

DEMONSTRATION BILL PASSING

A bill that has passed the sec ond reading and is ready for fin al passage before the legislature, and which bids fare to become ; new law in the interest of the farmer is as follows:

An Act conferring certain pow ers upon the Commissioners Courts of the counties of this State and authorizing said courts under such regulations as they may prescribe, to appropriat and use any sum or sums of money not exceeding Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollas per year for Farmers Co-Operative Demonstration work in their respective counties, along the same lines as this work is or may be conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture, and pre-cribing that they may conduct such work agents of the Department of Agri culture and the Commissioners

ure of the State of Texas: Section 1. The commissioners' of this state may and they are Nance, Malvina Skinner. hereby authorized and empowered to appropriate and use under uch rules and regulations as they f money not exceeding two thouand five hundred dollars per year for Farmers Co-operative Demonstration Work and Farm Home Demonstration Work in their respective counties along the same lines as this work is and may be conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture and may conduct such work joint ly in their respective counties with the agents and representatives of the United States Depart ment of Agriculture upon such terms and conditions as may b agreed upon between the agents of the Department of Agriculture and the commissioners' court.

Section 2. That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act be and the same are hereby hepealed.

Section 3. Owing to the prob ably short duration of the pres ent session of the Legislature, and the vast amount of business necessary to be dispatched by it during such session, and the fact that many counties of this State which are desirous of employing farm demonstrators and assistants, but are unable to appropriate sufficient money for such purpose to procure or keep the services of competent and efficient demonstrators or assistants, hus seriously retarding the agricultural development of such counties and resulting in substantial loss to their several agricultural populations, creates an emergency and imperative public rule requiring bills to be read on hree several days be suspended, and that this Act take effect from and after its passage, and it is so

bill makes in the present law is term in our city. to increase the amount which the commissioners' courts of the sev eral counties of this State may expend for the employment of Farm Demonstration Agents working in conjunction with the United States Department of Agri culture from \$1000.00 per year to \$2500.00 per year and adding the words, "Farm Home Demonstration Work," to make same explicitly cover the expense of wo men demonstration agents employed by some of the counties for the purpose of conducting the girls' canning clubs and other demonstration work of like nature designed to better home conditions upon the farm, encourag thrift and the conservation of the perishable products of the farm.





The President will need the powers of Congress to support him in all matters foc ollateral defense of our merchant marines, according to a formal statement from the White House to newspaper correspondents this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, March 13 .- A general peace move will be launched within three or four months, according to views of diplomatic officials in Washington.





Texas soils and its value as an oil producing crop as well as its feed value. The fact that the oi trade is turing its attention to the oy bean as a supplement crop to cotton and the peanut is responsible for the bulletin.

The soy bean is comparatively new crop for Texas but has een thoroughly tried out at the experiment stations. It is well adapted to the corn growing sec ions of the state. Soy beans are drough-resistant and will with stand considerable frost. They do est on mellow, fertile loams and lays, but are not particular as to

The United States Departmen of Agriculture puts the cost of soy beans production at \$7.50 \$12.00 pe racre, and cotton at a bout \$22. The Texas Industria Congress says the cost of peanut production is about \$16. with the seed counted at \$2 to \$2.50 per bushel. The price of soy beans in the producting sections of North Carolina during the past two years has been from ninety cents to \$1.25 per bushel, making the crop a very valuable one to the farm for oil producing purposes and as a feed for live-




