DEATHS BY AUTO A R E INCREASING IN UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, April 26 .- Automobile fatalities are increasing throughout the United Statesand rather alarmingly.

In 1927 the number of persons killed or fatally injured in automobile accidents increased much more rapidly than either the increase in population or the registration of cars, according to statistics just made public by the Travelers Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn.

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Reports were received from forty-two states and the District of Columbia. They showed an increase of 8.46 per cent in the number of motor fatalities in Vir




