PONTIAC, Mich., Nov. 15.—More than 1,800 stockholders in the old Lincoln Motor Car Company today filed suit for \$6,000,000 against Henry and Edsel Ford, alleging the violation of an agreement to reimburse the shareholders for losses sustained when Ford bought the company at a receiver's sale.

4th Suit is Filed Against Texas Lands

AUSTIN, Nov. 14.—The constitutionality of the "relinquishment act" was attacked today by J. E. Browne, of El Paso, who sought permission from the Texas Supreme Court to institute mandamus proceedings to compel State Land Commissioner J. T. Robison to issue him a prospecting permit on 640 acres of land in Pecos county.

AUSTIN, Nov. 16.—University of Texas students today are celebrating the victory of their debaters last night over the Cambridge University, England, team. The vote taken in the audience gave the debate to the Texas debaters, 281 to 204.

ALY RESIGNS NIGHT POLICE

J. L. Aly, who for the past six or seven months has been serving as night watchman, has handed his resignation to the City Commission, dated to be effective on December 1. The commission accepted the resignation and appointed A. J. Cloud to succeed Mr. Aly.

SIMS IS NAMED CONCHO JUDGE

PAINT ROCK, Nov. 15.—O. L. Sims, eldest son of D. E. Sims, a prominent rancher of this county, has been named to succeed Judge D. C. Broyles, who died last week at his home here. The appointment was made Monday at a meeting of the commissioners court.

Flood Control Report Very Unfavorable

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—Southern Congressmen are severely criticizing the principal features of the forthcoming report of the army engineers on the Mississippi valley flood control problem today.

Mr. Sims already has taken the oath of office and assumed his new duties. Until recently Mr. Sims had been in Fort Davis on account of his health, but he has recovered and is now back in Concho county attending to his interests. The court did not transact any other business at this session. Mr. Sims is well known over this section of the state.

City Will Enforce All Parts of Traffic Law By New Order

Chief of Police F. V. McCall Monday night was given instructions by the City Commission to enforce all sections of the traffic ordinance, beginning Thursday, and especially to pay particular attention to double-parking and to make arrests in such cases as he saw fit. This order, part of the minutes of the special session held Monday night, with Mayor Raby and Commissioners Holt and Eubank present, was read by City Secretary J. R. Lusk.

Beginning on Thursday of this week these laws will be enforced and nobody will be shown any favors in regard to violating the traffic ordinance. Slow signs will also be placed around the city school campuses and motorists must take notice it was declared.

This matter has been under consideration for some time, it was learned Tuesday, and the commission has decided to enforce strictly all provisions of the parking laws.

The printers have orders for tags to be used by Chief McCall and when a motorist sees one of these cards on his car it will be the part of wisdom to answer the summons at the city hall it was said.

Fines for first offenders will be \$1 and costs.

The commission had been discussing this matter for something like a month and it was finally unanimously decided to have all sections of the traffic law strictly enforced.

Farmers Ship 3,000 Turkeys in One Train

Three thousand turkeys, worth \$10,000, were shipped from Ballinger Saturday in two cars of one train. The turkeys were No. 1 live fowls and went to Eastern markets. These birds were consigned by members of the Poultry Co-operative Association.

Another shipment will be made for the Christmas market, C. W. Lehmburg, county demonstration agent, announced. Mr. Lehmburg and C. W. Buchanan of the Farm Bureau organized this pool and shipped the fowls to a good market they said.

"Another pool will be worked up for the Christmas market," Mr. Lehmburg stated.

"Our poultry marketing association is coming along very nicely and we feel sure that we will have one of the strongest associations in West Texas within the near future."

IMPORT BEETLES TO COMBAT FRUIT SCALE

AUSTIN, Nov. 14.—Beetles will be used to combat the cottony-cushion scale which fruit trees on the Gulf Coast and in the Rio Grande Valley have become infested, J. M. Del Curto, state plant pathologist of the department of agriculture, has announced.

A colony of Vedalia lady beetles, imported from Australia, has been received by the department of agriculture. After three weeks of propagation, they will be distributed over fruit sections of Texas.

"Medical sprays have no effect on the cottony scale which is menacing the fruit industry," Del Curto said. "We have found the light can be destroyed by these beetles only. After gorging themselves on the scales, the beetles turn cannibalistic and eat each other."

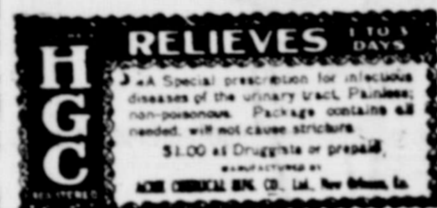
DAUGHERTY DRUG IS BURGLARIZED

DRY WEATHER MAY HURT DUCK HUNTING IN VALLEY

RAYMONDVILLE, Nov. 9.—Duck shooting may not be as plentiful in the Valley section this season as usual, unless rains fall within the next few weeks, according to a statement of Robert Snow, special investigator for the state game department.

Recently Snow, in company with Game Commissioner Charles G. Jones, made a tour of the duck and geese grounds southeast of here, and he reports that practically all of the lakes are dry. Unless these dry beds are filled soon, Snow said, ducks will seek feeding grounds further south in Mexico.

Anticipating that many hunters will visit the Valley during the deer season, which will open November 16, four extra game wardens will be placed in the Valley by the state game department to see that the laws are properly enforced. Two of these will be sent to Cameron and one each to Willacy and Hidalgo counties.

NINE CONVICTIONS IN COURT THIS WEEK

Nine criminal cases have been heard in the 35th district court here this week and convictions were reported in all, however, several received suspended sentences, the criminal docket in the district clerk's office shows.

Henry Weddle went to trial Monday on a charge of possession of intoxicants for the purpose of sale. He entered a plea of not guilty. A jury found him guilty and sentenced him to serve one year in the penitentiary. Wednesday afternoon, Walter C. Woodward, attorney for Weddle, argued a motion for a new trial before Judge J. O. Woodward. This motion was denied and the case will be appealed to the higher courts.

H. D. Galbreath, charged with forgery, was sentenced to a suspended 5-year term, after a plea of guilty.

George T. Thorpe, charged with forgery and passing a forged instrument, entered a plea of guilty

and received a 5-year, suspended sentence.

Tommie Hoffelder, charged with forgery and passing a forged instrument, entered a plea of guilty and received a 5-year suspended sentence.

P. D. Williams, charged with forgery, received a 5-year suspended sentence after pleading guilty.

Ozra Bolding and Walter Gresham, charged jointly with burglary, each received a 5-year suspended sentence.

Wm. Shelton, charged with forgery in three cases, entered pleas of guilty and was sentenced to serve 2 years on each in the penitentiary.

Clayton Bates, charged with forgery, received a two-year sentence in the reformatory after a plea of guilty.

The court was adjourned Wednesday afternoon until 9 o'clock Monday morning, the beginning of the last week of court.

STATE RECEIVES HEADLIGHT TESTING BLANKS

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—More than 1,000,000 headlight testing blanks have been received by the headlight division of the State Highway Department and will be immediately distributed to the various counties of the state, it has been announced by W. B. Schultz, director of the headlight division.

An adequate supply of these blanks will be sent to the county commissioners in each of the 253 counties of the state and by them distributed to the 1,000 or more automobile testing stations, it was stated. The task of testing the headlights of the 1,000,000 automobiles and other motor vehicles in the state will commence on December 1 and continue to January 1. A fee of twenty-five cents is charged by the testing station for making an examination

of each motor car.

When an automobile owner appeals to the county tax collector for his 1928 license plate he must have in his possession and exhibit the certificate from a testing station showing he had his lights tested, according to a provision of the law. No new license number plate will be issued until the car owner shows he has had his headlights tested, it was pointed out.

MILLER BACK IN JAIL HERE

George Miller, wanted here on a charge of burglary in connection with a robbery recently committed in Rowena, was returned to Ballinger Sunday morning by Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and Ray Howard, who went to Oklahoma City last week to get the man.

Miller had jumped his bond of \$1,000, and was arrested last week in Oklahoma City.

Extradition papers were granted by the governor of Oklahoma and the local officers went after the prisoner.

Miller, it is said, will plead guilty this week in district court here.

Sheriff McWilliams stated they left Oklahoma City at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and drove into Ballinger Sunday morning at 2 o'clock. The speedometer registered 482 miles.

COLORADO COAL STRIKE AIDS OKLAHOMA OIL

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 14.—The strike in the coalfields of Colorado has opened a new outlet for Oklahoma petroleum products. Smelter mills and other industrial plants at Pueblo and other adjacent places are substituting fuel oil for coal, according to officials of oil companies in Oklahoma.

A natural gas pipeline is being constructed from the Panhandle to Colorado, but it will be late in 1928 before this project is completed.

It is indicated the Colorado companies, including the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, about which much of the strike centers, may continue to consume a great deal of petroleum from Oklahoma, and in the event a favorable settlement cannot be reached, may turn exclusively to its use.

CONCHO JUDGE PASSES AWAY

PAINT ROCK, Nov. 10.—Judge D. C. Broyles, 63, publisher of the Concho (Paint Rock) Herald, county judge and ex-officio superintendent of the county schools, died this morning at 12:35 o'clock from a stroke of paralysis suffered early last Saturday morning at his home here.

Judge Broyles was in a critical condition from the time he became ill early Saturday until the time of his death. No hope was held for his recovery at any time after he was stricken.

For many years Judge Broyles had been a citizen of Concho county and was one of the builders of this section of the state. He boosted Paint Rock, Eden and Concho county whenever he had

an opportunity and was always on the job to help others. He taught school for a number of years in both Eden and Paint Rock. Later he purchased the local newspaper and had been publisher of that organ for many years. For several years he was editor but during the past few years a nephew, Mr. Cope, had been the editor.

Judge Broyles was serving his second term as county judge of this county, having been first elected in 1924 and later re-elected in 1926. He was also prominent in the Methodist church and with newspaper men.

He is survived by his widow; three sons, John S., of Houston; Miles, who is attending McMurry College, Abilene, who were with their father at his death; and Dodson, of New York city, who is en route to Paint Rock; two daughters, Mrs. E. M. Hall, of Winters; and Mrs. Geo. Brown, of

Keyes, Calif., who is also en route to Paint Rock; one sister, Mrs. Florence Cope, of Paint Rock; and four sisters and one brother in Tennessee.

Funeral arrangements are pending the arrival of the son and the daughter, who are expected in Paint Rock tonight or early Friday. The services will probably be held here Friday, with interment in a local cemetery.

Judge Broyles was in Ballinger only a day or two before he was taken ill last week. He was a caller at The Ledger office, and was in good spirits, shaking hands with many friends in this city. He had only recently returned from Corpus Christi, where he attended a Methodist district conference.

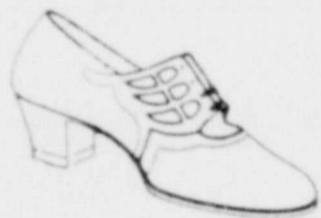

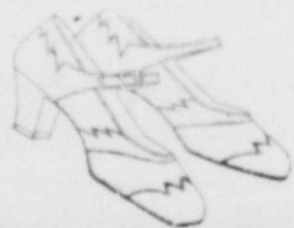

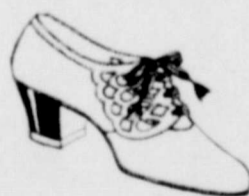

Bearcats win From Brady In Armistice Day Game

Doped to win and declared at least 26 points better than the Bearcats the Brady Bulldogs lost to the Ballinger Bearcats here Friday afternoon in the annual Armistice Day clash, 12 to 6. The game was roughly played on the part of the two Bulldog ends but the Bearcats made their roughness count for fight that the Bearcats manifested throughout the third and fourth quarters.

The Bulldogs played some very good football in the first half, making four first downs to the Bearcats' two, but the Bearcats were playing defensive football during this period although they made a couple of first downs on good drives.

The locals came back with an offensive drive in the third quarter and as Brady kicked off they marched down the field to a touchdown with Arthur taking the ball across in a very pretty 22-yard advance around his own left end.

The Bearcats' other score came in the fourth period with James Parrish taking the oval over on line bucks, Middleton, Bearcat place kicker, missed both tries for the extra point.

Wood, Bulldog left half, scored for the Brady squad in the fourth period when he broke through the line on a fourth down for six inches. The ball had been advanced to the Bearcats' one-foot line by two passes and a good run through the line by Wood, Holland, Bulldog end and drop-kicker, missed the try for the extra point.

Willbanks, Bulldog right end, kicked off 22 yards to Smith, Bearcat tackle, who advanced about three yards and was hurt when tackled. He staid in the next play, but Smoky Lusk went in to play the remainder of the game.

Ballinger made three downs for nine yards, and was forced to kick. Arthur punted 30 yards out of bounds. Brady was held and kicked on the third down to Parrish who returned the ball about ten yards. After making two first downs in succession the Bearcats kicked over the goal line. Brady's ball on her own 20-yard line. They made two first downs and were forced to kick out of bounds on the Bearcats' 22-yard line. The quarter ended with the ball on the Bearcats' 30-yard line, fourth down and one foot to go.

Second Period

Arthur kicked to McKinney, who returned the ball 20 yards. Brady's ball on the Ballinger 31-yard line. Brady was held for downs and on the fourth kicked over the goal line. Ballinger's ball on her 20-yard line. Three downs failed to gain and Arthur kicked 70 yards with the wind taking the ball over the Bulldog goal line. Brady kicked 22 yards to Beck, who returned three yards.

Second Half

Willbanks kicked off for Brady out of bounds. The ball was kicked again and this time Arthur received the ball and returned it 40 yards to the Brady 45-yard line. The Bearcat backs made a first down and then two more plays took the ball to the Brady 22-yard line. Arthur took the ball on an end-run for a touchdown. His interference was good. Middleton missed the extra point from placement.

Willbanks again kicked off for Brady. James Parrish took the ball and returned it 20 yards. The Bearcats made a first down and then kicked 52 yards to the Brady 8 yard line where Coker grounded it. Brady kicked 18 yards to Beck who returned four yards. The quarter ended with the ball on the Brady 24-yard line. First down.

Fourth Quarter

Coker and James Parrish were bucking the line for good gains, and Parrish took the ball over Middleton missed the extra point for placement. Score: Ballinger, 12; Brady, 0.

Middleton kicked off for the Bearcats to Wood, who returned 10 yards. Brady made two first downs on forward passes. An other on a line buck and then Wood took the ball over. Holland missed the extra point. Score: Ballinger, 12; Brady, 6.

Willbanks kicked off for the Bulldogs to Alagood, who had replaced Arthur. Alagood ran 40 yards toward his own goal before he was stopped. Coker made two first downs in succession be-

fore the game ended. The final score was 12 to 6 in favor of the Bearcats.

Coker Starred

Frank Coker, playing left half for the Bearcats, played an unusually good game. Coker, who last year was a gawky lineman, was razzed into a good football player. When he was called on to tote the ball yesterday he never failed and was always good for five yards or more. He brushed through the holes made by Echols and Daugherty for good advances while Captain Parrish made gains on holes opened by Reese and Lusk. Coker was down on the kicks like a young race horse despite the fact that he is not considered a fast man. His defensive game was also good and did not conflict with his offensive work. Both were about the same and very good.

The two Brady ends, Willbanks and Holland played rough football throughout the entire game and there was lots of slugging on the part of the Bulldogs. This was shown by the shiners the Bearcats had at the close of the game.

Arthur's 40-yard return of a kickoff was made through excellent interference. He toted the ball down the west side of the field and for a time it looked like he was off for a touchdown.

Alagood's performance of the return kick was not expected as he had been out of the game for five weeks with an injured arm. With this arm tightly bandaged he went into the game and it was a beautiful run that he made in returning the last kick-off.

Cervenke, another Ballinger back, who was injured in the Eden game, did not get into the conflict. He is suffering an injured ankle.

Wood, McKinney and Strickland were the outstanding players on the Brady team. They made good gains and had Strickland not been relieved in the second quarter with an injured ankle he would probably have been a greater star. Cherry, who took his place, could not do so well against the locals. He was thrown for losses almost every time he tried for a gain.

Two bad fumbles cost the Bearcats some good gains early in the game.

This win gives the Bearcats only one loss at the hands of a Class B team, that to Brownwood, and the Bulldogs defeated Brownwood a short time ago, 6 to 0.

Broadway Paving to Be Settled Within 30 Days

Within the next twenty or thirty days property owners on Broadway will know whether the street is to be paved from the Santa Fe tracks to Sharp Street, nine and a half blocks, or whether the paving money will be placed on another street. At that time a meeting of the City Commission will be held jointly with the Citizens Committee to determine the attitude of resident property holders.

The recent petition signed by about 25 people living on Broadway, asked that the street be paved the entire width of 25 feet on each side with an open space in the middle of the street. Eleven of these petitions signed a previous petition circulated by the Citizens Committee asking that the street be paved a uniform width of 50 feet with curb and gutter for the entire distance.

According to the two petitions these eleven people have changed their minds about the paving and now want it done a different way.

This question will be settled at the meeting held by the commission to hear reasons why the paving should not be carried out as originally planned.

The first petition was signed by some 35 property owners and tax payers while the second was signed by about 25.

Several hundred dollars were spent by the city in having engineers make a preliminary survey on the basis of the first petition it was stated Wednesday.

Several citizens called at the city hall Wednesday morning to learn just what the paving question was about, and it appeared that they want the improvement carried out as originally planned.

Engineer Explains Paving
R. F. Davis, of Forsgard & Davis, of Houston, engineers, who has been here for several months superintending the engineering for the paving, in an interview with a reporter for The Ledger, explained the city's original plan for paving Broadway, Hutchings Avenue and Eighth Street.

"The city's plan," Mr. Davis declared, "calls for a street 50 feet wide from Park Avenue, just beyond the railroad tracks on Broadway, to Sharp Street, the corner of Dr. J. W. Blasdel home, with a 7-inch curb and an 18-inch gutter, the curb and gutter to be of concrete. The paving is to be of a 2-inch topping of rock asphalt over all of a 6-inch gravel base. From the tracks to Park Avenue the street will be 60 feet wide. The distance from the tracks to the corner of Dr. Blasdel's property line is 9 1-2 blocks. The contracts, Brown & Root, of Georgetown, have a 5-year maintenance guarantee with their contract for the work.

"The cost to the property owners, which will be one-third of the entire cost of paving the streets, will be about \$190 per 50-foot front or about \$3.80 per front foot, including the curb and gutter.

"This also applies to Eighth Street to the corner of the Charles Castor property on Largent Street from Park Avenue, to which the paving on Eighth Street now extends.

"The original plans called for a 70-foot street on Hutchings Avenue to the city line, which is just beyond the A. & S. tracks, near the Colorado River bridge, but recently there has been some talk of making this street 60 feet wide with uniform curb and gutter.

"The width of Broadway, from property line to property line, at the Park Avenue entrance, is 100 feet, and it is that wide to the west corner of the R. T. Williams property where the turn is made. From that point to Sharp Street the street is 80 feet wide.

"The width from curb to curb, starting at Park Avenue is 75 feet, while at the First Presbyterian Church corner it drops to 72 feet; at the First Christian Church corner it is less than 71 feet; at Dr. W. W. Fowler's corner, it is 69 feet; at the R. T. Williams corner it drops three more feet, to 66 feet. From that turn on to the end the width from curb to curb is about 55 feet.

"On the east side of Broadway after the turn is made there is very little curb, while on the west side, most of the property is curbed about the right way, but

the grade is quite a bit off. "On Eighth Street the curb to curb distance is 50 feet part of the length, while out further it is 54 feet.

"Property owners have five payments to make on the paving, the first due on or before 30 days after the city accepts the street, and the other four payments to be made yearly with 8 per cent interest on deferred payments. All the paper will be made out 'on or before'."

Mr. Davis declared that there was much misunderstanding as to how the pavement project was to be carried out and that if those citizens who did not clearly understand the program would come to the city hall an effort would be made to explain all the minor details of the work and why the engineers, the city and the Citizens Committee believed the 50-foot paving plan to be better for Broadway.

HAREM CARAVAN FOR KING OF ARABIA IS SHIPPED FROM LONDON

LONDON, Nov. 15.—A wonderful motor harem has just glided through the streets of London en route for the desert.

This harem, a marvelous motor caravan, has just been completed at the Star works, and was on its way to Arabia.

The man who has helped the King of Arabia to design his new fleet of cars is Stuart Marr, who served in Arabia under Col. Lawrence.

"The car will carry the Royal wives across the desert at 55 miles an hour," says Marr. "The king is constantly making long journeys from Mecca to Medina and across to the Persian Gulf. He naturally wants his wives to go with him. But they must never be seen by men, and the king is very strict about it.

"So these cars—there are two of them—were made to carry his 24 wives from place to place. There are no windows, light being admitted through opaque glass in the roof. The 12 wives are locked in, and an electric fan keeps them cool—more or less. They may have to travel as much as 1,100 miles in these. They sit six aside, on the pile of carpet which is fixed to the floor of the car.

"Two other cars of the same size are open. They are for the king's guard of 50 warriors. Armed to the teeth, these picked fighting men will travel with the king and his wives, and woe betide anyone who gets in the way.

"There are also four touring cars for the king and his suite. These will do 65 miles an hour. The fleet of eight cars has cost \$55,000. Each car is covered in polished aluminum. Enormous tires, costing \$375 a set, were specially made to bear the load in the rough desert."



**CENSUS SHOWS PRISONERS'
AVERAGE AGE IS ONLY 32**

ROWENA MAN WILL DEVELOP NEW OIL TOWN

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 12.—The Yates oil field in Pecos county, which ranks as one of the greatest production areas in the country, soon will have a full-grown town in the middle of the field. Ira G. Yates, of San Angelo, owner of the land on which the gushers have been brought in, has leased the Red Barn townsite to Paul C. Halameiek of Big Lake, and his brother, W. A. Halameiek, of Rowena. They paid \$20,000.

This payment gives them a lease for ten years, not including oil and mineral lease. There are six buildings on the site at the present time and others are to be built within a short time. Some are under construction now.

There is a small store on the site being run by Mr. Halameiek. There are a number of oil camps near which lend support to the small town. The Marland Oil Company and Illinois Pipe Line Company each has a camp there. The Humble and Mid-Kansas oil companies have camps about a mile away.

FIRST CONCRETE ROAD FOR TOM GREEN SOON

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 10.—Tom Green county soon will have its first concrete highway. Bids for such a highway in this county will be let at Austin next Monday by the State Highway Commission. This information has been sent T. J. Kelly, Tom Green county engineer. He will go to Austin for the letting.

The road will start at the end of the paving near Wall and will continue to the county line, a distance of 15.67 miles. It is on state highway No. 9, which runs from Amarillo to San Antonio, through San Angelo. The county will be assisted by 63 per cent state and federal aid, while the county funds will come from the \$500,000 bond issue of 1925.


