SWEET HOME SCHOOL HELD CLOSING EXERCISES TUES.

The last county rural school closed Tuesday, it was announced this morning by County Superintendent R. E. White. The closing exercises were held Tuesday night with four students finishing the ninth grade which is as high as the Sweet Home school includes.

This school has an enrollment of between 50 and 60 and according to reports is one of the best in the entire county. It is a two-teacher school being conducted by Miss Estelle Gillmore and her sister, Mrs. Ella Woodrow.

With the closing of this school all educational work in the Runnels county schools ends until September. September 9 the Norton rural school will open, and this

will be the first rural school in the history of this county to run the full nine months. “This early opening of a rural school marks a new era in school work in this county,” Mr. White stated, and it is thought that it will be only a matter of time until every school is running the full nine months and that each will have practically a first class standing with the State Board of Education.

The new ones are one-third smaller than the old ones, and carry several features not included on the old ones.

These new bills will go into circulation the first of July and the old ones will be called in as soon as possible. All members of the Federal Reserve System have received samples of the new currency.

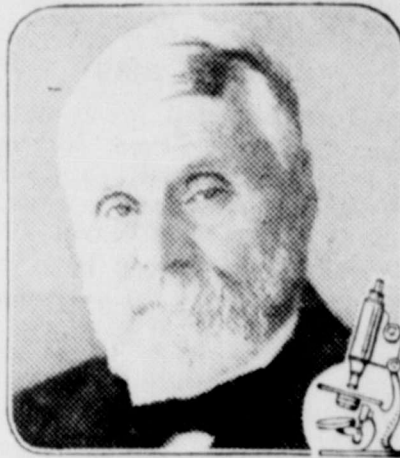

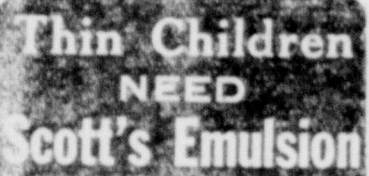

"It was announced that services will probably be held here this afternoon at 5 o'clock from Crompton's Funeral Parlors."

The Mrs. McCall referred to in the above paragraphs, is well known in Ballinger. For the past two years F. V. McCall has been chief of police in Ballinger and only recently left this city when a new chief was named by the new city administration. Mrs. McCall left Ballinger some time before her husband and with the children returned to Waco.

She lived here more than a year and acquaintances here will be grieved to learn of the tragedy at Waco. Chief McCall is known by everyone in Ballinger, after serving as chief of the police force.

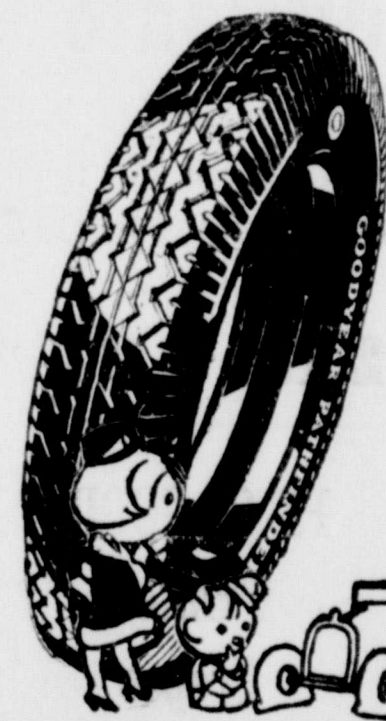

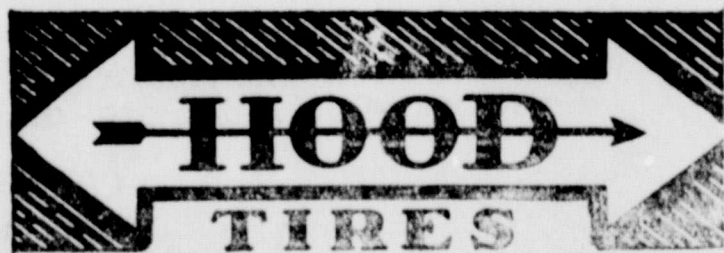

Highway May be Started in 60 Days

The letting of the contract for the paving of the western part of Highway No. 30 in Runnels county has caused a great amount of speculation as to when the actual work would start. County Judge Paul Trimmer and State Engineer G. M. Garrett do not expect any work to be done before 60 days. They state that it might be a little earlier than this and perhaps a little longer.

The contract on this stretch of road was considered a very cheap bid and was really less than that amount for which it was thought the work could be done. The original estimate for the work that was made up after the survey and plans were completed was about \$60,000 higher than the contract called for.

The contract, including bridges, grading, drainage and paving, figures only in the neighborhood of \$28,000 per mile. The cost of the north part of this road was approximately \$27,000 per mile but in that case all the grading and bridges were already completed and much less actual work was required on that part of the road.

The construction of the north end of Highway No. 30 is halted only when it is too wet to work. Work was started Wednesday following the long siege of wet weather and as the ground is dry again the big machine will start its slow march towards Ballinger.

Few Fines Paid In City Court

To make an arrest the traffic officer must wear a gray uniform and his car must bear police signs. This is a warning to drivers and when the officer is in sight everyone obeys the law to the letter, however, when he is not on the street the speeders have a picnic.

From this time on no warning will be given any violator and when a green ticket is issued it will mean a trip to city court the following morning.
