FBI specialists continue probe

ATLANTA (AP) — FBI forensic specialists Thursday pored over a mountain of material taken from Richard Jewell's home — from videotapes to a rug - looking for clues tying the security guard to the Olympic bombing.

The FBI, which shipped most of the items to its Washington laboratory, maintained public silence on the progress of the investigation. But a senior federal official, speaking on condition of anonymity advised patience.

'I doubt we'll have any quick answers, because we have to examine in the lab what was taken out of the apartment," said the official.

Sentiments against Anti-Terrorism Bill

Provisions mostly intrude on rights



Don't get me wrong.

I'm as angry as anyone about the destruction of TWA Flight 800 and the bombing in Centennial Park in Atlanta.

But that's no excuse.

The FBI and others are using the passions stirred up by the nation's JAMES WALKER most recent experiences with ter-University Daily Reporter rorism to get passed measures that Congress would not accept in the

previous anti-terrorism bill.

The last bill was passed in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing.

The main provisions of the Anti-Terrorism Act of 1996 were:

1. Expanding authority for wiretaps, including the so-called "roving wiretaps," which allow police to tap into all phone lines of suspected terrorists. A related provision would allow police to trace the telephone numbers called by a suspect.

2. Expanding funding for the FBI.

3. A study of the idea of putting "taggants" or traceable markers in

The only sensible part of this bill is the traceable markers idea, but ironically, this is the part that will almost certainly not pass.

The reason is simple.

The National Rifle Association doesn't like it. What the NRA could possibly have against this idea is beyond me, but may be they believe that along with Howitzers and armor-piercing bullets, people have a constitutional right to untraceable plastic explosives for hunting and selfdefense.

Expand funding for the FBI? Maybe, but after they fulfilled every paranoid fantasy of the Freemen by actually laying siege to their little compound, I think we might be better off offering them some basic psychology courses instead.

The first part is the part that disturbs me most, though. Wiretapping? Suspected terrorists? Right now, police must have a court order to tap a phone line. It should stay that way.

And what exactly does suspected terrorist mean, anyway? I've been to small towns in Texas where a suspected terrorist was anyone with long hair.

The last thing I need is Deputy Dog listening to my phone conversations because he heard I might be a member of some subversive organization, like the Democrats. (Which I'm not, by the way.)

If Republicans want to get government out of our lives, they can start by keeping their ears out of our homes.

Five arrested for smuggling radiation

MINSK, Belarus (AP) -Belarusian police arrested five people Thursday for attempting to smuggle six containers of radioactive material out of the former Soviet republic.

The type of material was not immediately clear, but the containers emitted radiation three times higher than normal background radiation, security officials told the Interfax news agency.

Police estimated the containers were worth about \$50,000.

The group had been storing the materials in a cellar full of homemade preserves, and were preparing to ship them abroad.

"There's no question that both fighters are interested," he said. "And I don't see any reason for a smokescreen if Ray isn't coming back."

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
