Mrs. Griffin is a farmer's daughter, and life in our suburb has left her starved for country flowers and colors. We worked out a delightful color-scheme for her kitchen which will make her think she's back on her beautiful farm!

A "Country-Colored" Kitchen

Floor, green and brown linoleum; walls, from the floor to the height of your shoulder, yellow-buff wallboard tile; from tile to ceiling, sky-blue. Wallpaper border of wild flowers at ceiling. Tables, chairs, cabinet, refrigerator, etc., light green; white por-celain enamel stove; white curtains with wild flower design.



Canned Peas

Restore the fresh taste with a halfteaspoon of sugar. Put peas on to cook with the sugar, salt and pepper to taste, a lump of butter and a half-cup of milk. Allow to cook for 10 minutes, or until peas are well-flavored with the seasoning

Canned Beans

Buy the tiny, uncut beans. Season them with a tablespoon of butter, a taste of sugar and salt. Bring to boil. Put in a half-cup of milk. Reheat but

Canned Soups

These can be made delicious if they are used as the base of soups to which other ingredients are to be added. Put soups. Evaporated milk can be used instead of fresh, if desired. Put a cup or two of meat stock into all vegetable soups. Dilute other soups with a little water and season to taste.

Cream of Corn Soup

- 1 cup canned corn
- 3 cups milk 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon fat

Hints on "French Fries"

French fried potatoes are crisper if cooked over a moderate, instead of a brisk, fire. If you are using a gas or a modern oil stove, don't use the full flame; keep it moderately low.

to Carlsbad Cavern and over the theky, plains region. Mr. Patterson reported that they encountered rain and mud both going and returning, and on August 18 they were obliged to have their car pulled across the Brazos River near Justiceberg with a wagon and team.

At this crossing 75 to 100 cars were blocked on each side of the river, wating to be pulled across by one of six teams and wagons operating from bank to bank for a one-dollar fee. Water reached a high point on the cars in the stream, he said.

Recently, when the river was on a rise, two ears and a truck were lost in the water and quick sand at this point, and a new Club Activities Buick coach was pulled to pieces while efforts were being made to remove it from the shifting sands where it was firmly anchored, Mr. Patterson stated.

Writing of the Carlsbad Cavern, Mr. Patterson asserted: "It was discovered by a cowboy named White in 1901. He rode up to sit on top of the mountain overlooking the entrance, and observed myriads of bats flock ing out of the mountainside. The continuous stream of bats flitted out for three hours, and the cowboy concluded that there must be a large cavity in the moun-

"Later he and a Mexican boy descended the slope cautiously, lowering themselves by means of a rope. They discovered the opening, and made a short exploring trip into the labyrinth of subterranean channels.
