Report Tells of Needs in **Ballinger School Rooms**

An inspector of the State Department of Education was in Ballinger a short time ago and went through the schools here visiting in every department and taking close notice of the operations and working of the local schools.

A report was sent in to the state superintendent's office by the inspector and in turn the state superintendent reported the result of the inspection to the officials of the Ballinger schools.

"1. That the following needs receive careful consideration and attention as indicated:

"a. Apparatus for the general science laboratory must be provided before effective laboratory wided before effective laboratory work can be expected. At present the experiments in this course are all demonstrations by the

"b. An up-to-date American history chart is needed to replace the one now in use.

"Since a two-room frame building on the grounds is available, it is suggested that this building be considered as quarters for the vocational work for boys. This building could readily be converted into a shop for bench work and into a mechanical drawing

"If this change can reasonably be made, it would appear to be a practical change, as the noise, of necessity found in a work-shop, then would not interfere with adjoining classrooms, as is the






