Realignment sends Wheelly cold Muleshoe north into District 1-3A

Help wanted: Travel agent to coordinate long road trips for local high school team. Must be familiar with the northern Panhandle.

The ad might be a little drastic, but Muleshoe is facing some monster road trips after being moved to District 1-3A as part of the bi-annual University Interscholastic League realignment announced Thursday.

Muleshoe, plus current 2-3A teams Friona and Dimmitt moved north, joining current 1-3A teams Amarillo River Road, Perryton, Dalhart, Sanford-Fritch and Tulia in an eight-team district.

Muleshoe, the southern most team in the district, faces four trips of two hours (one way) or longer. Perryton is a 440-mile round trip.

"It was a shock to us," MISD Superintendent Bill Moore said Friday morning. "We thought we'd be in an eight-team district, but we didn't think we'd be in the one we're in."

A petitioned that would have allowed Muleshoe to remain in District 2-3A was voted down Friday. Under UIL rules, Muleshoe needed a unanimous vote by all 15 school representatives from both districts to remain in District 2-3A. Atleast one school voted against the petition, Moore said.

Moore said that the amount of classroom time students would miss was the reason he petitioned the districts.

Moore said he would explore the possibility of playing

some football and basketball games on Saturdays.

Acting athletic director and head football coach Randy Adair said he didn't see much difference in the quality of competition within the new district.

"Basketball-wise, it might be a little tougher," Adair said. "Football-wise, it'll probably be a little more competitive. There's no Littlefield, but there are four or five good teams."


There are still specifics to be worked out after the realign-

Decisions like will they diwide the district basketball season into two halves like they did a few years back and what happens with the sub-varsity and junior high programs because of the traveling distance?

District schedules will be set in the next three weeks. The realignment will start in the fall.

Floydada and Littlefield remain in District 2-3A, combining with current 5-3A teams Brownfield, Seminole, Denver City, Slaton, Lubbock Cooper and Lubbock Roosevelt. Shal-

MISD narrows in on football coach

Three in-house candidates are among the nine finalists for the position of head football coach and athletic director at Muleshoe High School.

Boys basketball coach Ralph Mason, defensive coordinator Donnie Wiley and Watson Junior High athletic coordinator Ted Johnson are the current Muleshoe Independent School District employees among the finalists.

The short list, pared down from 72, also includes Johnny Burleson of Crane High School, Rex Cumpton, of Sanford High School, Jay McWilliams of Harper High School and Dewayne Osborne of Post High School, all currently head football coaches and athletic directors; plus Randall High School offensive coordinator David Wood and Hereford High School assistant head coach Craig Yenzer.

The nine finalists were selected Wednesday night by six-member screening comittee. The finalists will be brought in for interviews in the next week.

MISD Superintendent Bill Moore, who heads the comittee, said he could make a hiring recommendation as soon the next school board meeting Feb. 12.

"We're very pleased with our pool of candidates," Moore said. "We feel confi-

dent that whoever we hire will lead the program forward."

Moore said communication skills were a high priority among attributes the committee was looking for in a new coach/athletic director.

"The ability to communicate with students, parents and the community is important," Moore said. "And the ability to recruit and keep kids in the program."

The new coach/athletic director will replace Randy Adair, who resigned in November following an 0-10 season. Adair, the 29th coach in Muleshoe's less-than-storied 70 years of football, was 8-32 in his four seasons at Muleshoe.

MAPLE—Josh Tooley and Merideth Potts had a big day at the Three Way School Junior Livestock Show Jan. 27.


Tooley had the grand champion steer and Lamb, while Potts had the grand champion swine and the reserve grand champion steer.

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Jump-starting education

Muleshoe program provides headstart for underpriviledged

South Plains Headstart and Professional Educational Services (SHAPES) of Muleshoe provides a learning environment that prepares children for school.

The program, which has been in Muleshoe four years, exposes children to a large variety of educational concepts, something often missing in economically disadvantaged homes.

There are work/study/play stations all around the room, with bi-lingual Spanish/English identification tags placed on toys and equipment.

Although children in the program are predominantly Hispanic, SHAPES is open to all children ages 3 to 5, based on economic need.

Complete healthcare is provided, including dental care: "We're on top of things," said Nina Agundes, the director of the headstart program, which is next door to the Community Action adult education center on American Boulevard.

Current funding allows only 12 children, and there is a long waiting list to fill their spots, Agundes said.

Manuela Camarillo, who comes with her daughter Miranda to the learning center on Friday mornings, recently

helped Agundes as children moleled clothes of many cultures during a multicultural

Arturo and Mary Garcia also serve as volunteers while their son Antonio attends the program. Antonio's sister Isadora will qualify for the program next year.

Unlike many center-based headstart programs, SHAPES is a home-based learning program which actively involves parents in the planning stages of their children's education.

SHAPES parents have a meeting once a month to help plan the lessons, provide materials and keep informed about what their children are learn-

And Agundes makes home visits on Tuesdays, as well as coordinating the group learning sessions on Friday mornings from 8:30 a.m. until noon.

Similar programs are functioning in Amherst, Littlefield, Denver City, Plains, Lubbock and Plainview.

SHAPES parents from the

various communities attend parent labs in Levelland twice a month to learn about money management, nutrition, and child abuse prevention. An English as a Second Language (ESL) program for SHAPES parents is planned.

Agundes hopes the facility will soon also serve as a daycare center for the children of adult students at the Community Action center next door.

Bradley, Dimmitt bomb Lady Mules

Loss leaves MHS on ropes in 2-3A

Carrie Bradley and the Dimmitt Bobbies put a serious crimp in Muleshoe's chances of making the state playoffs.

Bradley scored a career-high 33 points as the Bobbies destroyed Muleshoe, 66-48, Friday in a District 2-3A game at WJHS gym.

The loss drops the Lady Mules (19-9 overall, 4-4 in district) into fourth place, two games behind second-place Dimmitt (6-2) and three games behind league-leading Friona (7-1) with two games left in the season. Dimmitt beat Muleshoe, 57-56 in overtime earlier this season.

Littlefield is third at 5-3. The top two teams qualify for the state playoffs.

Friona beat cellar-dwelling Floydada, 51-25, Friday and Littlefield rallied past Shallowater, 68-59, scoring 29 points in the fourth quarter.

"My dad tells me I like to hide in corners," said Bradley, a 5-9 junior. "Sometimes I hide too much. I like to be sneaky."

Bradley came out of hiding often enough to hit four momentum-changing 3-pointers and was devastating as a finisher on the fastbreak.

"I don't know what it is," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said after the Lady Mules dropped their third district game in four outings. "It's not hustle, because we are doing that."

Allyson Field led Muleshoe with 13 points and Brandi Harrison finished with 12.

Bradley scored eight straight points in a 9-0 run late in the second quarter, helping Dimmitt (13-14) take a 34-26 halftime lead. Bradley hit two mortar-shot 3-pointers and a pull-up 10footer on the fastbreak after a Muleshoe turn-

After a slow start (which ended up being a devastating pattern all night), Muleshoe rallied to tie the game at 22 with three minutes and 21 seconds left in the half when Allyson Field scored on an offensive rebound.

Muleshoe trailed by as much as seven, 16-9, late in the first quarter.

Muleshoe also struggled in the first four minutes of the third and fourth quarters, killing any chances of a comeback.


"We had chance to get back into the game in the third quarter, but we hit another streak where we just couldn't score," Gruhlkey said. "We couldn't find anybody in a grove. We couldn't find anybody to give it to."

Muleshoe shot 1 of 6 and had four turnovers on its first four possessions of the third quarter, this during probably the only stretch in the game Dimmitt was struggling.

Muleshoe got within 38-32 with 2:30 left in the third quarter, but Dimmitt straddled the third and fourth quarters with 3-pointers.

Amy Ethridge (10 points) hit a 3-point bomb with five second left in the third quarter. Bradley hit her third 3-pointer on the Bobbies first pos-

Mules fail to slow Dimmitt

Muleshoe got stuck in low gear and could only sit by and watch helplessly as No. 7 Dimmitt raced to a 79-35 District 2-3A win Friday at WJHS gym.

Muleshoe had success early by spreading the floor and was Dimmitt half-court trap. leading 11-9 with two minutes

Dimmitt, which idled through the first six minutes, ran off a 9-0 spurt to end the quarter and grabbed an 18-11 lead. Muleshoe never got out of the slowdown mode.

Dimmitt (25-6 overall, 8-0 in district) reeled off the first six points of the second quarter with Muleshoe stuck on 11.

It didn't any prettier.

The Bobcats led 37-15 at the half, and stretched their lead to 60-24 after three quar-

After the first quarter, Muleshoe (5-21, 1-7) became tentative on offense, playing right into the hands of an aggressive

"I thought it would give us a bit of a chance," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said about spreading the floor and trying to control the pace. "I was just trying to make them feel like they've got a chance. I just wish we could have stayed a little closer a little longer."

Senior wing Josh Slayden was the early catalyst for Muleshoe, hitting a 3-pointer from the corner and dumping the ball down to Jesse Gonzales for an easy bucket as Muleshoe took a 5-2 lead.

Freshman point guard Carlton Lewis made it 9-6 when he stole an outlet pass under the basket and convert. Freshman post Dustin Cleavinger's 8-foot bank shot gave the Mules their last lead,

Then Dimmitt started turning every Muleshoe mistake into points.

"They're just good," Mason said. "They have as good a shot as anybody in the (Region I) to make the state tournament."

Chad Ellis led Dimmitt with

Hill takes over solid BB program

Brad Hill knows what pitch to throw with a 2-2 count and first base open. He knows he wants to make the hit-and-run a big part of Muleshoe High School's offense.

What Hill isn't sure about is the organizational and disciplinary aspects associated with being a head coach for the first time.

Hill replaces Ted Leps. Leps, now the baseball coach at Brownfield, piloted Muleshoe to a school-record 20-7 record, and District 2-3A and bi-district titles last spring.

"A lot of it is how you treat the kids. It's how you relate to the kids, how they relate to you and what you can get out of them," said Hill, who coached and played with LCU coach Daren Hays. "I think that's more important than X's and O's."

Twenty-eight players showed up for practice Monday, and Hill expects about a dozen more when basketball season ends.

Most of this week was spent getting the players in baseball shape. Hill believes in a lot of running to keep the legs in shape. He's also emphasizing proper throwing and hitting mechanics.

Hill said he's taken bits and pieces from his coaches, and sort of molded his own philosophy.

"Basic fundamentals is the key to success in high school," said Hill, who pitched the NAIA College World Series and was a two-time all-state pitcher at Portales High School (N.M.). "You've got to shoot it straight and keep it simple."

Hill inherits five returning starters, including district player of the year candidate John Embry, and a solid program developed under Leps.

"I think coach Leps built a pretty good foundation," Hill said. "They played some good baseball and it has filtered off into the community. The kids have a pretty good knowledge of the game."

Muleshoe will scrimmage Brownfield (Feb. 17) and Littlefield (Feb. 20) at home before opening the season Feb. 23 against Lubbock Cooper.

The Mules will play 18 games and three tournaments. And for the first time, all the District 2-3A teams will field JV schedules.

Muleshoe, as has been of late, didn't learn from its mistakes.


The Lady Mules continually tried to force the ball inside against Dimmitt's packedin zone.

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
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

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

Pep grad warns of troubles

When Fernando "Junior" Rodriguez of Muleshoe spoke at his own graduation from Pep High School recently, he told the other students that if he could do it, anyone can.

He told them to leave the bad influences in their lives and commit to getting an education.

It was the same advice his parents had given him as an 8-year-old who wandered the streets of Littlefield at night until 1:30 a.m. with an older crowd.

Junior traced the steps that took him into and away from the bad influences in his life:

"It started at home with talking back to my parents and making them feel bad," he said. "That led to talking back to my teachers and getting kicked out of school for fighting. I had a lot of anger."

Junior said he started running with the kids who lived across the tracks. "I was hanging around with big bad stuff. I figured if I hung around with them, I'd get a

reputation. It led me to nothing but trouble." In the beginning, they just played baseball together, he said. Then they started smoking and drinking:

"I didn't like it. I thought, 'How can people smoke and drink? It's nasty.' But I found myself doing it-I answered my own question. It's a hard habit to quit."

The next step was trouble with the law: "My probation officer told me socially unacceptable behavior begins at home, and I should be nice to my parents. I wish Ihad taken his advice sooner—some people have to learn the hard way."

Junior said that if it hadn't been for his parents and grandparents, who pushed him every morning to go to school, he would have been a dropout.

The apostle Paul also deals with death realistically. "Death," Paul says, "is swallowed up in victory" (1 Corinthians 15:54) and he points to the open tomb to prove it.

Death, then, for the Christian becomes not the end of life but the ultimate change, the final transformation, the great metamorphosis, the hallway into a vast eternal life already begun in Christ.

Paul tells us a mystery. He points to the metamorphosis: "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet; for the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed" (1 Corinthians 15:51-52).






