OPPOSE FREEDOM FOR DEBS; FAVORS BONUS

CONVENTION HALL, Kansas City, Nov. 2.—The American Legion went on record here today in its national convention as being opposed to any clemency for Eugene V. Debs, who is serving a term in the federal penitentiary for violation of the wartime sedition act. The resolution urging that clemency not be given Debs was adopted amid cheers and shouting. The Debs question was a part of the Americanization committee's report.

The Legion adopted a resolution reaffirming the attitude of the last convention relative to adjusted compensation for the former service men.

A resolution castigating Col. George Harvey, American ambassador to Great Britain, for his speech made soon after his arrival in England, was included in the committee reports. The resolution was greeted with cheers and shouts of "you tell 'em."

CONVENTION HALL, Kansas City, Nov. 1.—The American Legion received its wartime commanders, Marshal Ferdinand Foch and General John J. Pershing here today with a welcome fitting to the heroes of the victorious armies. Thousands of delegates and visitors in the convention hall where the American veterans are in a three days session, gave the great military leaders a tumultuous greeting that spoke the affection of the American soldier and the people for the two men.

After hearing the two distinguished visitors the convention adjourned until ten o'clock tomorrow morning in order to permit the delegates and visitors to attend the dedication of the Kansas City memorial to its war dead, and to participate in the big Legion parade this afternoon.

Marshal Foch brought to the Legionnaires his personal declaration of comradeship and from his government he bore official greetings of the Republic of France and the French people. Just the appearance of Marshal Foch on the platform was enough to throw the huge convention hall into a frenzy of applause and acclaim, and General Pershing was given equally as great ovation by the former soldiers who served under him "over there."

The standards of Missouri, Nebraska, Texas, and Pennsylvania were carried to the stage and placed behind General Pershing. The Missouri standard got the honor position, as General Pershing was born in that state. General Pershing extended in behalf of the Legion and his native state, a formal welcome to Marshal Foch. Foch's eyes were filled with tears as he stood with his head bowed during the warm welcome extended to him.

The demonstration given to both the distinguished generals was almost continuous, but after Marshal Foch had completed his address, the big audience ceased all movement and was perfectly quiet as the strains of the 'Marseillaise' filled the hall. The crowd stood at attention while the band played, and when the music ceased pandemonium reigned, the crowd standing up in chairs and giving vent to their feelings.

BALLINGER NEGROES IN JAIL AT LUBBOCK

Two negroes are being held in jail at Lubbock waiting for Ballinger officers to come after them. The negroes are charged with shop-lifting here, it being alleged that they stole goods from Ballinger stores to the amount of more than one hundred dollars.

R. M. Davis, of the Crews country, had business in Ballinger Wednesday. Mr. Davis stated that his well had refused to function and he was hauling water about three miles.

MEXICANS TRIAL BROUGHT HERE

Sheriff Frank Duckworth, of San Angelo, brought Louis and Juan Fitchett to Ballinger from San Angelo Thursday and placed them in the local jail where they will be held until the murder charges against them are disposed of. The cases of murder against the two men have been transferred here from San Angelo on a change of venue, and will come up for trial here next January.

The two men are charged with shooting Jack Burns, night watchman at San Angelo. They have been tried twice and in each case the jury failed to agree, it being reported that eleven of the jurors voted for conviction and one for acquittal. Burns was shot while on duty and when he was shot it is alleged was about to be committed by two men, and the two men in jail here were identified as the men who shot Burns.

When arraigned for trial Louis and Juan Fitchett introduced strong evidence to prove an alibi, witnesses testifying that the two men were at another place at the time of the robbery. The cases being before the district court twice at San Angelo gave such notoriety that a change of venue was granted.

Burns formerly lived at Ballinger, and was engaged in different lines of work here.

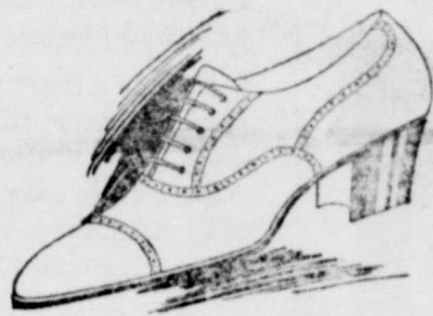
Tax On Beer Would Pay for Soldier Bonus

Mineral Wells tried to get him a few months ago, and he had a tempting offer from a progressive California town, but he turned them down because he liked Ballinger and Ballinger people and has become so intensely interested in the development of the big Colorado valley irrigation project that he declined better offers, and is staking his life on the success of the irrigation enterprise.

GLOOMY OUTLOOK FOR POULTRY

"It is the first time since I have been in the produce business," said E. A. Jeanes Monday, "that there was not a market for poultry." Mr. Jeanes made this statement when a Ledger reporter asked him what the outlook for poultry output was this season. The local dealer stated that his firm was offering ten cents for hens a few days ago, but was not able to turn them at any price, and got out of the market for a few days.

The bad poultry market is attributed to several causes. Cold storage plants are full of poultry. This is an under-consumption, and the decline in other meats has also affected the poultry consumption. The consumption of poultry has dropped off, and at the same time the production has increased. There is an immense poultry crop on hand, and until people begin to buy poultry for their fall dinners, the market will probably lag.

"I expect the turkey market to open up in a few days, and I believe that the price will open around fifteen cents," said Mr. Jeanes. He stated that nobody was selling turkeys yet, and there was no demand for them. He did not anticipate heavy turkey movement for the Thanksgiving season as there is already a large supply on hand of frozen turkey.

Jeanes & Co. operate a dressing plant here and have been shipping dressed turkeys in car lots for the past several seasons, and will operate again this season as soon as the market opens, and they can find an outlet for the Runnels county birds.

Mr. Jeanes stated that there was a good demand for fresh eggs, and the fresh eggs were bringing a good price, but cold storage eggs were going slow. He stated that the supply of cold storage eggs was larger than ever known before.

While poultry has declined, feed has also come down, and most of the poultry growers are in a position to take care of their stock until the market improves.

100 MILES OF HIGHWAY ARE CONTRACTED FOR

AUSTIN, Oct. 29.—The award at Midland, Texas, of the contract for constructing 100 miles of the Bankhead highway, reaching across four counties and involving the expenditure of nearly \$1,000,000, was the largest letting in this federal district and one of the largest in the United States, according to a statement from the state highway department.

The completion of this project will go a long way toward developing the resources of West Texas, the statement said, and in the near future the highway department hopes to complete the remaining links in the Bankhead highway, connecting Texas with El Paso.

The project consists of constructing highway No. 1 through Howard, Martin, Midland and Ector counties. The type is to be an 8 inch gravel surface 16 feet wide on a 24 foot roadbed with standard reinforced concrete structures throughout. Gravel is provided at a 25 acre pit owned jointly by the counties at Big Spring.

With the award of this project following the recent awards in Reeves, Jeff Davis and Hudspeth counties and the work under way in El Paso county, West Texas now has 200 miles under construction and 15 more miles soon to be let in El Paso county.

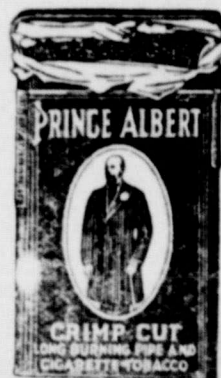

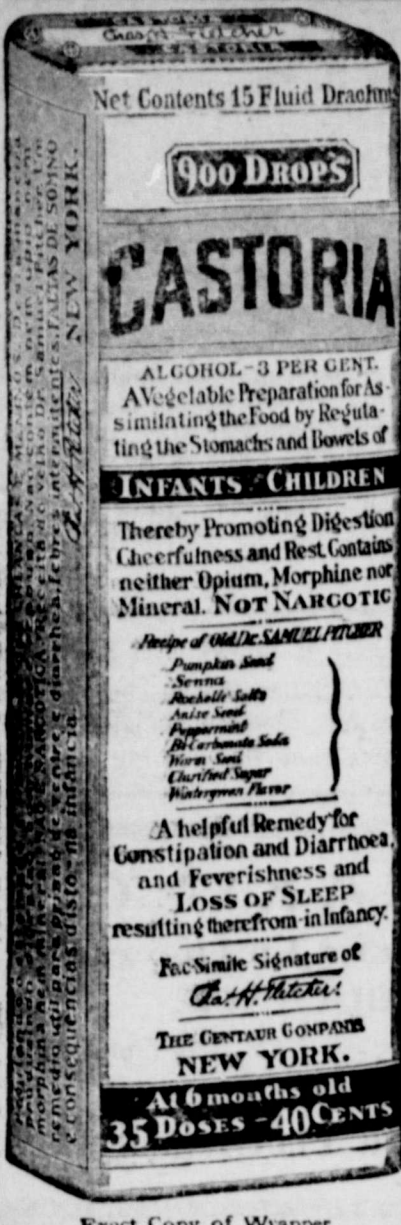

The American Legion and the Ballinger High School played an almost scoreless game yesterday afternoon in one of the worst dust storms of the season. It was thought for awhile that the contest would be postponed until Monday, but a good sized crowd braved the storm and was on the side lines early so the boys went ahead with the game as scheduled. It was almost impossible to use anything but straight line plunges, forward passes being almost impossible to judge in the high wind that was blowing and trying to kick against the wind was a ground loser.

The Legion boys showed a lack of training, only having two days practice before the game, but their weight told in critical times and they managed to push one touchdown over in the third quarter. Simmons for the Legion was a good ground gainer and twice came near getting loose for a touchdown. In the third quarter the Legion got the ball on their own 40 yard line and with line plays and end runs worked the ball to the BHS 30 yard line. Green, playing full-back for the Legion, carried the ball through the line to within a few yards of the goal line, and Flynt playing right-half, carried it over the line for the only touchdown of the game. Penn missed goal by only a few inches. Booth was probably the star for the Legion, being in almost every play, tackling hard and opening a hole in the line every time he was called upon. All the boys did remarkably well for "old decrepids" as they are and some said that it was their first game in over five years.

The High School eleven was far better trained and did the most of their gaining on long end runs. Only one pass was completed during the game, however the aerial route was tried often. No particular one featured on the High School but the team played together as a unit and had it not been for the extra weight against them it would have been a different story.

The kicking of Penn and McAllister both was good.

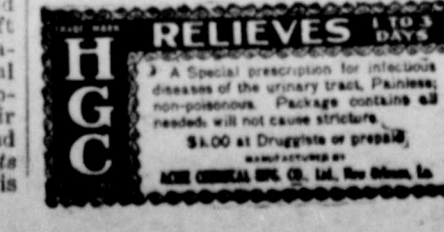

**TO MAKE TEST
SHULTZ WELL**

The Texas-Meers Oil Company well on the W. O. Shultz ranch Southeast of Ballinger is being cleaned out preparatory to going on a pump to test it for its producing value.

The well was shot for the second time Saturday when eighty quarts of nitro-glycerine was touched off in twenty-six feet of sand at a depth of 1390 feet.

The first shot was placed in the well last Tuesday, and following the blow-out gas flowed at an estimated push of 1,000,000 cubic feet daily, and a good showing of oil was made. It is believed that the well will pump at least fifty barrels of oil per day, and if it does the field will be rapidly opened, as the oil is of a high-grade, and found at that depth can be produced at a good profit.

This well is located about four miles West of Millersview. It is known as Shultz No. 3, as two former tests were made in the same neighborhood, both of which offered such encouragement as to cause the drilling of the third well. The well is only a few miles South of the Russell field in this county, and on the opposite side of the river, which indicates that the oil field extends South from the big field further North of here, and sooner or later another big field will be discovered.

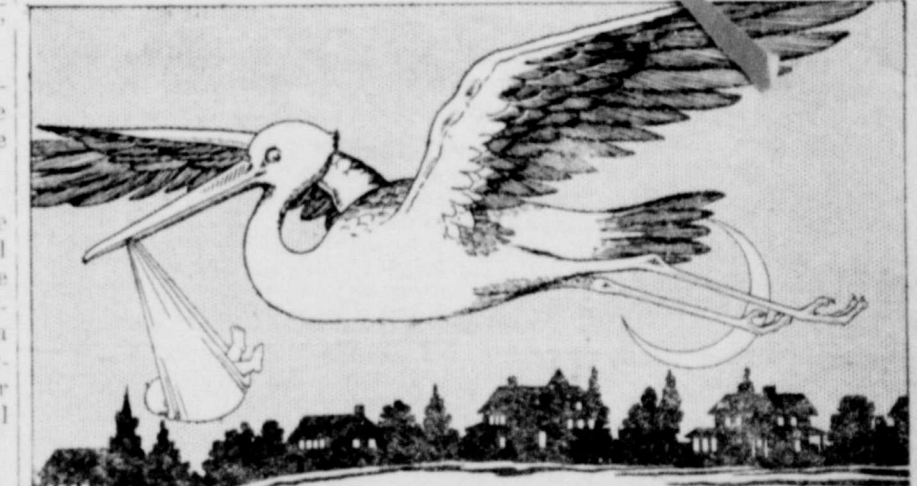
naval aides, received Foch in the blue room. The marshal's program for the day included a call on former President Wilson.

SHULTZ WELL FULL OF OIL

The 1390 foot hole of the Shultz well, near Millesview, is standing 1,000 feet in a fine grade of oil, according to a phone message from W. O. Shultz to John A. Weeks Monday night. Mr. Shultz reported that this oil flowed through the bridge in the well, after the bridge-over had occurred from shooting the well last Saturday. After eighty quarts of nitro had been touched off in the well last Saturday, gas flow amounting to 1,000,000 cubic feet developed, and as the drillers were arranging to clean out the hole preparatory to putting it under pump, the hole almost filled up with oil.

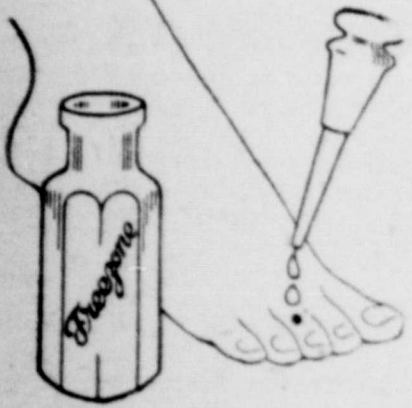
Work began immediately to drill through the bridge, and much interest is being manifested in what may develop after the bridge is drilled out.

This is the third well put down on the Shultz ranch and was drilled by the Texas-Meers Co. At practically the same depth in all the wells a good showing of oil was found, and this well is creating more excitement than either of the others, and scouts are looking for it to show up good, and if a paying producer will open the field for further development.

A number of local citizens who are interested in oil development were arranging to visit the well Tuesday to see for themselves just how the development was progressing.

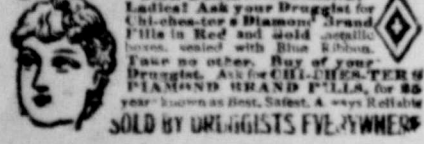

NEW CITY PLANT ALMOST READY

The question of whether the people of Ballinger will support their own light and power plant will be tested out soon. The current will be shot into the wires much sooner than at first expected, as much better progress has been made on the new plant than the most optimistic dreamed.

One of the new engines was tested out Wednesday afternoon and the engineers said "she hit perfect." The other engine will be tested in a few days, and then the connections made and the plant given several days test out before light and power consumers are notified that the city "juice" is ready for them.

Just as fast as the work can be done the city electricians will call on the consumers who want to connect with the city's plant, and make the transfer for them. It will be necessary in practically every case in the residence district to rewire the connections, changing the entrance from the front to the rear, as the city's line comes in from the alley. This change will not cost the consumer anything, the city making all necessary changes in transferring from one line to the other without cost to the consumer.

The back door entrance will be an improvement within itself. It takes the wires from the front yard and from the front of the house, and brings them in from the rear. About eighty per cent of the light and power consumers of the city have contracted to use the city's current.

REV. SIMPSON CLOSING YEAR'S WORK HERE

Rev. E. C. Simpson, pastor of the Methodist church, is completing his year's work here, next Sunday being the last service under his first year's ministry, and the pastor announces that for the closing service Sunday night a regular old time "love feast" will be observed. Rev. W. H. Doss will have charge of this service. Rev. Simpson will leave Monday for Cisco, where he goes to attend the Central Texas conference, and where he will receive assignment of work for another year.

Rev. Simpson came here a year ago, and has worked faithfully for the upbuilding of the Methodist church. As a closing part of his year's work almost forty new members were added at the close of the revival last week. He and his family have made many friends here who would be glad to see the conference assign him to the pastorate here for another year.

ANGELO BACKS IRRIGATION DAM

(San Angelo Standard) San Angelo's quota of \$500 toward the \$4,000 expense necessary to complete the preliminary survey of the Colorado river irrigation project has been raised by committees representing the Board of City Development and the Kiwanis Club.

What San Angelo business interests have come to think of the project that is intended to make fertile 200,000 acres of land in three counties was indicated in the fact that only four hours was taken up in circulating the subscription lists. The drive followed endorsement of the irrigation plan by both the Kiwanis and the civic board and an address before the Kiwanians on Tuesday by Stuart L. Williams, of Ballinger, secretary of the irrigation association, who outlined the advantages that will accrue to San Angelo and this section generally.

The dam proposed will connect bluffs on opposite sides of the Colorado river, three miles above Bronte, will be 2,800 feet long, 100 feet high, and will form a lake 27 miles in length, placing 406,000 acre feet under water. The watershed of the river above the proposed dam site is estimated to embrace 8,000 square miles, while engineers have calculated the annual flow at 600,000 acre feet. The cost of the dam and the main canals will probably be around 3 1/2 million dollars, which may be raised by voting irrigation bonds maturing in 30 to 40 years.

Former Citizen Tells of Conditions In Germany

(Ranger Daily Times) negotiate any trips in these countries because of the heavy duty on baggage coming and going. Traveling in Germany at the present time, he explained, is quite an undertaking, because of the restrictions of the French who insist on holding up and searching all trains as they leave the stations. German railroads, he said, are in good condition and many of the great locomotives which the Germans were forced to turn over to France under the treaty have been returned on being found too heavy for the French road beds.

Taxes throughout Germany are enormous and Buchwald pointed out that in addition to the income taxes and commodity taxes and others similar to those in this country there is the heavy "turnover" tax which merchants and all dealers must pay on the turnover of their stock, regardless as to whether they made a profit or suffered a loss. In the manufacture of clothes in Germany, he said, that was excessive taxation, the exporter of wool, the carder, the spinner, garment makers, jobbers and retailers all being taxed 3 per cent of the value of their product.

It is the landlord and not the tenant in Germany who is the goat, Buchwald said. Rent increases have been limited by law to 35 per cent, while the expenses of maintaining the property have no limit, and are rapidly becoming excessive. One Austrian chemist told Buchwald that the rent from his property was barely paying for the cost of sewage disposal and that he was forced to stand a loss of approximately 7 per cent for the privilege of owning the property. Because of the high prices all building has stopped in the country and the housing conditions Buchwald characterizes as the worst in Europe. Although salaries have advanced over 600 per cent, the cost of living has mounted many times higher, he said, and consequently there was great unrest.

Buchwald was in Berlin in August, when Erzberger was killed, and witnessed the Socialist parade during which the shopkeepers and merchants barricaded their houses. "Socialism is gaining strength in the country and the government will not be able to maintain itself much longer for lack of an army, and power to enforce its mandates. Unless the allies take a hand, socialism, communism and worse will result," he asserted. The country is not being aided by the influx of Americans, the Germans claim, on the grounds that benefits are derived from their presence are offset by the increase in living that comes from the disregard of expenses.

Buchwald brought back from Germany quite a collection of carved and hand-painted ivory pendants, necklaces and figures, including minute mice and elephants, carved and polished with the closest attention to detail. The duty on these articles, he explained, ran from 50 to 60 per cent. The collection has been placed on sale locally. Carved and hand-painted ivory in the form of pendants, necklaces and brooches, Buchwald said is quite the rage abroad and practically all women returning on the S. S. Mount Clay recently, wore ivory "jewelry" in some form. Buchwald sailed for Germany on July 7 with his wife and child for his first visit to Germany in sixteen years. water is not the best in the world
for drinking. So far the city
water supply continues to flow,
and the city authorities have
given out nothing to indicate
that the water will be cut off
soon.

**State Guarantees Fund
to Complete Survey Work**

There was near shouting in the office of the Young Men's
Business League Wednesday, when a letter was received from the
Board of Water Engineers of Texas, in which the board stated
that the chief topographic engineer had been directed to proceed
with the work here through the months of December and Janu-
ary. The letter was addressed to Stuart L. Williams, Secretary
of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association, and says in part:

"The Board has this day re-
quested Mr. Birdseye, Chief Topo-
graphic Engineer, U. S. G. S., to
continue the work on the Colo-
rado Valley irrigation project
through the months of December
and January, and has guaranteed
that the State will furnish the
funds up to \$2,000 for this work.
We shall depend on you raising
more than the one thousand dol-
lars you have pledged, because
we will be sorely cramped in
furnishing the full \$2,000 needed
above the \$1,000. But we are
so much interested in your pro-
ject that if affairs come to the
worst we will strain a point and
raise the full amount of \$2,000.
The state and federal govern-
ments are offering every aid pos-
sible in carrying on the survey
work, and every day brings the
most optimistic news from the

big project. It is up to the citi-
zens of this section of the coun-
try to do everything possible,
and not leave a stone unturned
for developing what promises to
be the largest irrigation project
in the Southwest.
San Angelo has just raised \$500
for financing the work on the
project, and the Ballinger com-
mittee has hope of receiving a
nice appropriation from the San-
ta Fe Railroad. Representatives
from the Santa Fe recently went
over the field and they were de-
lighted with what they saw. It
will be remembered that Ballinger
recently put up liberally to
help create a \$4,000 fund to meet
an equal amount appropriated by
the United States Geological
Survey board for the big propo-
sition.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—
Congressman Thomas L. Blanton,
Democrat from Texas, in a
letter to Speaker Gillett, read
this afternoon before members of
the House, apologized for insert-
ing in the Congressional Record
words which were considered ob-
jectionable, and for which he
was censured yesterday by vote
of the House.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—
The House of Representa-
tives today voted to censure
through direct public reprimand
Congressman Thos. L. Blanton,
of Texas, after the resolution to
expel the Texas representative had
failed by the narrow margin
of eight votes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—
The resolution calling for the ex-
pulsion of Representative Thom-
as L. Blanton from congress was
called up today by Representa-
tive Mondell, Republican leader
in the House. New efforts were
started immediately to have all
factions agree upon a resolution
of censure for the Texas con-
gressman instead of asking for his
expulsion.

A resolution offering a vote of
censure as a substitute for the
resolution of expulsion was pro-
posed by Representative Garrett,
of Tennessee, after Mr. Blanton
had made a dramatic defense of
his action before the House. The
resolution offered by Mr. Gar-
rett proposed that the speaker
be directed to reprimand Mr.
Blanton publicly before the bar
of the House.

Republican leader Mondell
asked for the adoption of his
resolution, saying that charges
of such character should not be
presented on the floor of the
House. "Blanton's action in this
matter is a crime against decen-
cy, done deliberately, without re-
gard to law or honor of the
House," Mondell said, in con-
cluding his speech against Blanton.

In the course of his address in
defending himself against Mon-
dell's attack, Blanton said "with
God as my witness I had no in-
tention other than the protection
of citizens in their rights, in ex-
posing just what was taking
place in the government print-
ing office."

Blanton declared that a New
York lawyer informed him that
the Congressional Record carry-
ing the matter to which Mondell
objected to was not unmailable.
The galleries were crowded,
many visitors being women,
when the House convened to
take up the resolution.

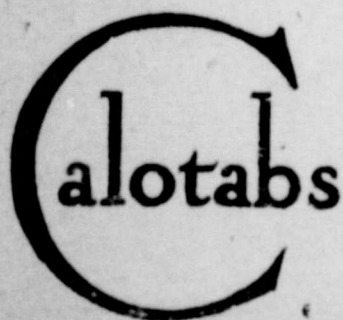

SEEKS BOND FOR MEX. PRISONERS

OFFERS AID TO SHERIFF MILLER

Judge A. K. Doss returned home Saturday from Brownwood, where he had been in a conference with other counsel representing Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, who will be arraigned for trial on a charge of killing Tom Bengie, Concho county stockman, when court convenes in Brownwood on December 5th. The case was transferred from Paint Rock to Brownwood by Judge Woodward. In speaking of the coming trial, and the visit of the attorneys to Brownwood, the Bulletin says:

"Walter C. Woodward of Coleman, one of the attorneys representing Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, who is to be tried here December 5th on charge of venue from the Concho county district court, was here today with his client and Judge A. K. Doss, of Ballinger, who also represents Mr. Miller. They came here for a conference with Judge Will J. Scott, of this city, a third member of Sheriff Miller's counsel. Mr. Miller will be tried on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of Tom Bengie, Concho county ranchman, a few weeks ago.

"When asked this morning about the Miller case, Mr. Woodward said, 'It would not be proper for me to say anything about the facts in the case, as the facts will be fully developed and will completely clear Mr. Miller of any wrong.' Mr. Woodward, however, said that in addition to being sheriff of Concho county, Mr. Miller was a former Texas ranger with Captain Fox of Brownwood and is widely known throughout the western and southwestern portions of the state.

"In years past, Sheriff Miller was an intimate friend and worked with William S. Hart of movie fame, on a ranch in Arizona, and has recently received a letter from Hart offering any assistance he can give," Mr. Woodward said.

"The Miller trial is expected to attract to Brownwood a large number of Concho and Runnels county people who are interested in the case."

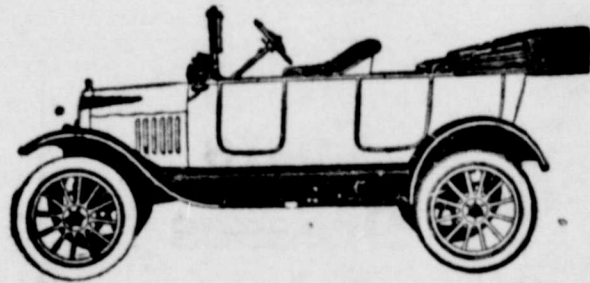

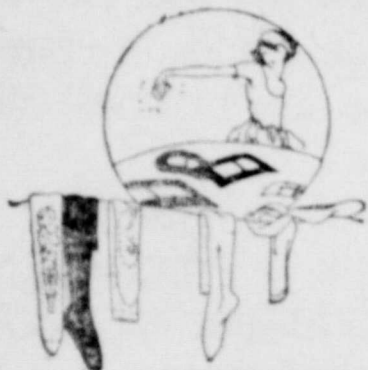

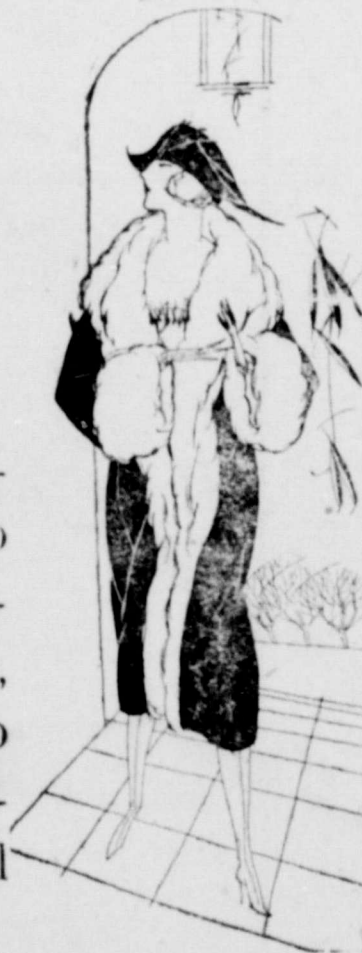
