovers. Jerod Fiebiger, tight end, gives us another dimension we haven't had in years. Our main concern of defense is the fact that we have so many guys who have not played much in their current positions. A big part of defense is chemistry and so far so good. We had a blocked punt that A&M recovered on the one and we lost 23-17. Against Rice, we just never recovered the kickoff and they scored the winning touchdown right at the end (24-21).

There isn't anything Joe Paterno can do for an encore, except win the national championship. Last year, Penn State was 12-0 and won their first Big 10 Conference championship and initial Rose Bowl title. The Lions finished No. 2 in the nation behind Nebraska. They are riding the nation's longest wining streak of 17 games. Sever offensive starters return from a unit that was never held to under 31 points last year and led the nation in scoring (47.8 points per game) and total offense (520.3 yards per game).

SCOUTING THE NITTANY LIONS

It will be everything to gain and nothing to lose for the Red Raiders as they tangle with the nation's No. 4-ranked (AP) team. Despite two consecutive bowl appearances, the return of the Southwest Conference's Newcomer of the Year, quarterback Zebbie Lethridge, and the return of the Defensive Player of the Year, linebacker Zack Thomas, the Red Raiders are not highly-regarded even their own league. Most pre-season predictions picked Texas Tech between third and fifth in the SWC, and Thomas, a first-team All-America choice by UPI and the AFCA last year, was not even tabbed as the league's top defender. Probably because of losing its final two games, Tech is not considered on the level with Texas, whom the Red Raiders have defeated the past two years (Dykes has split eight games with).

Texas Tech football coach Spike Dykes (S.F. Austin '59) is dean of the Southwest Conference coaches. He has compiled an overall mark of 47-44-1. He earned his third SEC Coach of the Year Award last year (others were 1989 and 1993), and for the eighth consecutive season led the Red Raiders to an upper division finish in the league. He coached the Red Raiders to three consecutive SWC runnerup finishes before breaking through to the co-championship (only the school's second since joining the SWC in 1960). He's won more conference games (34) than any other previous Tech coach and he has taken four teams to bowl games. The school had been to one bowl in the nine years before he took over the program. Joe Paterno is in his 30th season as head coach and 46th year on the staff. He is the nation's leading active coach in victories (fourth overall). His record is 269-60-3. He has taken Penn State to 25 bowl games an his 16 wins is the most ever by a coach.
