

Figures Regarding Bond Issues 40th Legislature Teachers Meet Opens Tuesday and City Insurance Key Rate **Coming in April**

AUSTIN, Jan. 7 .- When the Fortieth Legislature convenes Tuesday at high noon, it is likely that the general appropriations bill for the next biennium requesting \$64.284,-840 will be introduced as soon as group organization is completed. If the bill is introduced in the early sessions of legislature, consideration of it will probably be deferred until the special session.

The present biennium budget, ending August 31, 1929, amounted to \$401,754,828 after the board of control had lopped off \$16,655,233 from the requested budget of \$57,-410,061. Request for the next biennium budget is in excess of the present budget by \$6,874,779.

An increase of 100 per cent in the educational budget is seen in the request of \$33,712,538 as compared with \$16,611,734 recommended by the board two years ago.

Two million dollars more is requested by the eleemosynary institutions than was recommended by the board two years ago. The departmental bill will request for an excess of \$3,186,758 over the necessary tax to pay for it would the next biennium \$14,286,255amount granted by the board for be eight cents on the \$100 or 80 the present biennium.

A large increase in the fees allowed those attendant upon the courts provokes an increase of \$1,-549,755 in the judiciary bill for the support of the courts of the state, which amounts to \$4,874,156.

Because the departmental bill will include appropriations for the state prison system, the amount requested for the budget for the next will have an increase of more than \$3,000,000. that no attempt is to be made at the regular session to pass the appropriation bills for the support of States. the state government and state institutions These "money" bills, which carry in excess of \$50,000,000 in recommendations, will be deferred for a 30-day special session. This is usually called by the governor immediately upon the close of the regular session, which ordinarily lasts 65 to 70 days, although the rate of pay of \$5 per day received by the members expires at the end of 60 days, after which the session may be prolonged but the members only draw \$2 per day.

Another important bit of legislation will be a bill to abolish the fee system as a means of compensating justices of the peace and certain other county officers. Both the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and the United States Supreme Court have held the fee system of compensating county officials to be unconstitutional. Previous legislative efforts to abolish this system have met with failure, but this was before the system had been condemned by the higher courts. Many experienced legislators do not believe that it will require a constitutional amendment, but merely a statute, to place all county officials on a cash basis and straight salary.

Legislation regulating water rights in Texas is another subject of major importance that is to be proposed during the regular session. It will echo the famous Brownwood case, which involved the priority rights on the Colorado River and resulted in a longstanding controversy. It will also echo, no doubt, the decision of the court of civil appeals at Austin holding unconstitutional the present law providing for the creation of water control districts.
