MANY LIVES LOST WHEN SHIP SINKS

CHICAGO, July 24.—At least 500 are dead and the death list may run to more than 1,000, as the result of the sinking of an excursion steamer, the Eastland, as the boat left the pier here this morn-

ing.

The Eastland carried a picnic Indescribparty of 2,000 pepole. Indescribable panic followed the sinking of the ship and the death list, will be appalling; including men, women and children.

Rescurers have opened up the vessel and are bringing out the lifeless bodies as fast as they can. As the ship began sinkink the passengers became panic stricken and men trampled women with babies to death and others perished as the boat careened. Most thrilling scenes are enacted in the rescue work that is being carried on. A man on shore went out in a row boat and picked up a drowning man and together they pulled 91 people out of a porthole of the Eastland.

The Eastland was one of six excursion boats carrying • 21,000 men, women and children to attend the annual Western Electric Company pienic on Lake Michigan. The unfortunate boat carried many women and girls.

The captain and first mate of the Eastland escaped death from the sinking ship and have been arrested. The captain says that the air chutes broke and allowed the water to come in, drowning the passengers and sending


NEGRO WOMAN SHOOTS ANGELO OFFICER.



160 Haytien Prisoners Shot.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, July 28. -General Oscar, governor of Port 8 au Prince and a supporter of 8 President Guillaume, caused to be 6 executed yesterday, at the time 6 of the outbreak of the revolution-8 ary movement in this city, all the 6 political prisoners in the hands of the government to the number of 43 about 160 men. The victims of 43 this massacre included General 42 Orestes Zamor, a former president 43 of Hayti, who was driven out of 43 the country last year and return-38 ed in March, 1915, and was taken prisoner.

When the people of Port au 10 Prince learned of this massacre, there was a general outbreak of 7 indignation. 

SHOT-HOLE BORERS DAMAGING TREES

S. B. Howard, the pecan nursery man, reports damage to trees in this section from an insect which the agricultural departone of the beetles to State Eto- or constipated, listen to me! mologist at College Station, and with the tree pest and outlining methods for handling the beetles. We reproduce herewith the letter feeling that it might be helpful o those who wish to guard gainst the loss of valuable trees:

This insect is a small black beetle. The female bores into the ark, then tunnels beneath the ark and in these tunnels lays her The eggs hatch into borers esembling small white worms and these borers continue the work of tunneling beneath the park in every direction.

"There is one peculiarity about this insect which you should not overlook. These insects prefer to braden warehouse verlook. A tree that is dying from erown gall or peach-tree borers will usually be very heavily infected by the shot-hole borer also, When the shot-hole borers have nealthiest trees in the orchard.

"After you haove gotten your orchard into good shape by the methods indicated above, I would spray the trunks and bases of the larger limbs (but not foliage) with whale-oil soap solution, made by dissolving 1 pound of whale-oil soap in 3 gallons of hot water. Repeat this treatment two or three times during the summer. The object of this application is to prevent the adult peetles from boring into the wood and laying their eggs there. The whale-oil solution may also penetrate some of the little burrows through the openings in the bark and kill the insects that are in-
