WHERE Does Al Smith Stand?

On the Saloon?

Here are his words: "There is no question of the return of the saloons. When I stated that the saloon is out and ought to be a defunct institution in this country I meant it. I mean it today. I will never advocate or approve any law which directly or indirectly permits the return of the saloon."

On Prohibition Enforcement?

Here are his words: "If with one hand on the Bible and the other reaching up to heaven I promise the people of this country that I will faithfully execute the duties of President of the United States and to the best of my ability preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States, you may be sure that I shall live up to that oath in the very last degree. On Public Schools?

I join with fellow Americans of all creeds in a fervent prayer that never again in this land will public servant be challenged because of the faith in which he has tried to walk humbly with his God.'
