This is as was expected, as eggs always take a tumble after Christmas. <br> Hens, both light and heavy, mamtained their average of a week ago and are still coming on the market fairly well at 15 c per pound for heavies and 12 c for lights. <br> Cream shows a littl improvement over a week ago. For sweet cream buyers are paying 48 c and sour cream brings 43 c . <br> Pecans have taken another drop in price and the straight run variety is selling at only 3 c , with offerings scarce. <br> The turkey market is about closed and few birds are being offered now, with the top price quoted at 20 e for No. 1 birds.
