## FIND OLD BONES OF MEN AND ANIMALS

LAS CRUCES, N. M., Sept. 16.—Human and animal life roamed this continent some fifteen or twenty thousand years ago, and horses roamed the plains centuries before Cortez, the Spanish explorer, brought the equine to North America, according to recent startling discoveries made in the Mesilla valley, New Mexico.

Bones of animals and humans have been unearthed in deposits in a cave near Bishop's Cap, the southernmost peak in the Organ range, forty miles north of El Paso, Texas. The period of life was in the pleistocene age, according to scientists, and bones of prehistoric horse, camel, mastodon, cave bear and ground sloth have been removed.

The cave, which has an opening of solid rock, is six feet across and leads sharply downward. Protected from wind and weather, it was

probably the lair of wild animals for centuries. That man also sought refuge in the cave is evident, not only from the bones discovered but because the roof of the cave is smoked-blackened.

Dr. William A. Bryan, archeologist of the Los Angeles museum, has visited the cave and is reported to have said the discoveries are the most important made in the United States in recent years, as they indicate animals and humans roamed the continent possibly as early as twenty thousand years ago.

The original discovery was made by two brothers, Benito and Sefino Benvides, searching for treasure supposedly hidden by Spaniards centuries ago when attacked by hostile Indians.

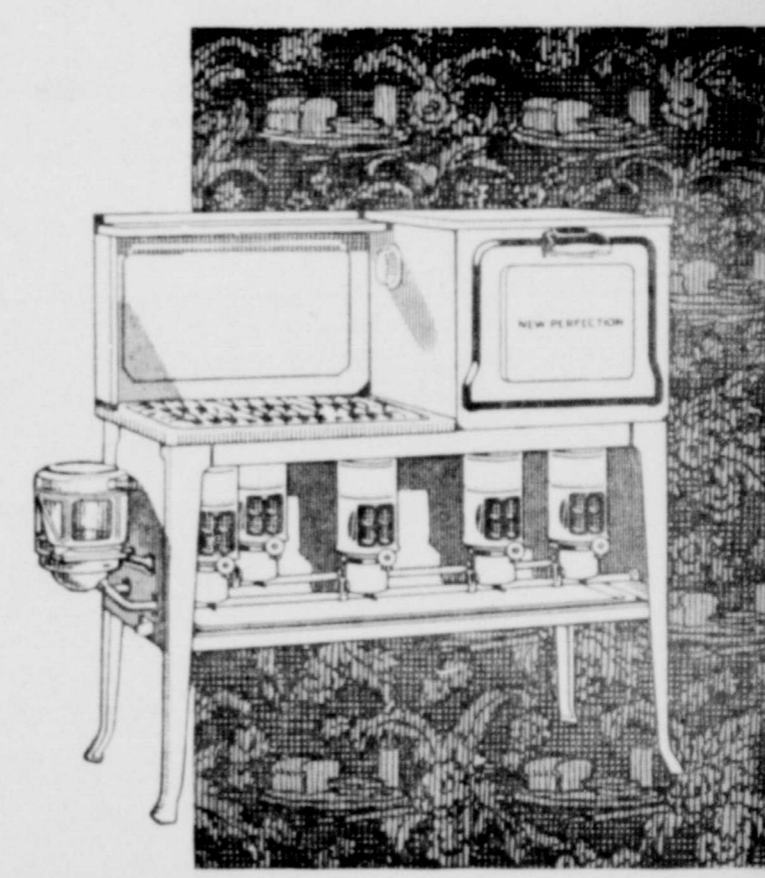

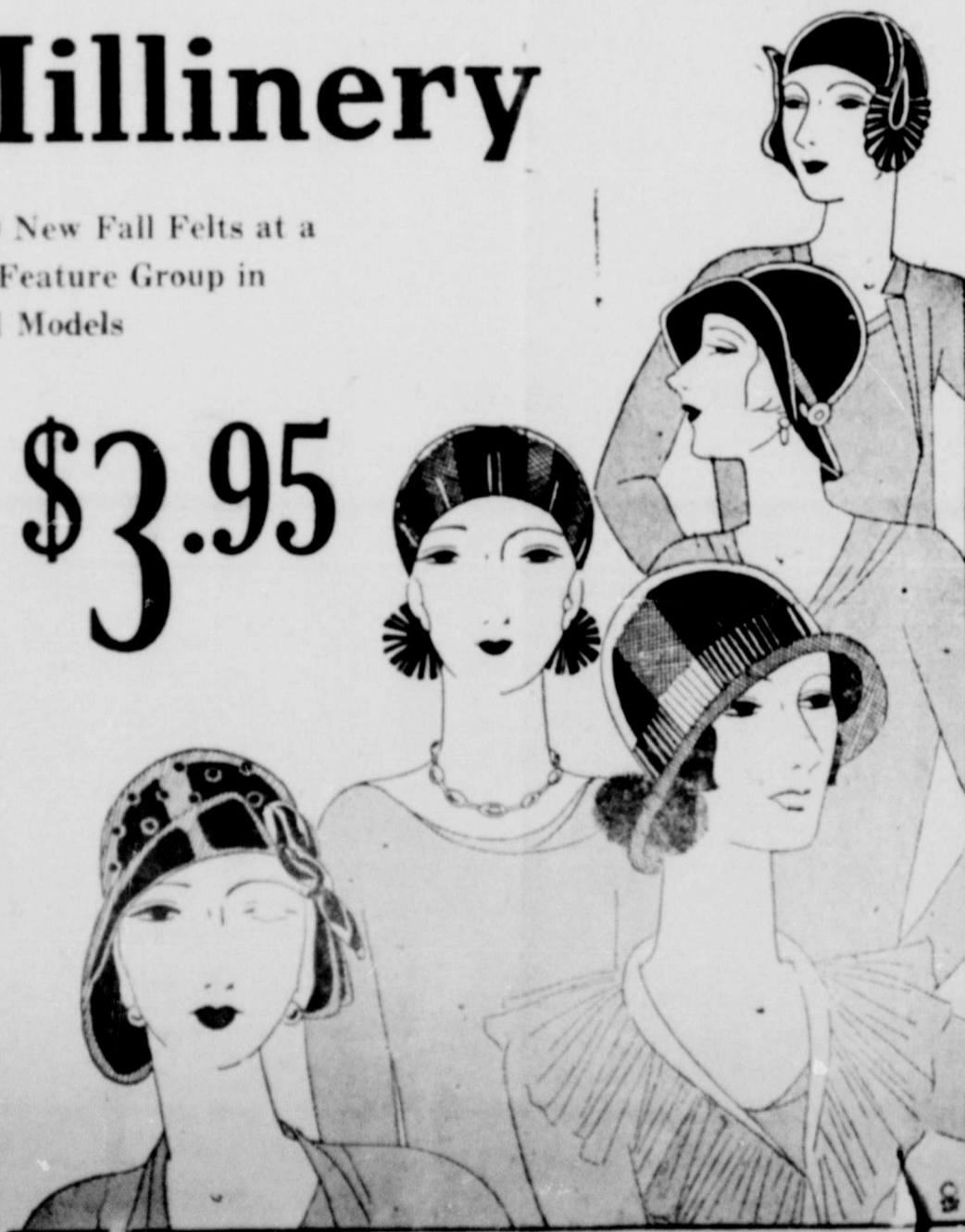

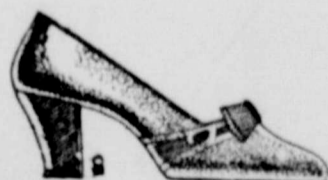

The other youth escaped the wreck and was not injured, assisting his brother to physicians.

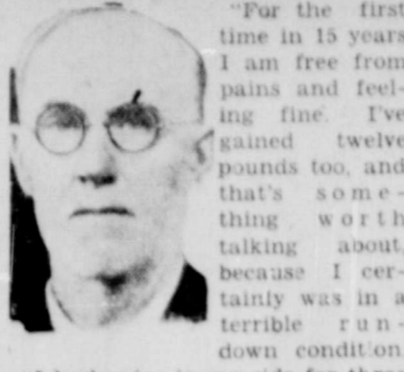
Marshall Chapman, Marshall Chapman died at his home in Winters Friday morning at 4 o'clock following a long illness.

Judge Ross declared that he thought in a way that the extension would injure local business.

No action was asked nor was any taken. Some discussion by citizens was heard, and both sides were granted hearings.

The Santa Fe officials visited Miles and Rowena Friday and endeavored to sound out public sentiment at these towns in the extension, and also solicited the citizens' aid in voicing a protest.

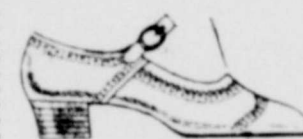
