



It was said that the tunnel should be cleared in two or three days, although volumes of nauseating gas from the burning depths of the mine caused the belief that the men had already perished, and none would be rescued alive.

JACKSON, Calif., Aug. 29 .-Forty-eight coal miners are still imprisoned today, nearly one mile under the ground, in the Argonaut mine, and it is feared that they will not be rescued alive. The open season for quail does not begin until December 1st and the duck shooting season opens October 16th. Wild turkey gobbler hunting season has been changed, due to the action of the last legislature. The general season thru the state now opens Nov. 1, with a season limit of three gobblers. Due to the scarcity of turkeys there is no open season, and even gobblers may not be shot in Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy, Kennedy, Starr, Brooks, Jim Hogg and McMullen counties.

"The question of to what extent the state should participate in conservation of the arid lands of the West or of the overflow lands of the East is one that has but one answer, in my opinion. The state should make reasonable topographic surveys along the rivers in order to show the proper location of levees that will protect the overflow lands, but in no case should the state be called upon to participate in the construction by way of financing the project or even underwriting it.

"The financing of the projects should be left entirely to the distriet involved and the bonds should be based upon the property protected. The moment the state begins underwriting the district bonds, then the state will, in some cases, be left with the bag to hold.

"In West Texas, I take the defnite position that the state can by way of preliminary surveys in order to develop the country, point out possible reservoir sites and possible lands under these sites, but in no case should the state underwrite the bonds for irrigation purposes nor should it be expected to guarantee these bonds. 

MANY AFTER GARMENT PLANT

Ballinger has put in a bid for a branch of the Miller Manufacturing Company plant, according to Stuart L. Williams, who returned from Dallas and Fort Worth Wednesday morning.

Mr. Williams stated that he visited the Miller Manufacturing Company while in Fort Worth and placed before them the advantages offered here for such an enterprise, and that the company promised to investigate this clasped bands, in one's waiting room place.

The Miller Manufacturing Company has been operating a garment making plant in Ft. Worth, and has been very successful, working about three hundred employes, up until a short time ago when they experienced labor trouble. It will be recalled that the strikers kidnapped one of the women working in the plant and carried her to the country where she was severely beaten, and pickets are still on duty at the plant threatening workers who take the places of the strikers.

As a result of the labor troubles the company has decided to split its \$200,000 plant into about three plants, locate one in North Texas, one in South Texas and one in West Texas. Paris has been selected for the North Texas site. Mr. Williams was informed by the manager that about forty Texas towns had made bids for plants, offering inducements, and that the various places were being investigated. The company pays a wage of from \$4 to \$6 per day and will employ about fifty women for each plant.
