



"ROUGH-NECK YANKEE SOLDIERY"

BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 23 .-The army dragnet for Mexican-American bandits worked steadily yesterday giving rise to sensational reports of man hunts. Officers denied emphatically that any bandits had been caught but refused to adopt the suggestion of some ranchers in the interior to reduce the size of the army rural patrols. Evidence is accumulating that the activity of the United States soldiers is keeping the bandits scattered in groups of two or three. Three Mexicans, posing as bandits, appeared yesterday on the J. J. Young ranch in Hidalgo County They proved to be the tamest 'bad men'' encountered in this section in several weeks, as the ranch manager, single handed, got them off the place by the use of firm language. They said they wanted a horse. Joshia Turner, an American

aged 89, owner of the ranch where American soldiers were ambushed and two killed, last week, has issued to the newspapers a protest against the treatment of three Mexicans captured as witnesses on his ranch and turned over to the civil authorities, who shortly afterward announced the Mexicans had been killed while trying to escape. One of these Mexicans, Turner said, was Y. Ricones, a boy of 16 whose mother was a widow living on the ranch. Turner accounted for the presence of the other Mexicans by saying one had come to visit his mother and sister and the third lived on the ranch. Turtwo Mexicans captured with these three, Daniel and Bentura Longoria, have been released from the Brownsville jail, where they had been held pending investigation. The lives of these two Longorias were saved when their companions were killed through United States soldier's stories of their friendliness to the Americans

Deeds filed with County Clerk Frank Rooney at Fort Stockton last Friday recite that Robert C Paxton, of Glasgow, Scotland, had sold to T. M. Pyle of Clarendon, Texas, 93,381 acres of Pecos County ranch lands, lying in the south part of the county near the Tenrell County line. Of this 30,184 acres are patented and 63,197 acres are school land, the consideration being \$155,052.24.

The ranch is well stocked with

high-grade stuff, among which is herd of 5,500 thoroughbred Polled Angus cattle, which is said to be the largest single herd of this breed in the world.

It is not known what price was paid for the stock but it is estimated that it brought not less than \$300,000, which runs the total consideration in the deal to about a half million dollars.

The parties instrumental in consummating this deal were John K. Donnan, of Austin, attorney for Mr. Paxton, and John Young Jr., a prominent real estate man

Mr. Paxton is well known in that section, having come to Pecos county about thirty years ago from the Scottish Highlands. He resided in that county con-

tinuously for over fifteen years. He went to the Fort Stockton country a poor man but before returning to his native heath he had amassed a fortune in the stock business.

Since his return to Scotland he has made yearly visits to his Texas ranch.

Mr. Pyle, who came into possession of this splendid Pecos County property, is a wealthy and prominent stockman of Clarendon, Texas, who will move to his new ranch holdings in the near future.




