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TWO BIG DAYS FOR SCHOOLS

Next Friday and Saturday will be big days in Ballinger, and those interested in school work will see all the schools of Runnels county here in literary and athletic contests. There are about 54 schools in the county and each school will have representatives here for these two days to compete in the county interscholastic meet. The winners in each event will represent this county at the district meet at San Angelo on April 7th and 8th.

It is expected that each school will send anywhere from twelve to 75 people here to attend the meet and on Saturday many patrons of the different schools are looked for to be here to boost for their teams.

Friday afternoon and night will be taken up with the literary program and the sessions will be held in the First Christian Church. The public is invited to attend all these events. Preliminaries will be held in the afternoon and the finals the same night.

Saturday will be devoted to athletic contests. These will be held on the old baseball grounds near the home of R. A. Nicholson and during the day various events will be going on at the same time.

Patrons and students from the various school districts will come early Saturday and bring their dinners and at the noon hour a picnic dinner will be enjoyed on the court house lawn.

At one o'clock a parade will be staged on the streets with all schools participating, and according to officials in charge of this feature they are expecting to stage one of the biggest parades ever held in Ballinger. Immediately after the parade the athletic events will continue until the county champions are determined.

Ballinger May Be Placed on Proposed Federal Highway

The Young Men's Business League of Ballinger in co-operation with the towns of Paint Rock, Wingate, Sweetwater, Snyder and Post, has on foot a move to develop a Corpus Christi to Panhandle Highway thru San Antonio, Lubbock and the above cities.

The secretary of the local commercial organization, with Geo. Sheppard of Sweetwater, Harvey Ratchford of Paint Rock, and Senator Buchanan, of Snyder, appeared before the State Highway Department Monday armed with petitions from the cities interested asking the department to designate the stretch from Ballinger to Blackwell as a state highway, thus linking both ends of the cross-state road. While the Highway Department is adverse to designating new highways, this move has the endorsement of J. E. Pirie, highway engineer for this district.

The Y. M. B. L. has been at work for several weeks lining up the towns affected in order to present a solid front before the commission. The gist of the arguments presented is that the road

FEED MILL NEW BUSINESS HERE

The Economy Milling Company is a new enterprise in Ballinger, and was put in operation a few days ago in the building formerly occupied by the Gustavus grocery store on Eighth Street.

E. A. Jeanes, of this city, and Ed Bailey, of Brownwood, are the organizers of the new company, and they have installed machinery for grinding and mixing all kinds of feed for live stock and poultry, as well as installing a grist mill for manufacturing meal and also a whole wheat flour mill.

In addition to operating the mills and working up farmers' products for them, the new company proposes to do a general exchange and sales business, carrying a large stock of feeds of all kinds, and will buy and sell in any quantity.

Mr. Jeanes stated that they expected to place on the market a chick feed which would equal any and which would meet competition on feeds manufactured elsewhere. Mr. Bailey has been in the feed business in Brownwood for quite awhile, and he comes to Ballinger to make his home.

\$500,000 OIL FIRE AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Mar. 22.—Officials of the Humble Company estimated today that their loss in yesterday's fire amounted to more than half a million dollars. Two oil reservoirs destroyed are estimated to have contained approximately 350,000 barrels of oil, valued at the above amount.

City to Vote on \$75,000 Street and Water Bonds

After ordering an election Wednesday for the issuance of \$25,000 worth of water works bonds, the city commission met again Thursday morning and ordered an election for the issuance of \$50,000 worth of street paving bonds. Both questions will be submitted to the voters in an election to be held on April 18th.

The question is now up to the citizens to put up or shut up, and back the commission in its efforts to solve the water problem and improve the streets which are a disgrace to the city, or continue to use the rough streets and suffer the loss which will come to the city for its failure to improve them.

Quite a number of business men and heavy tax payers met with the commission and urged that the commission to act and act quickly in pushing the street paving. Two plans for financing the street paving were discussed. The bond issue seemed to be the most feasible, or least met with the majority approval of those present.

The other plan of financing the work provides for direct taxation—the levying of a tax sufficiently large to create a ready fund to begin the work at once by borrowing the money, or issuing warrants until next tax paying time, when the tax levy would take care of the outstanding warrants.

Under the present law governing cities of this size, which was amended two years ago, the City Commission has authority to increase the tax rate to \$1.50 on the hundred dollars. The present rate is 65 cents on the hundred dollars, and this could give the city an increase of 85 cents or more than double the present rate, and create an annual fund of about \$45,000.

The commission deemed it wise to issue bonds and scatter the cost out over a period of years instead of calling on the people to pay the bill on one or two years.

The streets in the business district have stood as long as they can be used without subjecting the city to serious damage, and they must be fixed, and if the voters reject the bond issue, the commission will have to go the limit on taxation and raise the money by a heavy tax levy.

District Highway Engineer Pirie met with the commission Wednesday afternoon, and discussed the different characters of paving, cost, etc., and it was the opinion of all present that a permanent grade of paving, C. Jones.

either brick or cement should be put down, and the bond issue called for will cover about ten blocks and the intersections of streets.

It was pointed out by the engineer that a big saving could be made on street paving as the city already had a good base, the crushed rock macadam forming a perfect base, and all that is necessary is to level it up and lay the finished surface covering. The base is deteriorating fast and unless the paving is done now it will cost the city a great deal more later.

This is a work which should have been put on foot several months ago, and the city would have had the funds to carry on the work during the present period of depression and surplus of idle labor, giving labor something to do and stimulating business at a time when it is sorely needed.

It only requires a majority vote to carry the bond issue, and it is expected to be put over with little opposition. The women, who are property owners, or community property owners with their husbands, and who are otherwise qualified to vote, will be entitled to vote in the bond issue election.

51 INDICTMENTS IN BANK FAILURE

OKMULGEE, Okla., Mar. 22.—John P. Cook, prominent oil man, and John B. Rebold, oil and lumber operator, were arrested today on indictments returned by the grand jury after an investigation of bank failures in this county. Cook was president of the Guaranty State Bank which merged with the defunct Bank of Commerce, and Rebold was vice-president.

Fifty-one warrants were delivered to Sheriff Sowers today by the district clerk for the arrest of persons named in twenty-three indictments returned last night by the grand jury after an investigation of the failure of the Bank of Commerce here.

RANGERS GUARD NEGRO MURDERER

Barker and wife, and Homer Turk, a thirteen year old neighbor boy, at Concord, on the night of Feb. 11th, from Waxahachie to Waco today. The trial of the negroes has been set for tomorrow. Six rangers will guard the court against possible violence after the negroes are brought here.

The two negroes made a confession when arrested, and detailed how they went to the home of Barker to rob him, and killed him and his wife and the boy who had gone there to play dominoes with the Barkers. A four-year old girl escaped by being in bed, where she remained alone throughout the night.

RABBIT SCALPS JUMP TO 23,387

It is now estimated that a two months' war on rabbits in this county will net 50,000 rabbits, instead of 25,000 as was first predicted.

County Clerk Forgy issued warrants for 2,863 scalps last Saturday, bringing the grand total to date up to 23,387, and the campaign does not close until April 15th.

Quite a number who have participated in drives declare that not more than fifty per cent of the rabbits killed are scalped, and on this basis more than 50,000 have been killed to date. This represents a wonderful saving to the farmers of the county, and if neighboring counties would wage such a war the pest would be exterminated for the time being at least.

MILES TO HAVE BANK SOON

Accord to unofficial announcement a new bank will be opened at Miles within the next week or ten days. The report says that the organizers of the new bank have rented the old Runnels County Bank building, where they will open for business until the building which was recently destroyed by fire can be rebuilt.

The new bank is to have a capital stock of \$75,000, all of which has been subscribed and paid in, and the bank examiner who has been in charge of the Miles National Bank since that institution closed its doors on February 1st, is adjusting the accounts of the old bank preparatory to the new bank taking charge.

It is reported here that satisfactory settlement has been made with all the creditors, including the depositors of the old institution, and that the new bank will open in good shape, ranking with any first class bank and under new management.

The officers and directors of the new bank will be elected within the next few days, and all the affairs of the old bank transferred to the new bank, and it is expected that the financial depression which has been reigning in Miles since the Miles National closed a few weeks ago, will soon be a thing of the past, and business will be greatly revived.

7,952,539 BALES IS FINAL U. S. REPORT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—Cotton production for last year was 7,976,663 running bales, or 7,952,539 equivalent to 500 pound bales, according to the census bureau in announcing the final ginning report for the season.

The production for 1920 was 13,270,000 running bales, or 13,429,600 bales equivalent to 500 pounds each.

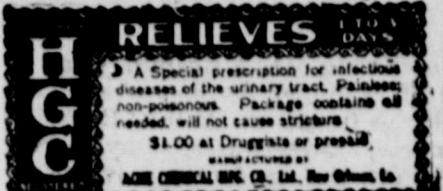

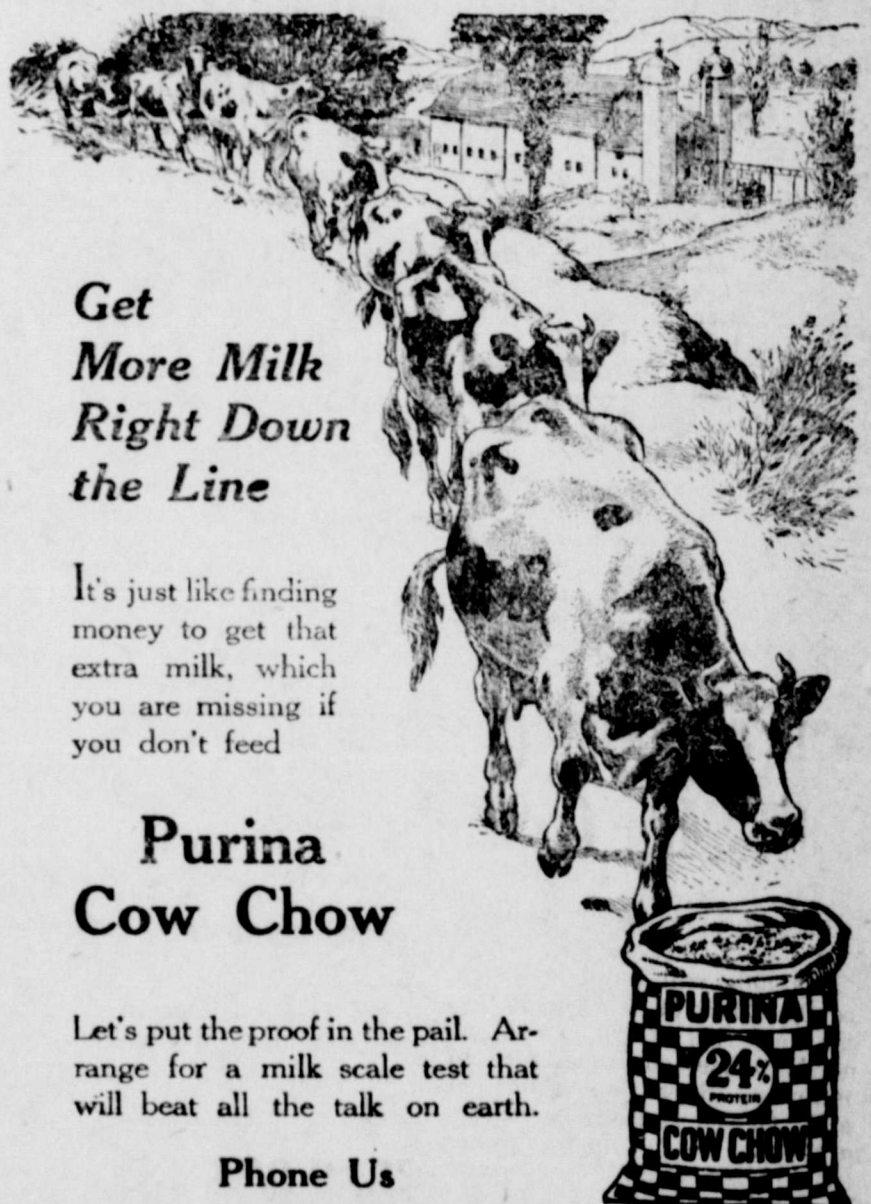
PRESBYTERIANS TO MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

Indians Cremate Man Tied to Wagon; Many Scalped

(By M. L. Johnson)

The following account of Indian warfare is too horrible to go in print, but it is a part of Texas history and should be recorded, and it shows accurately what scenes of hardships the early settlers had to endure long before this country was made safe for peaceful settlers.

The Indians knew no rules in war—their only object in view was to kill, scalp, torture and steal.

In the spring of each year it was customary for all the cattle-men to round up all the cattle they could find and mark and brand all "mavericks" (unbranded young stock cattle), in his own mark and brand, and by so doing, he became the legal owner, and every spring they would go at it in a hurry.

During the spring of 1870 Hittson and his entire force of cow-punchers had finished branding the young cattle—turned them loose and were rounding up beef cattle to drive to Denver, Colo., where he had at that time a ranch at Deer Trail, about 50 miles East from Denver.

As late as 1870 we were well armed with Winchester rifles and all the Colts six-shooters we could well carry for we well knew that we were likely to need them at any moment, day or night.

Our first round-up was to be up in Young county in the vicinity of old Fort Belknap, so we pushed forward, rounding up cattle as we went North from Callahan county.

We had rounded up about 500 fat heaves when we had arrived at old Fort Belknap—laid over to rest one day, and this day's rest saved us from one of the bloodiest Indian fights I have ever witnessed. Next morning we were late getting off and even that delay was in our favor, as I will soon show.

We decided to work East of Belknap that day, so we started out, rounding up cattle as we went East, and when we reached Salt Creek, about 12 miles from Belknap, we found a F. S. train of 5 or 6 wagons, which was trying to reach the fort with provisions for the soldiers.

Now the sight, sickening sight, that I saw there will never be erased from my memory! The Indians had killed and robbed that train and had tied one man's arms and legs, standing erect, between the rear and front wheels of a wagon and built a fire under him which had actually burnt out his bowels and they had fallen to the ground—of course he was dead—all the dead were scalped and their bare shining skulls was another sickening sight. At this sight I solemnly vowed that I would kill some of those Indians or be killed by them, sooner or later, and right here let me say that that vow was made good many times before I gave up the Western country.

We learned afterward that only two of the men saved their lives by running to a clump of timber when the Indians first came in sight.

The full account of this horrible massacre has never been

published. The government at Washington, D. C., has a complete record of it, but the government does not publish such news.

Now if any of my readers are "from Missouri," and have to be shown, tell them to write to the Secretary of War, or to the Indian Agent, at Washington, and I will guarantee they will get practically the same account as the one I have written.

My next letter will give an account of how I got one side of my face (left cheek) shot away. Every time I have my picture taken I require the artist to paint off that scar.

PETITION NEFF SAVE HORNSBY

TEMPLE, March 20.—Judge Sam D. Snodgrass left here today for Austin to present to Governor Neff a petition asking that the death sentence of Geo. F. Hornsby be commuted to life imprisonment. The petition contained the signatures of 6,242 Bell county citizens.

Another stranger sojourning here remarked that Ballinger had "mighty good people, mighty good stores, mighty good business, but mighty poor streets."

FOR A CHILDREN'S PLAY GROUND.

The slide installed on the Central ward school campus by the Civic League for the school children was the center of attraction throughout Sunday, and hundreds of children gathered to try out the new play pretty. It was the chief amusement during the recess hours Monday, and quite a scramble ensued during the day by the children who were eager to "shoot the chutes."

The popularity of this device with the children has prompted comment which may develop into a move for a community playground for the kiddies. There are several hundred children in Ballinger, who could be kept amused in a way which would make them better children if they were given a place to play, instead of allowing them to loaf on the streets, or steal away to the creek and river.

A move for a children's playground would merit the support of the citizens, and could no doubt be put over.

WILL USE LOCAL LABOR ON MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS.

Mayor Guin is authority for the statement that only citizens of Ballinger will be employed in the construction of the new dams on Elm Creek, and in the paving of the streets, in the event that the bond issues on April 18th carry.

This information will be of vital interest to citizens of this city who are at present out of work. Every man in Ballinger who wants work, and who has a vote in the coming elections can be depended on to vote for the bonds, and to use his influence with others to see that they also vote for the bonds.

Every business man who has felt the effects of the present wave of unemployment in his sales and collections will be at the polls bright and early on April 18th to cast a vote for better times, better streets and better water.

The Young Men's Business League will register the names of those who went work on these projects, and will turn them over to the city authorities after the bonds are voted.

SHAME ON US

Ballinger is located on two of the most important highways in Texas—roads which have been designated, are being rapidly completed from here to border, and maintained by automobile and state highway money, and both roads are carrying heavy increased travel.

One of the highways enters Ballinger from the North, and after passing thru the city turns to the South. The other enters from the East and continues on West.

Highway engineers are authority for the statement that the main business street thru the city of Ballinger, which is the city's part of the highway, is the roughest place in the road between Abilene and San Angelo.

This is a disgrace to the citizenship of this city, and stands out as a charge against the enterprising spirit for which our people are otherwise known. Aside from the many travelers who come this way, and go on to tell others about the good roads and bad streets, the farmers of the county are saving very things about Ballinger's bad streets, and the citizens of the city are being forced to bump over the rough streets or take to the alleys.

Those who oppose the bond issue for paving Ballinger streets should have their names painted in glaring letters on bill boards and posted at the bridges on both sides of the city with an inscription which would show who is to blame for that which

is a living shame to a progressive people.

"The proposed improvements in our streets and our water system doubtless interests you more than any other individual. There has been a wave of unemployment over the land, which has undoubtedly touched your pocketbook, and your manner of living. OTHER TOWNS
HAVE DROUTH

If misery loves company Ballinger people can get some consolation out of reading the water report from our neighbor city, Brownwood. Altho about seventy-five miles farther East than Ballinger, and in which direction the rainfall is supposed to increase, Brownwood is "squawking" for water, and the Bulletin says the drouth is the worst in 32 years.

Brownwood did not receive a drop of rain during last July, August, October, and December, and its total rainfall for the past twelve months to date has only been 7.99, while Ballinger has received 10.92 during the past 12 months.

Brownwood, like Ballinger, is suffering from the drouth which has prevailed since last summer. Ballinger received 4.85 inches of rain last June, while Brownwood received only 1.80 inches, and has received only 1.76 since last June—nine months, while Ballinger received 1.95 in the last nine months.

The water situation is serious, and is growing more so daily. Up to the present Ballinger has been fortunate in having the Colorado river to draw on for its water supply, and the water has been used freely for all purposes, including irrigation, but an order has been issued by the city commission suspending irrigation. The river is falling fast, and another thirty days drouth will put this city on the water wagon.

While the severest drouth in the history of the country prevails over a country westward from a line drawn North and South from Gainesville across the entire state, East and Southeast Texas is drouth out and heavy rains are delaying activities and causing damage by swollen streams.

Striking a twenty-seven year average Ballinger should receive a few more showers this month, sufficient to run the total March fall up to .87 of an inch, and in April we should receive 2.18 inches. The average fall for May is .32 inches.

WINTERS TO PAVE
BUSINESS STREETS

WINTERS, Mar. 22.—Property owners on Main Street of Winters met this week and signed contracts to pave the principal blocks of said street with six inch concrete paving and asphalt top. Work is to begin within 30 to 45 days and this in addition to the widening the sidewalks from 4 to 6 feet with curb and gutter will greatly improve the appearance and desirability of the property in this part of Winters.

With permanent paving, wider sidewalks, a modern system of lighting, many new and modern buildings, Winters is beginning to take on real city airs.

WATER SUIT TO
AFFECT TOWNS

The much mooted case of Boyd vs. Motl from Tom Green county, the decision in which was the outstanding reason for the recent irrigation meeting in Austin, now seems to be laden with trouble for the towns and cities in Texas, as well as the irrigation districts.

According to the attorneys who are prosecuting the case for the irrigation interests, every Texas city which secures its water from a stream under a permit from the State Board of Water Engineers, is in danger of having to divide up its empounded water with the riparian owners along the stream. In other words, if the decision in the case is carried to its logical conclusion, and the courts decide that the State does not own and cannot control the waters in the streams, the permit under which the cities operate is invalid, and they cannot be said to fully own the waters which they have empounded in their respective reservoirs.

SHOWS HOW WATER BOND WAS SPENT

The calling of another water bond election has raised the question as to how the city spent the \$10,000 bond issue voted when the light and power bonds were voted.

A brief statement from the city secretary shows the following expenditure of the \$10,000 worth of bonds:

Received for bonds after deducting expense of same \$8,600.00
1. Pipes and fixtures 2,520.00
2. Pumps, motors, etc. 3,250.00
3. Adding 2 ft. to lower dam 500.00
4. Repair on upper dam 50.00

Cash on hand \$6,320.00
..... 2,280.00
\$8,600.00

Item No. 1 in the above is for six inch main and fixtures which are now on hand and will be put down on Hutchings Avenue, replacing the four inch main and giving property owners a seven cent reduction on insurance, as soon as it rains and the city can return to the Elm Creek reservoir for its water supply. This main cannot be laid while the city is pumping from the river. The four inch main to be taken up on Hutchings Avenue, which will be done before the streets are paved, will replace a two inch main on Broadway, which is entirely too small for the number of connections on that street, and which is causing the water consumers to complain during the summer months for failure to get water.

Item No. 2 covers the cost of changing the pumping plant from steam power to electric power. All cost of installing motors, etc., was charged against the water plant, and did not come out of the light fund.

With the additional bond money asked for the city will be able to raise the dams higher, dredge the basin, and according to recommendations of the engineers will double the present capacity of the two city lakes, and also give the city money with which to extend mains and by so doing greatly increase the city's revenue from water.

3 Hurt When Car Turns Turtle; Auto Hits Man

Misses Felda Cathey and Mildred Holliday and Fritz Chaillette were painfully injured, and Misses Thelma Spann and Margaret Kirk had a narrow escape when a Maxwell car in which they were returning from Winters late Tuesday afternoon turned over at a sharp turn in the road North of Hatchel.

The young folks had been to Winters to witness the baseball game between the Ballinger high school team and the Winters high school team. Miss Thelma was driving and other occupants of the car and those who arrived on the scene within a few minutes after declare that the accident was not due to fast driving, as will probably be charged by some.

Circumstances show that the car had just passed another car, and just as it went to make the turn one of the rear casings blew out, throwing the front wheel into a soft rut which also caused a blow out of the front wheel, and the car dropped off the grade and turned bottom upwards, underpinning the occupants of the car.

A party who happened to be only a short distance from the scene of the accident, gave first aid assisting the occupants of the auto to free themselves from the wreck, and within a few minutes other cars came along and brought the injured parties to Ballinger.

Miss Felda was bruised about the face, head and back. It was thought at first that she suffered several broken ribs, but the physicians announced Wednesday morning that no bones were broken. Miss Mildred Holliday was bruised. She rested very well under the influence of medicine Tuesday night, and was reported to be getting along as well as could be expected. Fritz was able to be down town Wednesday, but was sore from his bruises.

Those who witnessed the accident and were first to arrive on

the scene, declare that it was a miraculous escape, and the young folks were fortunate in coming out of the accident alive, as they were all underpinned beneath the car.

Stanley Hull was seriously, if not fatally, injured by an automobile driven by J. P. Booth, on Eighth Street about ten o'clock Wednesday morning. The accident happened near the intersection of Eighth Street and Santa Fe Boulevard. Mr. Booth was driving North on Eighth Street and Stanley was crossing the street when the car struck him, knocking him to the pavement and the front wheels of the car passed over his face and shoulders.

With blood streaming from the wounds inflicted by the fall and smash from the car, the unfortunate man was picked up and rushed to the Halley & Love sanitarium, where the wounds were dressed and the man carried to his home North of the standpipe. Latest reports stated he was resting very well, but the wounds were serious.

Bruises on the lower limbs,

about the shoulders and head, with cuts on the face and head were inflicted, and while Stanley was able to walk from the sanitarium to an auto waiting to carry him home, it is feared that he will not recover rapidly.

If scores are to count for game the contest was a good one, the total runs amounting to 43.

HORNSBY BORN IN RUNNELS CO.

Rogers Hornsby, who was born at Winters, Texas, is making a rep in the big leagues, according to press notices received at Ballinger. Hornsby led all National and American baseball league hitters last season with a swatting average of 397 per cent. He has signed up for another year with the St. Louis Cardinals, last Saturday, and on Monday of this week in an exhibition game with the New York Yankees at New Orleans the Runnels county boy played rings around Babe Ruth. The Babe made three trips to the plate in the New Orleans game and got only one hit, a double, while the Runnels county boy garnered two triples and two doubles in six times at the bat. The Runnels county swat champ of the two major leagues has been with the Cardinals for three years at \$25,000 per year. He signed a three year contract last Saturday, but the figures were not made public.

The St. Louis Star carried a two column mention of "Pep" Hornsby's career on the diamond, with his picture, and listed him as the highest valued article of

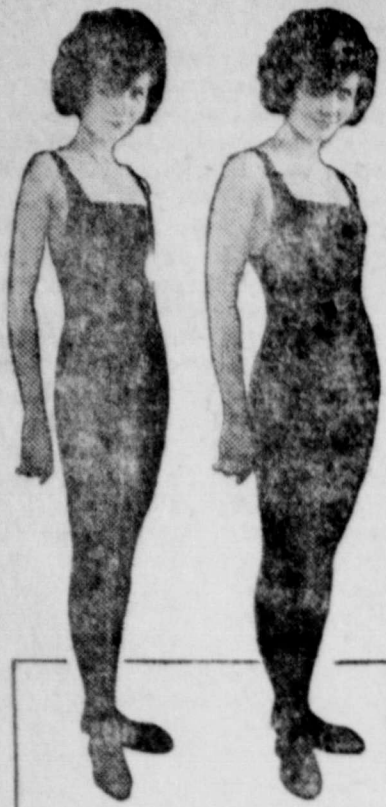

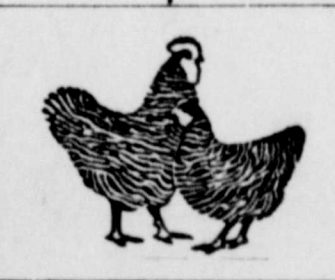
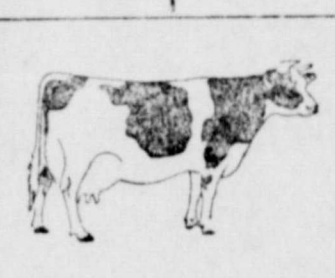

In addition to the bereaved wife and children, a number of other relatives survive, including his mother and brother, who were at his bedside when the end came, and another brother living in South Texas, who will be here to attend the funeral.

It was announced Thursday afternoon that the funeral would be held Friday morning at ten o'clock and interment made in Evergreen Cemetery. Rev. C. E. Simpson, pastor of the Methodist church, will conduct the funeral services.

As a token of the esteem in which he was held by a large circle of friends, a long procession followed the remains of John P. Rhumann to Evergreen Cemetery Friday morning where they were laid to rest under a bank of beautiful flowers.

On account of the large crowd which gathered at the home on Ninth Street, the funeral services were changed from the residence to the cemetery where a large crowd of sorrowing friends stood with bowed heads as Rev. C. E. Simpson conducted the solemn services, speaking words of consolation to the bereaved family.

The mother of deceased and one brother arrived here before Mr. Rhumann died, and another brother and sister came to attend the funeral. The pallbearers were selected from among those who had been associated with Mr. Rhumann daily for several years, employees of the Stubbs grocery store and were L. B. Stubbs, John Guion, Dewey Nelson, M. W. Evans, W. B. Webb, and J. E. McMillan. Aside from his family Mr. Rhumann will be missed more by these friends than anyone else.

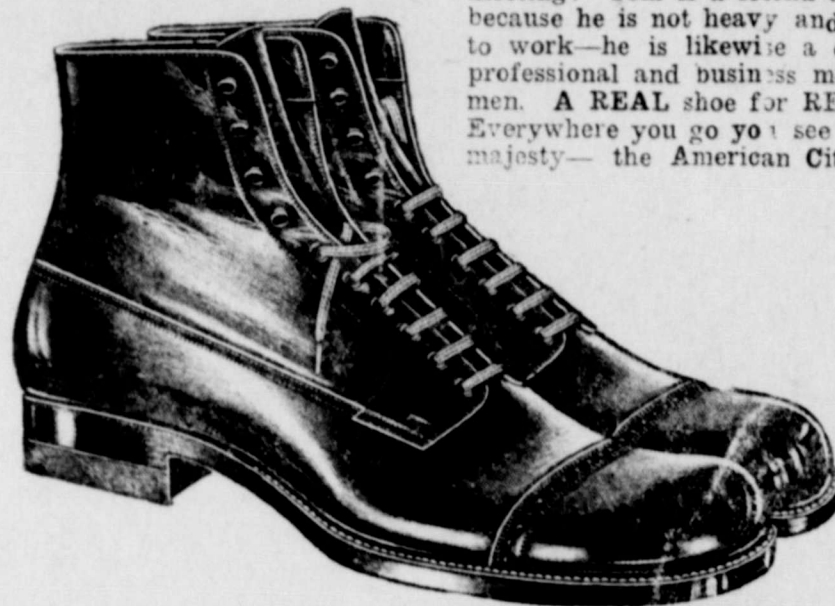
