

## Landon Hotel Destroyed By Fire; No Bodies are Found In Ruins

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 20.—The Landon PEN PICTURE OF Hotel, a \$100,000 structure, and one of the best known hotels in Texas, was destroyed by fire shortly afternoon today. The fire broke out in the linen room, it is believed, and the flames rapidly spread through the building to the top floor.

The fire started at one o'clock and by two o'clock the building was practically gutted, and the fire company was bending every effort to prevent the flames from spreading to the Lyric Theatre.

The hotel register was destroyed, and it could not be learned at a late hour whether any lives had been lost in the fire or not. Mrs. S. R. Senor, wife of the publisher of the Forward Southwest, a magazine published at San Antonia, and formerly secretary of the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce, was trapped on the second floor and overcome by smoke. She was rescued and rushed to the hospital in an unconscious condition.
