BIG STORE IS CLOSED

By United Press.
NEW YORK, June 25.—Receivers were appointed today for the H. B. Clofflin Company, one of the biggest dry goods firms in the world.

The Clofflin receivers was followed by an equity petition consented to by Clofflin's attorneys. An involuntary petition of bankruptcy was also filed.

Joseph Martindale and F. A. Juilliard, both of whom are friendly to the company, were appointed to act in both proceedings.

There bonds were fixed at \$500,000 each.

Fully twenty-five millions of dollars are involved and a score of New York banks held Clofflin's paper.

Probably 2000 banks in different parts of the country handled the company's business.

The concern has scores of retail subsidiaries throughout the country but it is very unlikely that any of these will close.

W. P. Odell, filed a third suit today, charging that a subsidiary manufacturing company owed him \$5000 and also asking involuntary bankruptcy of the smaller concern.

The stock market was slightly off at the opening, influenced by the appointment of a receiver for the Clofflin concern.

Twice before the company stopped payment on its notes but no holder lost money as a result.

ANOTHER TOWN FALLEN TO REBELS

TORREON, Mex., June 25.—San Lus Potosi was captured by the constitutionalists under General Torree, was the information received here in a brief dispatch at rebel headquarters.

The federals suffered heavy losses and retreated towards Aguascalientes.

COTTON BLOSSOMS EXHIBITED TODAY

The first cotton blossoms brought to Ballinger were exhibited here Thursday afternoon, June 25, by Prof. N. J. Key, of the Valley creek country. Prof. Key came to town on business and as he was passing his cotton patch he plucked a pretty red blossom and brought it along to see if Ballinger folks had seen the 1914 bloom. It was the first reported at this office from the present crop.

Mr. Key stated that he had about fifty acres and that while every stalk did not have a bloom on it, that the entire field was in good shape and many blooms were showing up. He reports crop conditions in his section A1, and everybody at work.

It has been many years, perhaps never before, when this country promised more than at the present writing. Feed crops that were planted early are practically made and cotton is in fine condition where it has been cultivated.

Zacatecas Fallen; Garrison Fleeing

JAUREZ, Mex., June 25.—The remnant of the federal garrison at Zacatecas is fleeing toward Aquascalientes, directly south of the besieged city, leaving 2000 killed and 6000 wounded in the streets of the city, is a dispatch received from General Villa today, dated Zacatecas.

According to the telegram, received here from the general, he captured 5000 prisoners, 6000 rifles, all the munitions and all provisions of the federal army holding the city.

General Villa gave his own loss at 500 killed and 800 wounded.

Among the wounded are Generals Huerrera, Ortega and Rodriguez,

The rebels' storming of the impregnable heights Sierra Lubufa was unequalled in an exhibition of courage.

Before leaving the federals dynamited the principal government and bank buildings, destroying railroads as they retreated.

It will be weeks before General Villa can repair the bridges and tracks of the railways so that he can move his army within striking distance of Calientes

Jaurez is continuing her celebration of the victory today.

The evacuation of San Luis Potosi is unconfirmed here.

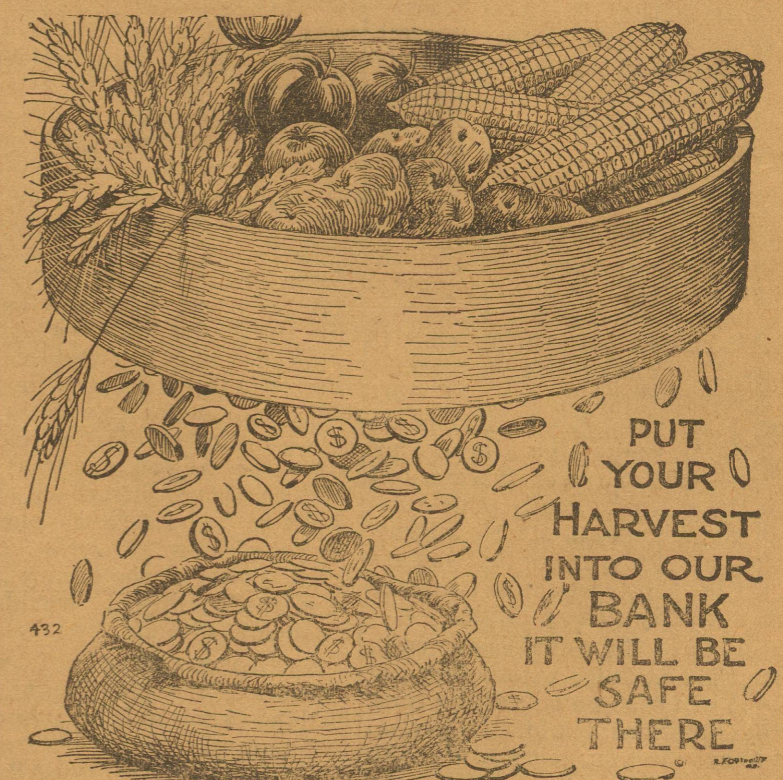

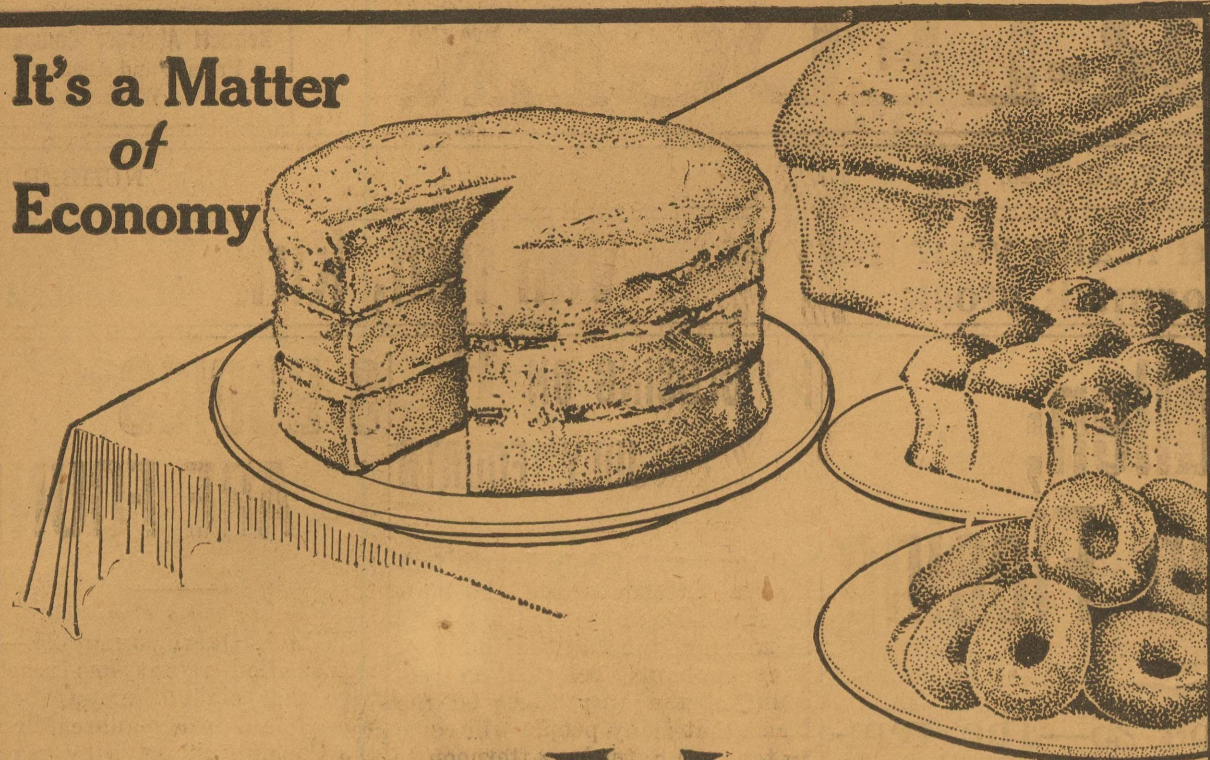

DEMONSTRATOR GIVES OUT LETTER.

The following letter has been sent out by Geo. P. McLelland, Runtless County demonstration agent:

To All Demonstrators and Co-operators:

On account of the heavy rains of late, it is going to take fast work now to get your demonstration plot into proper condition.

First, the roots are going to need air; second, it will require frequent cultivation to prevent the root system from establishing itself too near the surface. The latter is one reason why crops go to the bad so quickly after an abundance of spring rains. After the roots have become established too near the surface, they do not have time to form deeper roots to furnish moisture sufficient for the rapid approach of hot, dry weather that usually comes on during the summer months.

Cultivate with small plows, at least five or six inches deep the first time, so you can maintain at least a three or four inch level mulch all through the season. Alternate your cultivation with a "A" harrow between plowing, if possible. The diverse gang (some times called spring tooth scratcher) is another splendid implement to use in keeping up a level even mulch, with no open furrows left in the middle. Study your "A" circulars and all other instructions carefully, to see that you are carry out instructions to the letter or as nearly so as possible.

Again: As your small grain land is now filled with water, and as it will soon be harvesting time, the questions naturally arise: "What are you going to do with your stubble land?" "How can you best handle the situation as it exists?" Let us make the following suggestions:

Get your disk harrow in shape, so as to be ready when the time

comes, and start right in behind the binder, double-cutting or double-disking the land thoroughly just as soon as the grain is cut. You have all doubtless noticed that land that is wet or moist when grain is cut, will be hard in two or three days if let alone. And as you have a good bottom season, let me insist upon your not letting this good chance slip by without making an effort to conserve the moisture that you already have in the soil. If you do not have a disk harrow, take your cultivator, shovel plows or small sweeps and give the land a good plowing, starting right in behind the binder. Neighbors can co-operate and exchange work so as to have teams sufficient to do the job at once, and by shocking your grain in wide rows the operation can be carried on easily.

Next, and in view of the fact that you ought to have plenty of moisture left after so treating your land, many of you will doubtless plant another crop. Some of the forage crops, say milo, kaffir, etc., will be the safest to plant. A great many farmers continue to plant their stubble land to cotton every year, but this is my judgment is a very poor practice, for just about one crop in twenty will make the seed that was planted, thus taking out what little moisture there might remain in the soil for another crop, with nothing made. If you will treat your land as above described, there ought to be sufficient moisture conserved now to almost, if not fully, mature a crop of milo, while in all probability it would not make any cotton.

Another reason why I would discourage the planting of stubble land to cotton is because of the fact that wherever there are even a few scattering boll weevil in a county, we know that late maturing cotton furnishes breeding grounds for this dreaded pest. Therefore, if the crop succeeded in making anything, it would certainly extend the range of breeding ground over a larger territory, or a larger part of the farm.

Plant your milo just as soon as possible, and with the smallest opening plow you can use that will put the seed down on moist dirt. The large 24-inch sweep allows too much moisture to escape to be a desirable opening plow at this season of the year.

Mark you, I do not think it a good practice to plant stubble land to anything in the semi-arid belt, except especially good seasonable years like the present. It

is usually better to conserve all the moisture possible and put your land in a condition to take up the rains, thus making sure of a crop the next year, than to be trying to get a second crop on such slim chances.

If I can find milo and kaffir seed, I'll let you know from whom you can buy it, if you will write me.

**GOOD MONEY FOR RUNNELS
 COUNTY.**

A news article in this paper a
 few days ago stated that approxi-
 mately \$36,000 would be received
 by the wool growers of Runnels
 county for their sales of the
 twelve month's clip. This amount
 was realized from 200,000 pounds
 of wool at an average price of 18
 cents. With splendid grazing lands
 in this county, much of which is
 practically useless, since the own-
 ers are deriving no benefit there-
 from, owners of land could swell
 the number of pounds of wool
 next year to double the 1914 mar-
 ket, if they only would. Sheep are
 very little trouble and there is
 little expense incurred in their
 sustenance. Much of the money

which is derived from the sales
 of wool is profit, and it is stated
 that the profit will be greater next
 year because more pounds of the
 bright stuff will be marketed.

THAT TRADE EXCURSION

Every town that has any spunk
 about it is having trade excursions
 this summer over the county. Out
 of scores and scores of Texas
 newspapers which reach the of-
 fice of The Ledger, a majority of
 them tell of the proceedings of a
 meeting at which the merchants
 decide that a trade excursion over
 the county is necessary. Nothing
 keeps a town more to the front
 than a live bunch of merchants.
 Many residents living in the coun-
 try have never had the opportu-
 nity of learning whether Ballinger
 had merchants who were always
 to the front or the other kind. It
 is high time, they were learning
 and it is high time the local busi-
 ness men came to a decision that
 a trade excursion over the county

 prospects for large crops this fall,

**LITTLE STORIES OF THE
 LONE STAR STATE**

A Madero—quite possibly re-
 lated to the family which has
 played such a tragic role in recent
 Mexican history—flashed across a
 page of early Texas history.

The state legislature of Coahu-
 ila and Texas about 1831 sent
 Francisco Madero to the upper
 Trinity river to extend titles to
 colonists. Madero was a gentle-
 man of popular manners and much
 esteemed by the colonists. He dis-
 charged his duties with such en-
 ergy that he was arrested, the ex-
 cuse being given that he was ex-
 tending titles to natives of the
 United States who had immigrated
 since the decree of April 6,
 1830, which put up the gates
 against citizens of that govern-
 ment. It is probable that such
 titles had been extended but the
 arrest of Madero and others in-
 flamed the colonists because the
 military arm invaded the civil
 authority in these cases.

The decree of April 6, 1830 was
 not a sudden change in the policy
 of Mexico attributable to the mere
 tyrannical disposition of the ac-
 ting president, Bustamante. It
 had its origin mainly in the fear
 of Mexico that the United States
 would through its citizens domicil-
 ed in Texas set up a claim to the
 county. The introduction of troops
 the usurpation of the military, the
 prohibition of trade with the Uni-
 ted States and all the succeeding
 train of enactments resulting fi-
 ally in the struggle for Texas In-
 dependence, is attributed to this
 jealousy of the United States, then
 and even now existing.

THINKS GOVERNOR DID RIGHT THING

BEAUMONT, Tex., June 25.—Further support of Governor Colquitt's decision against calling a special session of the Texas Legislature was given by V. A. Collins of this city, a leader in the Legislature.

"I do not believe any great constructive legislation could be accomplished in the short period allowed for a called session," he said. However, recounting pressing legislative needs, Attorney Collins said:

"The most urgent need is to provide means for our public institutions, if this may be done by the Governor himself.

"I believe the Legislature might do much more for the farmers by passing laws for the establishment of a rural credit system, and the building of public warehouses for the purpose of assisting marketing crops. Measure of such grave importance could not be passed at a special session."

RECEIVES NEWS OF DEATH OF SISTER.

U. P. Melton received a message early Thursday morning conveying to him the sad news of the death of his only sister, which occurred a short time before the message was dispatched at Navasota.

The message did not give the particulars of the death but it is reported that she died with typhoid pneumonia. Mr. Melton's wife is quite ill with typhoid fever in the Halley & Love Sanitarium, but the physicians advised Mr. Melton that it would be safe for him to leave and he left on the afternoon train Thursday to attend the funeral. His friends here will join the Ledger in sympathy for the loss sustained in the death of his sister.

SERIOUSLY INJURED

Judge W. H. Gross, owner of one of the largest ranches in Central West Texas and probably the largest in Runnels county sustained serious injuries Wednesday afternoon, when he fell from a horse which he was riding, frightening the animal and causing him to kick the rider. A rib was broken and it is believed the kidneys were dislocated.

Physicians attending Judge Gross today state that he is resting very well, under the circumstances. The accident is one which causes much pain, but is not fatal.

Judge Gross had just crossed a small stream on his large ranch when the accident occurred. In some manner he slipped from the saddle and fell. The horse became frightened at seeing the body fall to the ground and began kicking. The tenth rib was broken and the kidneys dislocated, according to information received Thursday.

Judge Gross lives about six months in the year on his ranch near Ballinger. The remaining part of the year, he spends in Mineral Wells, where he resided before moving to Ballinger and before he purchased his large tract of land.

"Wants Fruits Of Victory"

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 24.—In reply to a message from Washington, it is understood here, that Gen. Carranza has rejected in a message received here at five o'clock this morning, all proposals of the Washington government.

"I want the fruits of my victory and I want the people to elect the president of Mexico and I will not run or dictate any candidate," is reported the gist of the message from Carranza. "We can have peace in Mexico but it can be only under my direction."

DAIRY INSTALLS MODERN METHODS

Modernized methods prevail in almost every line of business in this day of push and progress and the business that is conducted along the paths of antiquity is doomed to fail. The modern way is not the cheapest way in the long run, but it is the modern way that attracts trade and keeps any business in the fore front.

F. Green is the proprietor. The milking machine is equipped for taking the life sustaining fluid from 31 cows, and the work is done in a few minutes. The machine is operated by a gasoline engine and the equipment is so constructed that it can be added to as the increase is needed. The milk is handled in the most sanitary way, the milk cans being air tight, and not even the odor of the barn allowed to come in contact with the milk.

At the milk house a sterilization plant has been installed. A boiler generates steam that is piped to the washing vat, and the milk cans and bottles are here put through three washings, or at least two washings and a sterilization process. First the milk vessels are washed in a vat of hot water and soap. They are then carried through hot clear water and then placed in a tight vat where they are thoroughly steamed.

The Hall Hardware Co., completed the installation of this plant this week, and E. Allison went out to test the boiler and turn the completed job over to Mr. Green Thursday morning. The writer accompanied Mr. Allison and he can say that Ballinger has a sanitary dairy that any city many times the size of Ballinger should be proud of.

Other modern improvements over the old way will be an auto delivery for this dairy. Mr. Green has placed an order for an auto milk wagon, and same was shipped two weeks ago, and is expected to arrive this week. This will bring about much better delivery service and a great saving in time.

Mr. Green has a large concrete silo on his dairy farm, and is planning to build another one. He is growing feed with which to fill the silo, and will adopt modern feeding methods as well as modern methods for handling the milk after it is produced.

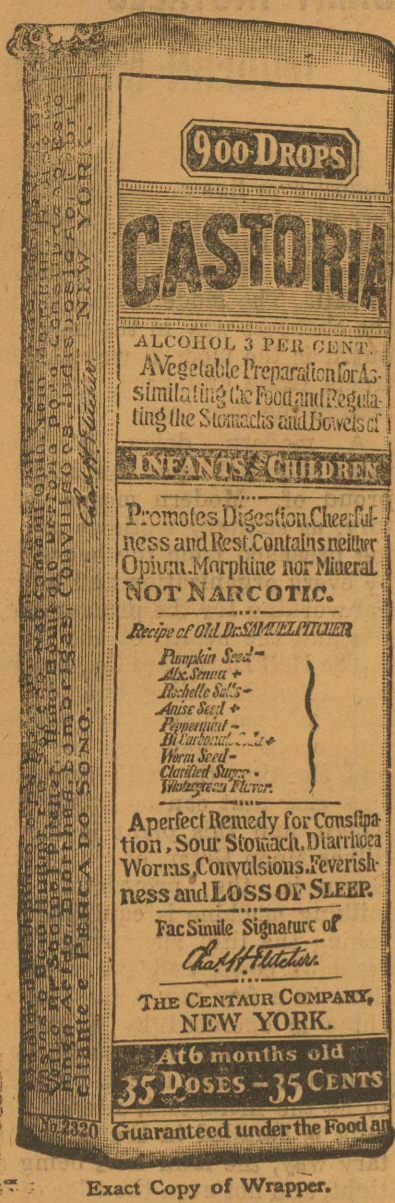

WILL ENLARGE CULVERTS FOR CITY'S STORM WATERS

Culverts on the Abilene and Southern railway's right-of-way from Fifth Street to Eleventh, will be enlarged and placed in a condition for the drainage of water coming from the north western part of the city. Heretofore, complaints have been heard from not only the section of the city in the vicinity of the Abilene and Southern railway, but also from many residents in the central portion of the city along the Santa Fe right-of-way. It is believed that if the several culverts, one or two being at the intersection of each street and the railroad tracks, are enlarged, water will run off the city's street and residents' lots.

For the purpose of coming to this decision, Percy Jones, engineer of the Abilene and Southern railway, was in the city yesterday from Abilene where he makes his offices. He went over the territory that should be drained properly, with the street committee of the city of Ballinger, composed of John A. Weeks, Will Ellis and C. C. Cockrell. Mr. Weeks is absent from the city, but Councilmen Cockrell and Ellis undertook to show Engineer Jones the necessity of an enlargement of the culverts at an early date. In many places about the part of

the city, commonly known as the flats, water from the rain of the first part of the week, is still on the ground and it is believed that there is little chance of its drying within the next several days.

It was pointed out to Mr. Jones by the street committee that danger of sickness from the standing of pools of water was sufficient demand that the railway make arrangement to carry off the storm water of the city in the manner in which it should. Mr. Jones after examining the conditions prevailing along the right-of-way and realizing the opportunity for the breeding of dangerous insects, stated that he would recommend that the concern enlarge all culverts. It is believed that the storm water question will be solved then for the entire city, since if ample facilities are given the overflow waters from the hill, in the lower section of the city, for its drainage, there will be no pools of water standing here and there in the central part of the city or that part along the Santa Fe right-of-way.

The Abilene and Southern railway will commence work on the culverts, it has been stated, within the very near future.

"NO FISHING" SIGN NO LONGER USED

AUSTIN, June 22.—The "no fishing" sign has been banished in Texas.

Fishermen have shown an unusual interest in the recent ruling of the attorney general's department that all bodies of water in Texas, whether created by artificial means or of natural formation, are free to everybody for fishing purposes, even where such lakes or ponds are surrounded by privately-owned lands. In the latter case the fishermen must be given access to the water and egress with the necessity of a permit.

Under this ruling the several private fishing preserves in Texas are thrown open to the public. There are a number of clubs which have heretofore claimed exclusive right to certain lakes and ponds in the matter of exercising the fishing privilege on their respective properties.

If a body of water is more than thirty feet wide any person can fish in it.

KING GEORGE IS NOW BIRTHDAYING

LONDON, June 22.—King George is officially celebrating his 49th birthday today, although as a matter of fact he is already nineteen days into his fiftieth year. The actual anniversary, June, found the King too busy to receive the congratulations of the rulers and people of the world, so another date had to be set so that he could accept felicitations in proper style. Today the telegraph and postal systems were kept busy conveying the congratulations and acknowledgements.

Flags were flown on all government buildings, and salutes were fired at the naval and military stations, while British warships the world over decked themselves out in rainbow fashion.

There were many military parades, the most important being the brilliant ceremony known as "Trooping the Color" which was performed on the House Guards Parade, St. James' Park, in the presence of the King, Queen and all the members of the royal family at present in London.

King George, wearing the uniform of colonel-in-chief of the Grenadier Guards, rode from Buckingham Palace attended by Prince Arthur of Connaught, Prince Christian, the Duke of Teck and Prince Alexander, and a brilliant cavalcade of high army officers and the foreign military attaches.

Queen Mary, with her daughter and the younger prince drove to the parade ground with a cavalry escort, and took up positions in the royal box just above the saluting base.

Great crowds assembled for this popular ceremony, and their majesties were heartily cheered during their progress to and from the Palace. In view of suffragette attempts to get at the King, extra precautions were taken today, the spectators being kept several hundred feet behind the closely packed lines of troops lining the route, and detectives in plain clothes swarmed everywhere.

On the Horse Guards Parade the troops were drawn up in a hollow square, with drums and colors facing the saluting base. Having inspected the lines the King and his staff saluted Queen Mary and took up their positions under the royal standard. The colors of the Scots Guards were "trooped" (marched along the lines) with stately ceremony, and afterwards the whole of the troops marched past the King, in slow and quick time. The royal party returned to the Palace and demonstrations of popular enthusiasm.

Wealthy Councilman Found Dead

STAMFORD, Canada, June 24.—Waldo R. Ballou, a rich prominent councilman of this city, was found beaten to death this morning, with the back of his skull crushed in.

His body was found at the door of Mrs. Helen Angels' apartment. Mrs. Angels is a wealthy, attractive widow of forty years of age.

She was arrested today and admitted before police officials that Ballou was in her home last night.

The prints of bloody barefeet led straight to her door. The bloody and smashed hat of Ballou was found in her apartment along with other articles of apparel of his, such as waist and shirt.

After the articles were found by the police this morning, Mrs. Angels became silent and called for a lawyer.

PARIS, June 25.—Jack Johnson and Frank Moran, black and white, meet here Saturday night at the Velodrome d'Hiver. If the white man wins, the lucky punch will be worth a fortune to him. If his punch lacks the necessary ginger, good night Mr. Moran!

That is the way the betting man sizes up the fight. For Moran it means everything. Either he will open his eyes on Sunday morning in a famous fighter, with a golden sunrise and a golden day in front of him, or he will regain consciousness only to realize that his sun has set and that he is not even a has-been, that he has had his chance and not made good; that he is an almost-was yet a never-was.

For Jack Johnson the fight does not mean so much. If he defeats Moran he will do more than is expected of him here. He will not gain a particle in popularity despite the fact that his need of public adoration is now a negligible quantity. Should he take the count he would lose nothing since he has nothing to lose. Win, lose or draw, he gets only his \$30,000, plus \$6,000 training expenses which has now drawn. Lose or win he will become a professional automobile drive, having already signed a contract with certain makers of a Belgium car and a French firm of tire-makers, and made his plans for taking part in the French Grand Prix and the Russian Circuit this summer.

In his own words: He has "got his." A black satellite of Johnson's told the United Press correspondent. "Jack don't care how the fight comes out, he's got his already and the way his future business is mapped out, it isn't

goin' to hurt him much via or lose." There is only one hitch in this statement; Johnson hates the white man and unless circumstances have altered since the wise ones had a look-in, he will try to put Moran to sleep.

URGES ONE BREED HOGS FOR COUNTY

In a letter to J. H. Taylor, secretary of the Rannels County Hog Grower's Association, J. L. Jordon, secretary of the Louisiana Swine Breeder's Association, calls attention of the local hog growers to the importance of raising the same breed of hogs in a community. In explaining his point, Mr. Jordon says:

"I do not know, of course, whether most of your members are raising pure-bred hogs for breeding purposes or are raising for the market. At any rate, you will find that your greatest advantage lies in the community plan which simply means that everyone in a community breeds the same breed of hogs. For instance, if your locality can come to be known as a center where any number of Duroc Jerseys can be gotten, you will find that your opportunities for sales will be greatly increased. Waukesha county in Wisconsin is probably the best known and most prosperous county in the Union simply because everyone there is breeding either pure bred Guernseys or Holsteins and people come from all over the United States to Waukesha county knowing that they can buy from one to a thousand registered stock of either breed and ship from one point."

Further on in the letter the cooperative plan for the marketing of hogs is urged by the secretary of the Louisiana Swine Breeders' Association. He insists that the Rannels County Hog Growers' Association keep in close touch with the officials at the Agricultural and Mechanical College at College Station and the Fort Worth packing houses, where general knowledge will be distributed to the members of the local club free of all costs.
