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RAILROAD ASKS FOR STATE TROOPS

STRIKE BREAKERS ARE KIDNAPPED AT DENISON

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. July 11.—Thirty-five clerks on the Norfolk & Western Railroad left their desks at 10:00 o'clock this morning in response to a strike call for all union clerks to walk out in fighting the reduction in wages recently ordered by the United States Railroad Labor Board.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The government, thru the appointment of Deputy United States Marshalls will make sure that law and order is preserved, property and life protected and transportation of mails is continued and interstate commerce is not interrupted, despite the strike of the railroad shopmen, Attorney General Daugherty announced, after a conference with President Harding this afternoon.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Under the protection of state troops and federal marshalls, the railroad shops at several troublesome points began a determined effort to break the shopmen's strike today, while the ranks of the strikers apparently held solidly together against returning to work at the reduced wage scale. Peace overtures from either side are still unseen.

DENISON, July 12.—J. W. Pike Sr., said to be an employee of the Missouri, Oklahoma & Gulf Railroad, was seriously injured and several others severely beaten in a clash between a mob and suspected strike breakers here early this morning. Pike's wounds are said not to be serious, and he is supplying the officers with information concerning the attack made upon him.

DENISON, July 12.—Forty-seven strike breakers and four Deputy United States Marshalls were attacked, sixteen kidnapped, and the others escaped, according to the report made at police headquarters. The men were attacked as they were leaving the train in which they came here on, presumably to act as guards and fill the places of the strikers.

Several men believed to be strike breakers, railroad guards, and Deputy United States Marshalls, were kidnapped and beaten in a series of disorders last night.

Several guards and men believed to be strike breakers were met by a mob of about one thousand men as they left the Katy train and hustled into autos and hurried into the country where they were flogged and warned, according to the reports to police headquarters and later confirmed by General Manager McGee, of the M. K. & T.

PARIS, Tex., July 12.—United States Marshal Baer stated this afternoon that the men who were kidnapped at Denison had not been sworn in as deputies, and were not armed, but it was the purpose of the government to place them on duty.

FT. WORTH, July 12.—One suspect in connection with the beating of N. J. Fitzgerald, Santa Fe shop foreman at Cleburne, has been arrested. He admitted to the charge and is being held for aggravated assault, according to telephone advice received here.

FT. WORTH, July 12.—According to a report received here this morning and confirmed at the Santa Fe office at Cleburne, the general foreman employed at the shops in Cleburne was taken from his work last night by a crowd of men and seriously assaulted. The attack is believed to have been made in connection with the strike.

CHICAGO, July 12.—A program for the solution of the railroad shopmen's strike was drawn up today by Chairman Hooper of the United States Railroad Labor Board, after conferences with the leaders of the shop crafts union, and which

NO AID GRANTED FOR RUSSIANS

THE HAGUE, July 12.—The conference here with the representatives of soviet Russia broke down this afternoon without apparent hope of any further sessions. Russian Delegate Litvinoff said that further meetings were unlikely as all parties interested insisted upon the Russians making promises with regard to property compensation, giving guarantees which were impossible until the Russians knew what credit loans would be granted them.

GERMANS SUBMIT A MORATORIUM REQUEST

PARIS, July 12.—German representatives today submitted to the reparations commission a formal note requesting the moratorium on reparations payments for the remainder of this year. The note to the allied commission stated that thirty-two million gold marks due next Saturday were available, if the commission insisted upon this payment, but recommended that it also be waived and made to apply to the moratorium. The commission will discuss the note at a special meeting probably this afternoon.

DALLAS.—It is expected that the high school building being erected at Highland Park will be completed in time for the opening of the fall term of school, according to architects. The building will be two stories and cost \$150,000.

SHIPS CUT RATE TO CONVENTION

NEW ORLEANS, July 12.—American Legion members from all parts of the world are expected to attend the national convention in New Orleans next October as a result of a fifty per cent reduction in passenger rates announced on vessels of the United States Shipping Board.

A letter received from W. B. Keene, traffic manager of the United States Shipping Board Emergency Fleet Corp., states that the fare reduction will be granted on single or round trip tickets to those Legion members and their families, who show conclusively that it is their intention to be present at the New Orleans convention.

The reduced fare will also prevail on the United States Lines, operating passenger service in the North Atlantic, and on the Munson Steamship Line, operating between New York and the East coast of South America, provided accommodations are available.

Convention officials believe that the reduced fare will increase the delegations to the convention from cities on or near the Atlantic coast and the Gulf of Mexico, as well as from twenty-one foreign countries where Legion posts are organized.

WRECK ON MAIN LINE DELAYS SANTA FE

A wreck on the main line out of Fort Worth delayed the West bound Santa Fe which is due here at 12:26. This is the first delay the Santa Fe has had in many weeks. The delay was not caused by the shopmen's strike, as many thought. The train was delayed two hours.

Texas produced 1,615,015 tons of coal in 1920 valued at \$6,052,000, according to federal statistics.

TEXAS STOCKMEN KILLING TICKS

SAN ANTONIO, July 12.—The district between San Antonio and Houston, comprising Bastrop, Brazoria, Colorado, Ft. Bend, Fayette, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee, Matagorda, and Wharton counties, is being rid of ticks, as is shown by the dipping of 1,568,635 head of cattle during June, according to W. L. Endsley, district supervising inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture. The work is being conducted under the joint cooperation of the Texas Live Stock Sanitary Commission and the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry.

"The credit for the splendid showing of progress made is largely due to the earnest efforts of the cattlemen in getting out to the dipping vats every 14 days as near to 100 per cent of the cattle as possible," Inspector Endsley declared, "to the fine spirit of co-operation shown by the county officials in enforcing the tick eradication law; the ever-willingness of the press to publish articles pertaining to tick eradication and boost the work at every opportunity; and the good cooperation on the part of the legal profession by advising their clients to obey the law."

The counties of Matagorda and Jackson dipped over 200,000 each. The total number of cattle dipped in the district was 1,688,635. The total number of vats in operation was 963 and the area in square miles of the territory was 11,319 square miles.

COTTON ASS'N SPEAKER COMING

AUSTIN, July 12.—The situation in the railroad shopmen's strike in Texas at present does not necessitate calling out of state troops to protect the railroad property, Adjutant General Barton said this morning, after a telegram to Governor Neff from J. L. Lancaster, receiver for the Texas & Pacific Railroad, had been handed to him. The telegram requested that state troops be sent to protect Texas & Pacific property at certain points in the state.

The message will be forwarded to Gov. Neff at Stephenville, where Mr. Neff speaks tonight.

and it is not known what action the governor may take in the matter.

FT. WORTH, July 12.—Gov. Neff, in a conversation over the telephone from Stephenville, said that he was considering what to do in regard to the strike situation at Denison and elsewhere. If the situation grows more serious it is believed that the governor will take the same action as other states have taken where disorders have become so prevalent, and call out the troops to protect property and workers.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., July 11.—More than three hundred shot's exchanged by state guard men and snipers marked the first night's control of the Chicago & Alton Railroad shops here by troops last night, and the shooting was resumed this morning when snipers fired on a sentry at the edge of the shop yards.

Crowds of strikers and strike sympathizers began crowding around the shops early this morning and at 10:00 o'clock orders had been issued for the guardsmen to set up machine guns, and in a short time the rapid fire guns were covering every entrance to the shop yards.

CHICAGO, July 11.—Interference with the United States mail service became serious today, as a development in the railway strike. Reports to Washington threw a serious light on the situation and several roads advised the postoffice department that their mail and train schedules were being curtailed, altho the department inspectors were said to have reported the situation not as serious as reported from railway circles.

SAN ANGELO, July 11.—Nine work shopmen on the Orient walked out this week. This brings the total number of men on the K. C. M & O. out of Texas to eighty-five. The men had been receiving 34 cents per hour. They are striking because the wage scale has been cut to 32 cents per hour.

The Texas National Guard is due to go in training on July 28th for fifteen days, but the chances are good for the Ballinger company to be missing when the "top kick" calls the roll and the training camp is organized.

The law requires that at least 60 per cent of the enlistment of a company must report before that company will be admitted to the training camp, and Capt. Clinton B. COUNTY BUYS ROAD TRACTOR

The county has received a ten-ton caterpillar tractor from the federal government which will be used in road work, and which was acquired by the commissioners' court at a bargain. The tractor is a \$6,500 machine, but the county paid only \$500 for it, the federal government making the appropriation, or supplying the tractor at the ridiculously low price as the government has them on hand and wishes to dispose of them to counties needing such machines on road work.

The tractor was placed on the Winters lap of the Ballinger-Abilene highway, where the link of road between Winters and Abilene is being completed. It will be transferred from precinct to precinct and used wherever it is needed in carrying on road work in this county.

ANGELO CLUB IN BAD SHAPE

SAN ANGELO, July 11.—San Angelo fans must go down in their pockets and dig up \$5,000 before the Bronchos can be free from debt as the first half of the season closes.

With an old debt of \$2,000 hanging over the heads the deficit for the present season is \$3,000, causing the club to face a total deficit of \$5,000.

The attendance this year is said to be about one-half what it was last year, and the club played in hard luck to begin the season with, as the first series of games at home were rained out, and the daily guarantee expense to the visiting team had to be put up, and the local players' salaries went on just the same.

The club has also been experiencing a deficit on the road on account of the long jumps. The \$75 guarantee is not sufficient to pay expenses, railroad fares, etc. The club is barely breaking even on the second half, and the only hope of taking care of the deficit is for the fans to come to the rescue of the directors, who have financed the club by loans personally secured.

AUSTIN, July 11.—The trial of Edgar Shelton, charged with disturbing religious worship, in connection with attempted unmasking of Ku Klux Klansmen, while in church service Sunday night, was passed until the next term of court, here today.

RESERVE OFFICER CALLED TO TRAIN

The war department has issued orders for a training camp for reserve officers, and Lieutenant Frank M. Pearce, of this city, who is on the reserve, will be called to duty at Camp Travis, San Antonio, on July 11th.

Under the general orders governing the reserve officers corps all those on the list are subject to fifteen days training each year, or more, with the officer's consent, and are subject to call to duty in cases of emergency, and the secretary of war has the authority to say what is an emergency.

Lieut. Pearce signed up with the reserve corps when he was mustered out after seeing service overseas as an officer in the expeditionary force during the World War. He is now answering the call for fifteen days training and will be absent from home and from his place of business from July 11th to July 26th.

There will be more than 190 officers of the reserve in training at Camp Travis, and men will be selected from this reserve force for instructors in the citizens' training camp which will be held in August.

The Rannels County Warehouse Company held its regular annual meeting in Ballinger Monday with a good representation of the stockholders present.

The treasurer's annual financial statement was approved. The statement shows the warehouse company is in good shape. The company started out a couple of years ago with assets amounting to about \$4,000, and its holdings are now valued at \$16,000.

Lumber is now on the ground for two one-thousand-bale units to the warehouse. The new units will be constructed with fire walls between the one-thousand-bale compartments, and will give the company warehouse capacity of 3,000 bales.

The directors are negotiating with the Santa Fe for a lease on additional land adjoining their present property near the compress, which will give them a larger yard area and room for making further improvements as the demand for room grows.

MORATORIUM ON GERMAN DEBT

PARIS, July 11.—A moratorium on Germany's cash payments for the remainder of this year was thought to be quite probable as the result of a conference this morning between Dr. Fisher, chairman of the German war debt commission, and all members of the commission, according to opinions expressed in circles close to the reparations commission. The conference was hurriedly called presumably for the purpose of discussing the moratorium.

REPORT OF TEX. MANUFACTURERS BODIES FOUND IN CONCHO RIVER

The Bureau of Census has just issued the statistics for the manufacturing enterprises of Texas for the year 1919, as shown by the 1920 census. The report makes some interesting showings in the way of increase of manufacturing enterprises in Texas, as well as in the increased number of employees and the increase in salary paid such employees.

In 1919 there were 130,911 people employed by manufacturing enterprises in Texas as compared with 84,575 in 1909. Only city reports are made from cities of more than ten thousand population, and there are only twenty-nine such cities in Texas. Other reports are made by counties.

According to the report Runnels county had twelve manufacturing enterprises, with an average of 53 wage earners, and a total annual payroll of \$43,118, or an average of \$813.50 per annum for each wage earner.

The twelve manufacturing enterprises in Runnels county pay an annual rent and taxes of \$5,752 and consume \$809,236 worth of raw material and turn out \$966,572 worth of finished products, at a profit of \$157,336.

The girl was clad in a blue shirt waist and striped overalls and was barefooted, when she fell in the deep water. Stanford went to her rescue and lost his life in efforts to save her. The young man was almost out of the water with the drowning girl when she pulled him under and both perished.

Persons who knew Stanford, and strangers, paid a tribute to his heroism by attending the funeral and a move has been started to obtain aid and hero recognition for his widow and children from the Carnegie hero fund.

TEXAS CROPS BETTER THAN '21

DALLAS, July 10.—General crop conditions in Texas this year are as good and in some places better than last year, according to railroad officials.

Pasture is fine for range cattle from Abilene to El Paso, according to A. E. Pistole, official at Big Spring. "We do not have time to make a canvass of the division but the general situation is that there is no grain such as wheat and oats raised on this division this year," he reports. "Cotton was planted very late on account of rains. Crops will be late but will compare favorably with previous years. There will also be a late crop of feed such as maize and kafir to compare with previous years."

The estimated peanut yield in the territory from Texarkana to Abilene, is placed at 25 per cent above 1921, by J. W. Knightlinger, railroad official at Fort Worth. Cotton is considered very favorable, with present indications pointing to a larger yield than last year. Grain and oats are about the same as last year, with wheat fully 24 per cent short. Only twelve or fifteen cars are expected on this division. Melons are regarded as about 20 per cent above last year.

Cotton is classed as five in the district from Fort Worth to Denton via Sherman, commonly called the Red River territory, according to R. Wynne, railway official at Denton. A good corn crop necessitating about 25 cars with 450 cars of watermelons is predicted. Wheat and oats there are regarded as being approximately a 20 per cent increase over crops of last year.

Reports to the office of T. L. Peeler, industrial commissioner of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway, indicate that the peach crop in Northeastern Texas, between the Louisiana line and Greenville, will be below normal this season. Not more than ten or twelve full cars are expected to be handled out of the Shreveport division of the road, passing from Greenville East thru Hopkins, Wood, Camp, Morris, Cass, Marion and Harrison counties into Louisiana, Mr. Peeler says. This section generally handles, he points out, from 300 to 800 carloads of the fruit a season. Good strawberry and watermelon crops are forecast by Mr. Peeler, who says the Katy road expects to handle between 400 and 500 carloads of the latter product on the Shreveport division alone. Cars are

plentiful and the traffic movement will operate smoothly, officials agree.

A varied account of crops in South Texas is being reported. Cotton from Dallas to Waco is said to be late, some of the plants just coming up and being chopped out. Between Waco and Temple cotton is reported also late, with corn good. From Temple to Taylor corn and cotton are good. Cotton is knee high from Taylor to Elgin, from Elgin to Smithville corn is reported poor; especially around Bastrop while cotton around Bastrop and Smithville is above average; between Smithville and La Grange, crops late; cantaloupes, cucumbers, beans and other truck being shipped from La Grange vicinity; cream, eggs and butter being shipped from New Ulm to Houston with cotton above average; Brookshire shipping truck, eggs, chickens and milk.

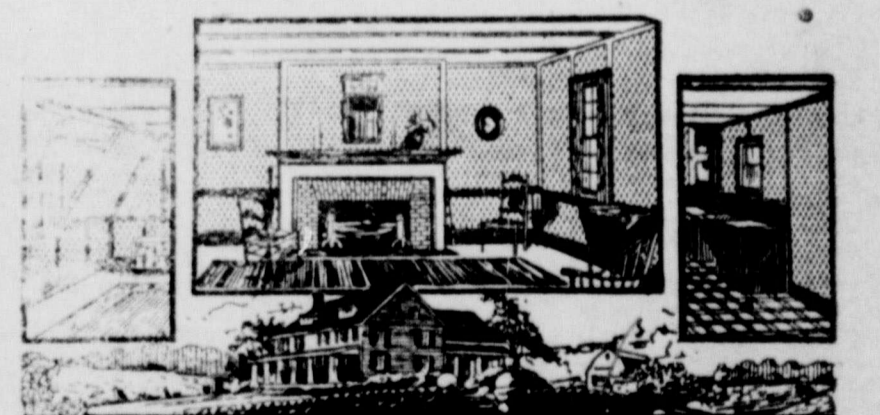

are operating at a loss receive
the same consideration?

July Fourth casualties total
fifty dead and about 250 injured
up to date with some boxes
to hear from. Drownings,
automobile accidents, explosions
and firearms all come in for
debts in the game of death.
New York leads with 11 dead
and 45 wounded.

Some times delays cannot be
avoided, but the delay in street
paving is really bumping on the
nerves of many who travel in
autos, and the whole town gets
the knocks. We didn't start in
time, and we are now suffering
for the delays of the past.

Striking shopmen offered their
services free gratis in clearing
up a wreck on the T. & P. last
Saturday. The object in clearing
away the wreck was that
train service might be resumed.
If the strikers want to be consistent

jobs in the shop where they will
be paid for resuming train
service, and then show the labor
board where the wage cut is
unjust.

trade.

The penitentiary transfer

prison. Sweetwater is the concentration
point for a number
of West Texas counties, and the
men carried to the pen will
serve sentences for breaking the
law. Others will go the same
route if they don't watch their
step.

You often hear a man say that
he does not like to live in a "one
man" town, or a town where a

few men control things, but
there are a few men around this
town who seem to be perfectly
satisfied to let one man, or a few
men, do all the work when it
comes to matters of public interest.
Don't complain about the

you put your shoulder to the

unity of spirit and a unity of

cities.

Perhaps for the first time in
the history of the county, only
one candidate is submitted to
the voters for each county office.
Things are becoming politically

somebody to run against him or
her. As a rule it does not take
much encouragement to build up
a long ticket, but it seems that
the voters did not have the heart
to inflict punishment upon their
politically inclined friends by
encouraging them to get in the
game. No use to scratch them,
they are going to win.

SKEPTICISM AND NON-SENSE

The mere sending of a bunch
of names to nine friends will
bring you good luck, and the
failure to send the names, thereby
breaking the chain will bring
you bad luck, according to direction
attached to a list of names
being received by parties thru
the mails here.

The list of names neatly written
with a typewriter and with
directions saying, "Copy this
and send to nine friends to whom
you wish good luck. The chain
was started by an army officer
and should go three times
around the world. Do not break
the chain, for whoever does will
have bad luck. Do it within
twenty-four hours and count
nine days and you will have some
great good fortune."

There is not a semblance of
humor in the scheme, and The
Ledger refers to it only to say
that there is enough skepticism
fllickering thru the space where
some people's minds should be
to damn the whole world. If it
is true that an army officer
started the "good luck" chain,
he did so because he was shell-
shocked and a fit subject for the
"bug-house."

But why should we worry.
Uncle Sam needs the business
and if the skeptically inclined
recipients of the foolery didn't
do this they might do
something serious.

A BIG TASK

The largest vote in the history
of Texas primary elections will
be cast in the election to be held
on July 22nd, and the task of
counting the ballots and making
the returns will be a big one.

Not only will the increased
vote cause more work on the
part of the election boards, but
press reporters will be forced to
remain on the job late, and tele-
graph wires will be burdened in
carrying the returns to the anxious
throats which will crowd
before the bulletin boards on the
night of the twenty-second.

The voting strength of Texas
this year is given at 1,165,910, as
compared with 811,000 two years
ago, or a gain of more than a
third of a million.

Two years ago fifty-five per
cent of the voting strength of
the state was cast in the primary.
At the same ratio the total
vote in the primary this year
will be 641,000, or 191,000 more
than was cast two years ago.

Two years ago there were only
twenty-five names on the state
ticket while there are thirty-
three names on the state ticket
this year. Most of the counties
have fewer candidates for county
offices than they had two
years ago, but as a whole the
ticket is longer than two years
ago.

The Ledger is perfecting arrangements
with every election
manager in Runnels county to
supply this office with the returns
at the earliest possible
moment on the night of the election,
and an effort will be made
to make Runnels county one of
the first counties to make a report.

Returns from other parts of
the state will begin to come in at
The Ledger office by seven-
thirty or eight o'clock, and
flashes during the early hours
will probably announce results
in some races. Unless the vote
is close The Ledger will tell
who is who in its Sunday morning
election special which will
be delivered shortly after sunrise.

109 MAJORITY
FOR 75 CENT TAX

359 votes were cast in the
school tax election Tuesday, 234
voting to increase the school tax
of the Ballinger Independent
District from 50 cents to 75
cents, and 125 voting against the
proposition, giving the higher
tax advocates a majority of 109.

The result of the election was
surprising to some, as there was

CLAIMS MADE BY BLANTON ATTACKED

DE LEON, July 7.—Oscar Callaway, of Comanche, Texas, candidate for Congress in the Seventh District, made the charge today in a speech here that the claim being made by Thomas L. Blanton, who is a candidate for re-election, that he had saved untold millions of the people's money by striking out items in appropriation bills on points of order was without foundation. After reviewing his own stand on national issues, Callaway said the following concerning Blanton:

"Most of you know, if you will use a little common sense, that all legislation in Congress must be by a majority vote. The facts are these:

"An appropriation bill may properly contain only items which are authorized by an already existing law, and whenever items which are not so authorized are included in an appropriation bill they are 'new business' and subject to a point of order by any member. If such an item is stricken out and there is behind it any real desire or intention to enact it into law, then there are two courses open. One is to take it over to the Senate and try to get it inserted in the Senate bill. If this succeeds and the bill with the item in it gets by the conference and back to the House, the item is then no longer subject to a point of order, and is passed as a part of the bill if the majority of the House members are in favor of it, or defeated if a majority of the members are opposed to it. If this course should fail, then it may be introduced as a separate bill and take its regular course, being passed or defeated according to whether a majority of the members of the House favor or oppose it.

"Mr. Blanton's claim that he sits up at night sifting these appropriation bills, many of them hundreds of pages long, for items unauthorized by law while his constituents sleep, is laughably absurd to any man who knows anything at all about congressional procedure. These bills are printed in plain face type, but all the new legislation is printed in italics so as to call the attention of every member of the House to each and every item in the bill which is not authorized by law. The committee attends to this sifting itself and saves Mr. Blanton the trouble. He needn't even read the items unless he chooses, in order to pick out the ones which are subject to a point of order; so he ought not to lose much sleep over it.

"In most instances these items are inserted in the bills by members of the committee as a mere courtesy to the member introducing them, with no expectation on the part of any member of the committee or the party introducing the item, that they will ever become law.—Each and every one interested in the matter or knowing of it ordinarily realize that the thing will be stricken from the bill when it comes to the floor of the House.

"Nor is the mere fact that Mr. Blanton is the first man to make a point of order on any such item any indication that there are not 434 other members ready to do the same thing. A majority of the House must really oppose the appropriation before it is actually killed, for the reason stated that the objection can be got round in either of the two ways pointed out. I repeat that no man ever saved the country a dollar on a point of order. On items seriously presented stripping them out could only force them into the proper channel."

Hon. James L. Shyden, for so many years the representative in Congress from this section, had this to say of Oscar Callaway in a recent letter to W. D. Cowan, of the San Saba Star:

"I am proud to call him my friend and if I were a citizen of your congressional district I would be very proud to call him my representative.

"An honest man, I never knew. I don't mean honest in the money sense of the word only. He believes what he says, which means that he is no cheap

demagogue. I never knew him to take a position on any public question of the righteousness of which he was not convinced. I never knew a more truthful man in all my public service nor a wiser one. I never knew him to consider taking a position against his judgment or conscience because at the moment it seemed to offer a larger return in votes." (Pol. Adv.)

**HUNDRED MILLION
FOR ROAD WORK**

WASHINGTON, July 8.—During the next twelve months, or for the fiscal year beginning July first, \$100,000,000 will be spent for road work throughout the nation. This is the lowest estimate according to an appropriation recently authorized by the federal government. Under the conditions governing the expenditure of this money, each state must match the government aid dollar for dollar.

Under the provisions of a postoffice appropriation bill signed by the president, \$65,000,000 will be spent during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1923, and \$75,000,000 for the year beginning July 1, 1924. The provisions for all three years are the same, and the state and county which does not come up with its share of the money will not share in the big federal donation. The total in sight for good roads for the three years amounts to \$380,000,000. The last named funds will be administered thru the Bureau of Good Roads by the secretary of agriculture.

The country is facing the greatest road building campaign in its history. American citizens are realizing more and more each day that it is economy to build good roads and maintain them. The saving on wear and tear of autos, and in time will

more than pay the bill, to say nothing of the difference in the comfort of travel.

Of the above amount Texas will receive about three million dollars provided the state meets the requirements, which she is doing. No Texas county will share in this big aid unless that county meets the requirements, and puts up dollar for dollar furnished by the federal government.

THOMAS SPEAKS TO GOOD CROWD

The largest crowd to greet any candidate here this season for an afternoon's address heard Hon. Cullen F. Thomas present his claims for a seat in the United State Senate Friday afternoon. Mr. Thomas spoke in the court house park at two o'clock and caught the East bound train for Coleman, where he was billed to speak at night. He stated that he was speaking about five hours each day during the home stretch of the campaign and the hard work was telling on him.

R. W. Bruce called the meeting to order and presided, calling Rev. C. W. Hardin to the platform who introduced the speaker as a man with a clean record, morally and politically, and a man who stood for the ideals of true Americanism.

"I have appeared before you in the past," said Mr. Thomas, "for other men and for other causes." It will be recalled that Mr. Thomas spoke here during the prohibition campaigns of the past, and also in the Bailey campaign, and he spoke here for Tom Ball when Mr. Ball was making the race for governor against James E. Ferguson.

"This time I am coming before you as a candidate for the high office of United States Senator from Texas." Here the speaker called attention to the fact that he was a candidate from Texas, and that if Arkansas should win part of Texas, including Dallas county, his home, which Arkansas was laying claim to, that he would refuse to go with Arkansas, and would resign his seat in congress.

Mr. Thomas repeated his stand on the various issues in the campaign as heretofore printed in the various papers of the state, declaring himself a Democrat despite the criticism made against him by his opponents on his political record. He referred to his work in the various state conventions, and to his work in the National Democratic Convention, where he had the honor of casting Texas' forty votes for Woodrow Wilson. He said that he stood on a table and made a speech for Cleveland when he was a boy and that Cleveland swept the nation, and that he had been making Democratic speeches ever since.

"They criticize my Democracy and call me a federalist," said the speaker, "because I fought for the eighteenth and nineteenth amendments. I have no apology for supporting these two amendments. I am for the enforcement of the 18th amendment on every acre of American soil and on every American ship that sails the high seas."

In discussing the prohibition question he denied that it was a dead issue as his anti opponents were trying to make believe. "They say it is a dead issue because they are opposed to the death of the liquor traffic," he said. The speaker told how the liquor question was being made an issue in Missouri, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Louisiana, and he asserted that it was an issue in Texas. "I am forever against it," said Mr. Thomas. "I have a political scar on my body as a result of the fight I have made against the liquor business, and I have a physical scar on my nose as a result of fighting the liquor business, but I am proud of my pro record."

The speaker stated that he had a silver loving cup with a diamond on one side, the only diamond he said he owned, and an inscription on the other side as a token of appreciation from the good women of Dallas county for the work he did in the prohibition cause.

Mr. Thomas paused after speaking for about forty minutes, and called for anyone who wished to do so to ask him questions. He was called on from the audience for discussion on several questions, including the bonus, and the league of nations questions. He said he was for the bonus if the money came out of the pockets of the rich men who made their millions as a result of the war, but was opposed to the bonus if the consumers had to pay it on sales tax, etc.

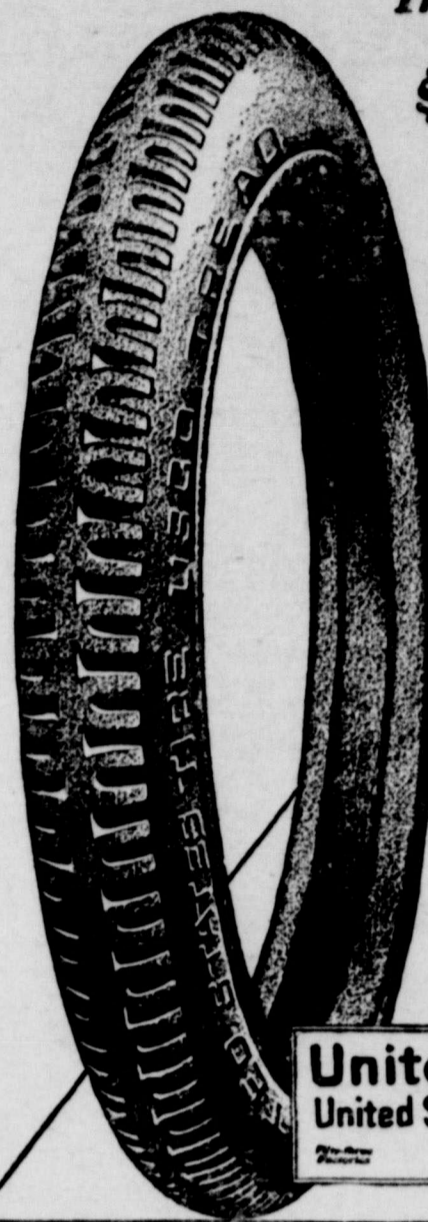
He came out strong for the league of nations, receiving greatest applause when he mentioned Woodrow Wilson's name and the part the leader of the nation in the World War played in working for adoption of the league. He rapped those who got up and left while he was

Mr. Thomas discussed the tariff question and other issues in the campaign as discussed at other places. He declared that he was "in favor of a more equal distribution of the wealth of this country," and said there could be no contentment, peace and prosperity as long as a few men controlled the markets and distribution of the wealth of the nation. He called attention to the fact that millionaires were living in luxury and waste while millions of others were fighting for places in the bread line.
