11,449,000 **BALE CROP FORECASTED**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.-This ear's cotton crop is placed at 11,449,000 bales of five hundred pounds gross weight. This is the second government forecast of the present season as announced by the department of agriculture. This estimate is based on the condition of the crop on July 25th, which was 70.8 per cent normal.

The condition of the Texas crop is given in the report at 72 per cent normal.

A solution of the drainage prob lem is delaying street paving in Ballinger, so we have been inform ed by some of the city officials As is a well known fact, the business district, which is to be payed, is flooded with water from the hill when heavy rain falls, and this water must be turned off the streets before the paving can be put down, or the paving would soon be damaged and destroyed by the undermining of the flood

The city engineer has recommended that the flood waters from the hill north of the Santa Fe be diverted to the river or creek, and not permitted to flow through the business district of the city. In order to do this a large drainage ditch will have to be constructed north of the Santa

The drainage problem is being worked out as rapidly as possible and as fast as the Santa Fe will co-operate, and as soon as this part of the work is out of the way, it is expected that actual work on street paving will begin.
