WASHINGTON, Dec. 7-The U. S. State Department's formal refusal to comply with the German request asking for the reasons that actuated the United States to demand the recall of Captains Boy-Ed and Von Papen was made public today. The message from the American government . was sent to Ambassador Bernstorff at Washington, and was forwarded by the German ambassador on to Berlin last night.

The German embassy at Washington interprets this action by the United States to be very unfriendly.

State department officials made no attempt this afternoon to minimize the seriousness of the situation nor to intimate that the outcome might be settled satisfactorily to this country.

It is agreed in official quarters that Germany must make the first movement if diplomatic relations between the United States and the German Empire are severed.


