Safecrackers made a haul of ap proximately \$1,100 here last Friday night when they entered the post office and three business houses.

The post office reported about \$464 taken and Carbon Trading Co. about \$550. Two other plac-Carbon Drug Co. and Ben W. D. Turner and wlfe and Bill tered but owners have not discovered anything missing.

J. B. Williams, sheriff of Eastand County, was here early Saturday morning with one of his deputies and a Texas Ranger, Johnny Cope, from Breckenridge to investigate the robberies. Sheriff Williams also notified United States Postal authorities who arrived here Saturday afternoon.

The burglaries were discovered arly Saturday morning when Hoyle Reed, an employe of Car-bon Trading Co., came to work and on entering the store smelled tear gas from the knob of the safe which had been knocked off.

Meredith Black, a clerk in the post office, stated that the knob May 3. had been knocked from the safe and the currency and change taken but the money or ers were no taken. Entrance had been gained through a south side window, after is reported to be resting well. the protective screen had been ripped away.

The culprits entered the Carbon Drug Store through the front door and indications were that they left out through the back door by prieing it open with a large two-by-four. E. R. Yarbrough, owner, states that he has not discovered any valuables miss ing, however much of the merchandise was strewn over the floor.

Ben Stephenson stated that nothing was missing from his gro cery store. Entrance had been gained by prieing the lock off the front door. A safe, which had been burgiarized last year was not disturbed. Stephenson said the cash register had some change in it and he had some folding money in a paper sack, therefore he believes they did not go back into the building.

New Type Sharpener **Usable** in Fields Will Sharpen Mower Blade While on Bar

A new type of hay mover blade sharpener which makes it possible to sharpen the ordinary mover so-tion right in the field without even removing it from the cutter bar, thus saving time and labor and making it possible to cut ture hay faster, has been placed on the mar-ket by the low England Carbide Tool Company, Inc.



The black tip of this new type mower blade sharpener is made of carboloy cemented carbide, hardest metal commercially avail-able. Mower blades can be sharp-ened quickly and easily in the field with this sharpener.

The sharpener consists of a steel shank one-hall inch square and about 5' long chrome plated against rast and having rounded edges so that the tool can be carried safely in the pocket. The tip which does the actual sharpening is made of ultra-hard carboly cemented car-bide metal, which is attached se-curely to the steel shank. To sharpen cover, blades with

curely to the steel shank. To sharper mower blades with this "carbide tipped" tool, the edges of the blade to be sharpened are uncovered. The sharpener is held in the hand, paim down. The car-boloy tip is placed on the mower and drawn from back to front on the blade three or four times. This pro-duces an extremely sharp edge. Any small burr which may develop on the blade may be removed by drawing the carbide tip across the bottom of the blade.
