



### WILSON ASKS CONGRESS FOR POWER TO ARM SHIPS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 .- Asking authority to arm merchantmen and take any other step that may be necessary for the protection of American lives and American interests on the high seas, President Wilson addressed a joint session of congress this afternoon and discussed frankly the situation between the United States and Germany.

Raelizing that the steps the president was taking draws the United States measurably nearer open hostilities with Germany, congress listened with the deepest gravity at the president's pronouncement of the seemingly deterimination of Germany to carry out its ruthless submarine warfare. Mr. Wilson cited the series of 12-15-w12t offenses the Germans had committed against the American nation as well as against other netural nations since the diplomatic break.




