RUSSIANS TAKE 16,000 PRISONERS IN 2 DAYS

PETROGRAD, July 2. wenty-four hours fighting along the Galician front the Russians captured 8,564 prisoners and comeletely launched a great offensive novement. The Russians swept wide path over more than 18 miles driving the Germans back with heavy losses. The Russian offensive is fully underway and today great artiflery preparations are being made and the full strength of the artillery will be thrown a-

The fighting is by the soldiers of the new government of Russia, and is the first fighting since the revolution last March. The attack by the Russians is said to have been the result of pressure brought to bear through the entente powers, including the United States. Berlin admits the attacks were powerful but says the Russians were compelled to retire before the German fire.

BUENOS AIRES, July 3.—The Argentine government today sent a formal message to its minister to Germany instructing that demands be made upon the German government for immediate reparation for the sinking of the Protegidio. In case Germany fails to act promptly it is believed that a declaration of war will follow.

Jones is in jail at El Paso where he was recently indicted and denied bond for the killing of Col. Thomas Lyons, a wealthy cattleman of Silver City, New Mexico. Lyons was murdered in El Paso and his body thrown in a ditch.

a beautiful stenographer, was one of the most sensational crimes ever committed in the southwest.. Her body was found on the morning of July 28, 1913, lying in a pool of blood in the toilet and vault room of the office of Robinson & Styron, a real estate firm on Field Street, where people were almost continually passing. The murder was committed within a few minutes after the young lady had began the day's work, and after she had been brought to the office by her uncle.

Not only did the officers and detectives fail to find a clue to the mysterious murder, but no motive could be assigned for the crime Many arrests were made, one or two of which were made as the result of parties claiming they killed the girl, but all were released, and the indictment of Jones comes as a great surprise, not only to the public, but the rel atives and close friends of Miss Brown, who have never given up in their effort to locate her slaver.

We Have A Few Foreigners.

Washington, July 2.—Figures issued by the War Department show there are 1,239,179 aliens and 11,923 alien enemies in the United States. In Texas there are 28,029 aliens and 1834 alien enemies
