Pershing With 10,000 Troops Will Go to Europe

NEW YORK, May 12.—Ten thousand American regulars under General John J. Pershing will be the first of Uncle Sam's fighting forces to go to France, according to a statement of plans which it is learned today are practically complete.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—President Wilson today authorized four additional increments for the regular United States army, approximating 183,000 mem

The new regiments will each have a nucleus of trained soldiers. In most cases one regiment of already-trained soldiers will be used as a basis for formation of two regiments of raw recruits.

Under the order issued by the President today, the regular army will be filled to the full quota of nearly 300,000 men. More than 65,000 troops, authorized in four increments, have already been recruited since April 1st.






