RANGER, May 1 .- J. L. Thompson, 50, and Luke Lawton, 45, prominent local oil men, drowned this morning in Lake Olden, five miles west of here when their fishing boat sank.

Sam Thompson, a brother of the first named victim, saved himself after repeated efforts to rescue his companions.

Eastland county authorities are dragging the lake for the bodies.
