Jesus Multiplies Himself $\boldsymbol{A}$ plied his own personality A recent book has shown how Harry Hopkins during World War II lived
in the White House as Roosevelt's in the White House as roosevelts personal companion, having living only to carry out the ideas of his
chief. Without Roosevelt, Hopkins would have been little more than
an inferior politician; and without Hopkins, many of Foosevelt's plans could not have been carried out. He enabled the President to be in two
places at once. So was with Jesus places at once. So it was with jesus those twelve to be with him, and then to send them out.
