Bunny Can Take It
A 16 -year study to determine the
recuperative powers of rabbit populations under intensive hunting has been completed by Dr. Miles
D. Pirnie, professor of zoology and
conservation of Michigan State college, the wildife management
institute reports.
The object of the test, conducted on a 500 -acte plot of the college's Kellogg station was to determine the
effectiveness of shooting as a meth-
od of controlling crop damage on agricultural lands.
The average yield from hunts
was 103 rabbits from each of the 16 years with a high of 172 in
single year. Shooting was confined rabbits were removed during the
16 -year period. In spite of this relatively heavy take, no reduction the end of the test period. that shooting during the hunting season is a poor method of cin
