TOWN IS DESTROYED BY QUAKE

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 14.—The Chilean government today considered the advisability of sending troops to Coquimbo, Atacama, to reinforce the regular garrison at that place. This action was caused by reports of banditry and other disorder in the district where the earthquake did serious damage and killed many people.

Indications are today that the calamity resulting from the earthquake and tidal wave had reached appalling proportions. The casualties are now estimated to be between 1500 and 2,000. A second earthquake visited the country last night.

Tremors were felt at La Serena and Constitucion. The town of Carrisal is reported to have disappeared entirely together with its entire population of 500 people.

MATTRESS PLANT ESCAPES BLAZE

Flames originating from a match in the lint machine at the Lankford Mattress Factory Wednesday morning flashed over the lint room and destroyed about one hundred pounds of cotton quicker than a twinkling, and if it had not been for the fact that the lint room was constructed so as to prevent spread of flames, the factory would have gone up in smoke again.

It will be recalled that Mr. Lankford suffered a loss of some five or six thousand dollars when his mattress factory was destroyed by fire some time ago. When he purchased a building up town and installed new machinery, he constructed a lint room with a view to guarding against fire, and this alone probably saved the building and mattress plant Wednesday.

When the match went through the machine a sheet of flame was blown into the lint room and the lint which was being prepared for a mattress was consumed almost immediately. But by turning a sluice of water into the openings of the room prepared for that purpose the fire was under control in a few minutes.

CASES REVERSED; CASES AFFIRMED

AUSTIN, Nov. 15.—A motion for a rehearing in the case of Clement Appolinar, sentenced to death for the murder of Theodore Barnhart in Bexar county, was denied by the Court of Criminal Appeals here today. The rehearing was asked on the grounds of insanity.

A forty-five year sentence imposed on Joe Henderson in Van Zandt county for killing Robert Killingsworth, was reversed and remanded for trial. This is a case in which the killing resulted from a controversy over the ownership of some turkeys.

A ten year sentence given Luther Kennamer for the murder of C. F. Davis in Jones county, was affirmed. The three year sentence of Hubert Cotton from Hunt county, convicted on a manslaughter charge in connection with the killing of Tom Green, was reversed and remanded.

Frank Hutto is at home from the Pioneer oil fields, where he has been working for some time, coming home to spend a few days.

COUNTY TO PASS 40,000 BALE MARK

More than 40,000 bales of cotton will be ginned in Runnels county, according to figures compiled by Oscar Pearson, manager of the Ballinger Cotton Oil Mill Company. The gins in the county had turned out 37,917 bales up to Saturday night, and with a few more days of pretty weather will go over the top with the 40,000 bales and some to spare.

The present ginning figures are more than 13,000 in excess of the total production of a year ago, and with the better price prevailing this season, farmers are closing the year in pretty good shape. Following are the figures for the gins of the county up to the close of business Saturday night:

POULTRY MARKET IS AT LOW STAGE

There is little demand for turkeys, and chickens are going begging on the local market, according to poultry dealers, who declare that they are not making any efforts to buy either turkeys or chickens at this time.

The slow drag on the turkey market is due to the fact that dealers cannot get them to Eastern markets in time for the Thanksgiving trade, except by express, and express rates make the price of turkey almost prohibitive and within reach only of the wealthy classes.

It is the off-season on chickens, as is always the case at this time of year, and dealers are offering only eight cents for hens, eight cents for bakers and ten cents for fryers. The dealers tell you to hold onto your chickens until the last of the winter if you want the best market.

Dealers also say that turkey may bring a better price for the Christmas trade, but there is nothing certain about that. The high price last year seems to have reacted and consumers are not going as strong on turkeys as they did a year ago, and so far the demand has failed to develop, notwithstanding that the turkey crop is said to be shorter than usual.

SAFETY FIRST BIT READY TO PUNCTURE POOL

Drilling was suspended at the Safety First well Wednesday awaiting further advice from O. Wilson, who is at Breckenridge. Drilling stopped at a depth of 3324 feet after a two foot hole had been drilled into the gray lime, which is identical with the formation covering the Breckenridge and Eastland pools.

The bit passed thru the black shale Tuesday, and the men in charge of the well suspended work until Mr. Wilson could be heard from. F. W. Hunter declares that the outlook for a well is all that anyone could hope for, and he wired Mr. Wilson Wednesday to ship 400 feet of casing at once and send tools with which to drill in the well. "I know some fellows have no confidence in the proposition," said Mr. Hunter, "because we have had so much hard luck, but I think we will yet be able to show them an oil well." Mr. Hunter says if there is anything in the signs of formation, that this well is going to bring a surprise to the people as soon as the drill goes through the present strata of gray lime.

As the well now stands there is an open hole of 400 feet without casing, and while the hole is in good shape, the drillers say that it would be suicide to drill the well in without first setting the casing. There is no water to be eased off, but a blow-out might cause a blow-up which would take much time and money to repair, and as this well has been known as the Safety First since the Arizona company came here and started the development, it is better to be safe than sorry.

ANTI-KLANSMAN SUES PREACHER FOR \$100,000

EASTLAND, Nov. 15.—A suit for \$100,000 damages for the alleged defamation of character was filed by Robert G. Gordon, a local oil operator, against Dr. E. J. Bulgin, an evangelist who is holding a revival here.

In his petition Gordon alleges that Dr. Bulgin denounced him from the pulpit for the part Gordon is alleged to have played in adopting at a meeting of former service men a resolution criticizing the Ku Klux Klan. Gordon alleges that the evangelist damaged his character by the attack made on him from the pulpit, and he is seeking damages in the above sum. Gordon is said to have criticized the Ku Klux Klan while the evangelist was defending the klan principles.

RATE HEARING ON COTTON SEED

AUSTIN, Nov. 14.—The November hearing of the Texas Railroad Commission began today with a hearing of the minimum weight charges on cotton seed for planting purposes. Reassignment regulations is also one of the principal cases to be taken up later today. The commission will hear applications of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway for increased rates on livestock and freight divisions.

BRITISH WILL NOT ACCEPT TURK TERMS

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The British foreign office has telegraphed to the French and Italian governments a memorandum in which Great Britain declares that the main Turkish demands which are to come before the Near East peace conference at Lausanne, are not regarded favorably by the British government, and will not be agreed to. This was stated in authoritative quarters today.

The Turkish nationalist government has given formal assurance to the allies that the stipulations of the Mudania armistice agreement will be respected, a dispatch from Constantinople said.

PACKING HEAD CONFERS WITH U. S. OFFICIALS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—J. Ogden Armour, head of the Armour Company, conferred today with officials of the federal government here regarding the situation in the packing industry. It was indicated some announcement of a realignment of the packing interests might be expected shortly.

MEXICO SHOCKED OVER LITTLE TEXAS LYNCHING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The Mexican embassy has made representations to the state department against the alleged lynching of a Mexican by the name of Elias Villareal Huarate, in Weslaco, Texas, last Saturday, and asked for guarantees for the Mexican consul in Hidalgo, Texas, whose life is said to have been threatened. The message also asked for protection for all Mexicans in Texas, and throughout the United States.

The embassy's communication was taken under advisement and the state officials of Texas will probably be asked for a full report and further information upon which to form a basis for a reply. The Mexican embassy's representation is understood to charge tolerance or complicity in the lynching on the part of the authorities at Weslaco.

Annual Banquet Paves Way for City Building

Moving forward with a program which will take Ballinger out of the class of the "biggest Little city in Texas," the annual banquet and membership meeting of the Young Men's Business League passed into history Friday night.

The progressive spirit of this city filled the banquet hall at the Central Hotel to overflow, and for nearly four hours the progressive element of Ballinger mixed merriment and mirth with the discussion of commercial problems, civic and social problems, reviewed the problems solved in the past, and laid plans for solving the problems of the future.

A unique program was carried out, covers having been laid for about 250, and every seat in the banquet hall was occupied and extra places had to be provided at the eleventh hour for those who were late in calling for tickets.

The tables were decorated, the yellow autumn color scheme being in effect, with fifteen beautiful young ladies in charge. Orchestra, radio music and "pep" songs were interspersed as the banquet course was served.

Considerable time was taken up in getting acquainted. Each guest was asked to introduce the one seated to their left, and as the introduction went around the table the guests rising to their feet introduced their "neighbor," who in some instances was husband, wife or sweetheart, and the introduction in many cases was accompanied by remarks which created a ripple of fun, or a roar of laughter.

As signified by the invitations sent out and the program arranged for the occasion the meeting was held for the purpose of pushing Ballinger one notch forward in civic and commercial work, and for the purpose of bringing members of the Young Men's Business League together in a social meeting and to elect directors for the ensuing year.

Secretary Williams and the various committees planned well for the meeting and deserve credit for the successful manner in which it was carried out. Annual Report of Y. M. B. L. Being Sent to All Members

In order that each member may have time to review the work of the Young Men's Business League during the last two years, before the banquet Friday night, a copy of the biennial report is being mailed to each member today.

The present month marks the close of over two years organized progressive activity in this city and the report mailed to each member reviews the work, and makes a good showing for the organization.

Time and space forbid publishing the report in full, but it is presented to each member in such shape that only a short time will be required to read it. The report is given under sub-heads of agricultural activity, trade extension, civic improvement, education, highways and touring, streets, industries and public utilities, conventions and celebrations, retail credits, irrigation, service, publicity and advertising, and it deals with ninety-three items.

Under the head of agriculture the most important items handled, and handled very successfully are the poultry show, county fair, and aid given farmers by the league.

In trade extension work the league reviews its activities in handling propositions tended to increase trade here, bringing to Ballinger trade from a distance, and arranging special trades days, etc. and special advertising campaigns which resulted most successfully. Nine different items are emphasized under this division of the work.

The league reviews its activities in aiding in civic work of the city, dealing with the movement for white way lighting system, park and street work, clean-up campaigns, support of band, etc.

During the life of the organization the efforts of the league have been devoted to aiding in educational work in connection with summer schools, teachers' institutes, support of increased tax rate for school, support of library and health work in schools.

The league has aided greatly in good roads work, establishing of highways thru Ballinger, marking of highways, printing of maps, providing tourist grounds, and advertising Ballinger as a desirable place for tourists to stop, and distribution of literature advertising the highways passing thru this city.

The Y. M. B. L. has taken the lead and vigorously supported the bond issue for street paving, and carried on a campaign for creating sentiment favoring better streets, better lights.

The organization fostered the municipal light plant, the Citizens Ice Company, water works improvements, and repeatedly made an effort to locate a flour mill here, and encouraged the public to use made-in-Ballinger products.

The Retail Merchants Association has been maintained in connection with the Y. M. B. L. and thru this organization the local merchants have been kept posted on credits, and the association has handled many bad checks in such way as to save the merchants considerable money. More than \$2500 in "cold" checks have been recovered by the association.

The Y. M. B. L. is devoting much time to promoting the Colorado irrigation project, which will

mean so much to this city and county. This is one of the big items on the program and most of the members are familiar with what has been done along this line towards completing the surveys, preliminary work, etc.

The last bit by no means least, a publicity program has been carried out which has made Ballinger better known throughout the state and nation. Many daily papers, magazines, and other publications have carried matter about Ballinger which has attracted much attention. Through exhibits at fairs, and through hundreds of columns of reading matter Ballinger and Rannels county have been given the greatest publicity in their history, and at present one thousand extra copies of The Banner-Ledger are going into the homes of people in the Ballinger trade territory, which will be of permanent good and mutual benefit, as many of these readers will become regular subscribers to the weekly paper.

Notwithstanding that the last two years have in many respects been the most trying on the commercial world, the local commercial organization has weathered the storms, and kept sails flying for the betterment of Ballinger, and a review of the work makes a wonderful showing. LITTLE PROTEST TO SREET PAVING

The city commission met Thursday to hear causes, if there were any, why levy for property owners' cost in street paving should not be made. Several called seeking information as to how payments would be collected, etc., but very little opposition developed, and no protests were filed.

The city commission announced that further hearings would be held, if necessary, and one or two parties appeared before the commission Friday seeking information and minor objection to expense was raised on the part of some, but it is not believed that any action will be taken that will in any way delay the work.

Attorneys who have examined the records and procedure of the commission in carrying on the street paving program express the opinion that everything is in due form and no gaps or loop holes have been left which would cause litigation and delay the work.

With this part of the work out of the way, there is nothing to prevent the contractor from getting on the job, and actual work should begin at an early date. The contract provides that the paving be completed within eighty working days.

The equipment for the street lighting system is here and the street lights will be installed before the paving is put down.

Mr. Bartee has been living in this county for a long time, and last year he drifted over into Coleman county. He made a crop failure last year, but came back in good shape this year. He returned to Rannels and is farming on the Wright place on Route 2 out of Talpa. He gathered 23 bales of cotton off 72 acres—not so bad for a dry year, and stated that he would realize almost \$3,000 from the sale of his cotton crop, and that he will be able to break even with the world again.

FOUR BILLS IN FEDERAL COURT

Four indictments were returned by the federal grand jury at San Angelo this week, and a number of cases disposed of by pleas of guilty and by convictions. Frank Philip, who was arrested near Rowena for possessing equipment for making booze, plead guilty and was fined \$25. Vine Slenarik and Joe Philip, who were charged jointly with Frank Philip, were released. The San Angelo Standard reports the court proceedings as follows:

Four indictments, charging conversion of United States funds, blackmail, violation of the Harrison anti-narcotic law and theft of postoffice moneys at Star, Mills county, were returned by the grand jury and two pleas of guilty to liquor charges were entered Wednesday morning in United States court for the San Angelo division of the Northern district of Texas.

E. R. Hays, of Abilene, plead guilty to the possession of intoxicating liquors and was fined \$200. Hays and Ed Floyd were arrested at Sonora in January 1922, and Hays was charged with having had 153 quarts of tequila at the time. The case against Floyd is pending. Frank Philip plead guilty to possession in Rannels county of equipment for the illicit manufacture of liquor and was fined \$25. Cases against Vine Slenarik and Joe Philip, who were charged jointly with Frank Philip, were dismissed.

Albert Miller, clerk in the Brownwood postoffice, was indicted for fraudulently obtaining and converting to his own use \$33.95. Roy E. White was billed for attempting to blackmail Cameron Marshal at Brownwood in letters written September 8 and 11, demanding that Marshal produce \$500 in lieu of withholding certain information "of unlawful and immoral acts and crimes" which White pretended to possess and threatened to divulge. White demanded that the money be left in an envelope on the mountain where the reservoir is located in Brownwood.

Frank Scott and John Kyle were indicted for selling morphine in Brown county without paying the special tax to the collector of internal revenue which is required of licensed dealers in opium or socca leaves. The offense is alleged to have been committed June 1, 1921, and involved 120 quarter grain tablets of morphine. Walter Reeves was indicted for the theft of funds totaling \$1,538.68 from the postoffice at Star, Mills county, on December 1, 1920, and on various dates prior to October 7, last year.

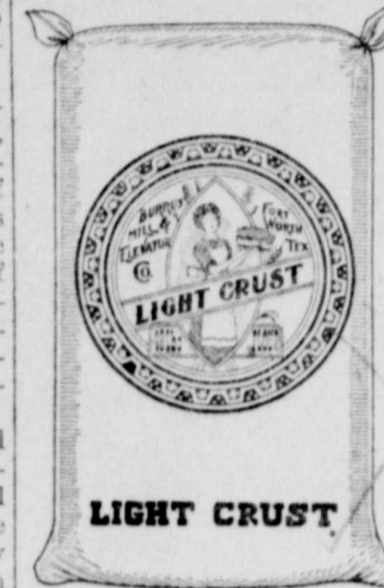

Temple Man Loses Family At Hands of Cruel Turks

TEMPLE, Nov. 14.—The Smyrna fire and massacre has been brought home to Temple's Greek colony by the practical confirmation of the death of John Attas' entire family of five in the Smyrna disaster. Relatives of Attas, local restaurant man, have written him from Greece that their efforts to trace the fate of his mother, father, brother and two sisters who lived in Smyrna have failed and they are certain that they were all lost in the catastrophe.

"I can see it all in my mind's eye," said Attas, who served with the Greek armies in 1907 and 1914 against the Turkish forces. "I have seen two Armenian massagers and I know the cruelty of the Turks. I have seen them burn and pillage cities and I have seen their hatred for the Armenians."

"Once I saw Turks carry Armenians' heads upon their bayonets and I have seen them search out the last Armenian in a city to kill him. They would go into an Armenian household and drag out the entire family to murder them on the streets."

"I can see the fate that befell my own family. The Turks should be exterminated. They have no civilization at heart and can never be changed."

"My brother, who was in the Greek army before the fall of Smyrna, wrote me that there was some mysterious turn of the French policy which worked against the Greeks. He said that in a group of 1,000 Turks taken, there were 300 Frenchmen, seventeen French officers and practically all artillery and equipment was French."

When the news came that Smyrna was being besieged by the Turks Attas made an effort to cable his father money with which to effect the escape of the family. Recently the money was returned by a New York exchange firm with the tragic notation:

"Unable to locate addressee."

STREETS READY TO BE PAVED

All the preliminaries are out of the way, and it is now up to the street paving contractor to get on the job. Under the terms of the contract, work is supposed to begin by December first, but it is probable that dirt will be turning before that date. City Engineer Pirie has been notified that the machinery is on the road and the contractor is expected here immediately.

The City Commission has heard complaints from property owners, but so far as is known no steps have been taken, nor will be taken to block or delay the work. The law has been complied with in every particular, and technicalities could at best only cause a delay, and it is believed that the work will go right ahead.

Mr. Pirie stated Tuesday that it was not known yet where the work would begin, but that the work would be carried on in such a way as to cause the least interference with traffic. One block, or probably two, will be closed to travel at a time. The curb and gutter crew will do its work first. This crew will be followed by the grade crew, then comes the concrete crew, and the brick crew will follow the concrete crew, about two weeks time being given the concrete to dry before the bricks are laid. The streets will be opened to traffic in a short time after the bricks are put down.

Workmen are already building concrete boxes, and preparing for barricading the streets while the work is in progress.

HUMBLE OIL FIRE LOSS \$1,000,000

HOUSTON, Nov. 14.—The Humble oil field fire is practically extinguished today after raging for two days and nights. There is no fear that the flames will spread to adjoining tanks, and it is believed that the situation is now well under control.

The total loss in dollars and cents amounts to around one million dollars, caused by the burning of three quarter million barrels of Gulf Coast heavy gravity crude oil in two tanks. The oil loss was the property of the Gulf Pipeline Company.

The oil boiling over from the burning tanks threatened to carry the fire to other tanks, and only by the heroic efforts of the workmen was a vast quantity of oil saved from destruction. The fire started from lightning striking one of the tanks about six o'clock Sunday afternoon.

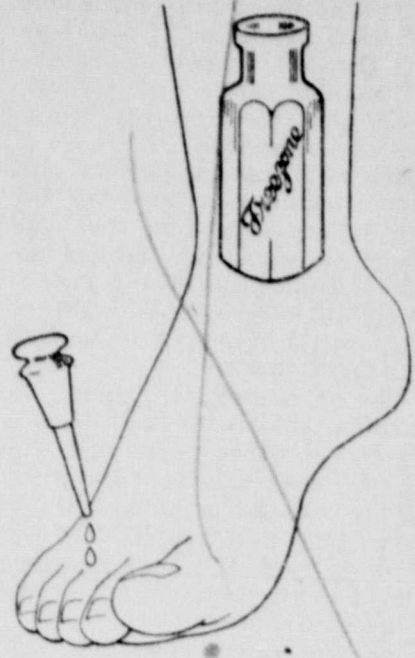

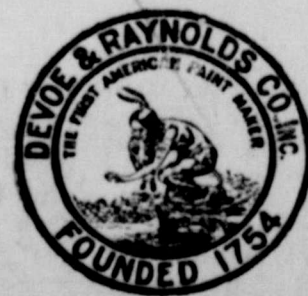

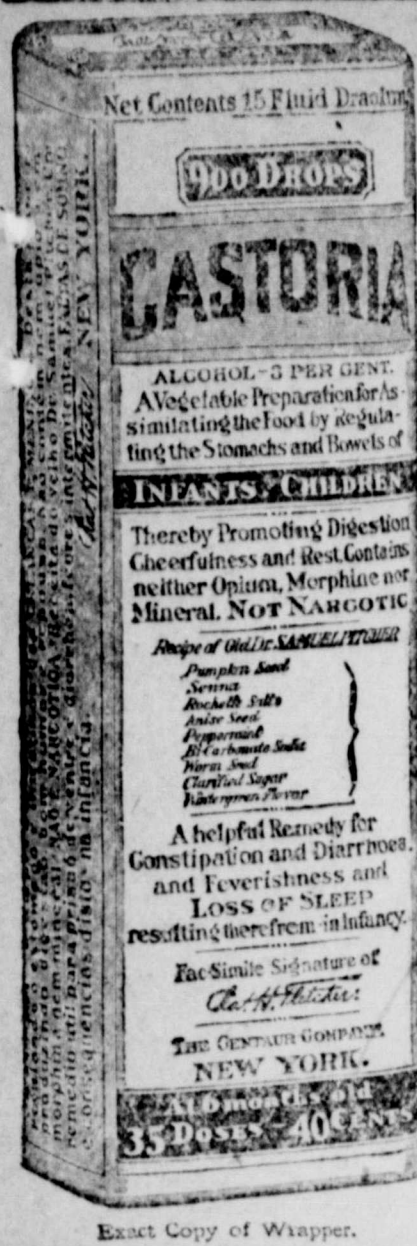

MANY HERE TO ATTEND FUNERAL

The remains of G. B. Nixon were laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Friday afternoon at two o'clock. At the request of Mr. Nixon there were no floral offerings as a tribute of respect and love from those who had known him for many years, but friends from far and near followed his remains to the last resting place.

The funeral was held from the Stanley Cameron place in West End, where Mr. and Mrs. Nixon have been living since they returned from Mineral Wells where they spent several months for the benefit of Mr. Nixon's health. The services were conducted by Rev. J. L. Speer, of Winters, and Rev. W. P. Crow, of Abilene, pioneer citizens of this country, and who had known Mr. Nixon for many years. The pall bearers were chosen from the pioneer stockmen of Runtels county, and who had been almost life time friends of the deceased. A long procession of friends followed the remains to their last resting place. Complying with the request of Mr. Nixon a horse drawn hearse was used in order that his favorite buggy horse which he had driven for many years might help to carry him to his last resting place.

Green Nixon was born in Newton county, Georgia, on July 5, 1855, and at the time of his death he was 67 years, 4 months and 4 days old. He came to Runtels county before Ballinger was organized, and during his life time here he acquired considerable land. For many years he resided on Coyote Creek, near where the town of Hatchel is now located. Later he moved to Ballinger and built a home, and while living here he lost his wife. Marrying again, Mr. Nixon located on his ranch twelve miles west of Ballinger, where he lived until his health began to fail, and he then went to Mineral Wells. His stay in Mineral Wells failed to prove of any benefit, and he returned to Ballinger, gradually growing weaker until Thursday afternoon, when the end came at two-thirty o'clock, the death angel claiming one of the county's most liberal hearted citizens.

Deceased is survived by his wife and other relatives.

The drill is going down in the Safety First well at a rate of 25 or 30 feet, operating only with a day shift. The well promises all that a wild cat could promise, and those pushing this piece of development are optimistic.

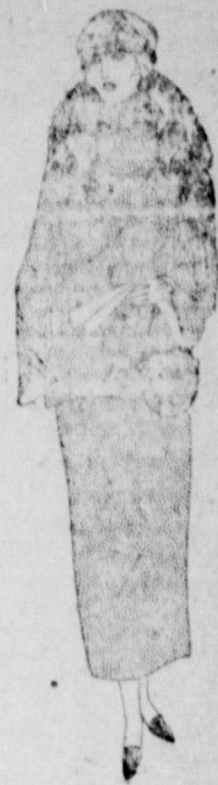

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Nov. 15.—The A. & M. College of Texas has begun the formulation of plans whereby the radio experimental activities of the electrical engineering students and the agricultural information collected and disseminated at the institution every day by the specialists of the college, may be joined in such a way as to give those who benefit by access to radio receiving sets periodical reports of an educational nature which may be of great value to them, particularly those who are engaged in agricultural enterprise.

President Bizzell has appointed a committee of specialists representing the agricultural teaching division, the agricultural research division and the agricultural extension division to assist Dean F. C. Bolton of the electrical engineering department in sending out regular programs that will place the state agricultural college in a position of greater service to the general public. The Y. M. C. A. is also represented on the committee by the secretary, who has charge of all the social activities, entertainment programs and other features of interest at the college, assuring that entertainment features will also continue to be included on the programs broadcast from here.
