THE flight of a pilotless army plane across the Atlantic gave the first real hint that the air corps is quietly building a nucleus for the use of robot planes in every type of warfare.

Located at Eglin Field, Fla., this unit has not only V-2 rockets, but also pilotless planes, under its scope. Its pilots and technicians can sit at the controls of a mother plane and guide a squadron of bombers over a target several miles away.

Chief problem now stamping the guided missile group is how to operate without a mother plane, or without radio navigation beacons in the country to which the plane is flying.

Tax Reduction Is Likely

A DEMOCRATIC senator back from the Rockies says people are not much interested in tax reduction. His vote, says the Truman veto was not probed it so well as to suggest a concerted plan has been made to talk along this line.
