





If a small amount of vaseline is rubbed on the hinge of a new umbrella before using, it helps prevent rusting.

When using scotch tape, fold over the end on the spool. Then the next time the tape is to be used, cut off the folded part, and it's ready for use.

When baking bread and the crust becomes burnt, use a small grater and rub it lightly over the burnt crust. You'll be surprised with how easily it is removed. It is weeping so the bris-with how easily it is removed.

Improvise a sleeve board by taking the kitchen rolling pin and wrap it with several clean tow-els. This forms a firm padded sur-face to slip into the sleeve and iron over.

Do not wash the bag of your vacuum cleaner. Washing re-moves the special finish that makes the bag dustproof. Brush the bag instead.
