House Numbers Would Assist Local Officers

Trying to find a particular Muleshoe sometimes presents quite a problem. Local and area police receiving emer-gency calls very often find themselves hampered by the lack of house numbers displayed on homes in the city, according to a Muleshoe City Police Department spokesman.

He said that at times. after receiving emergency calls, the officer is delay ed, especially at night, because there are so many homes which do not have numbers.

It has been suggested that numbers be added to homes, and or paint the house number on the curb in front of the house. This would help officers, and would possibly help ambulance people and other emergency persons, such as fire departments.

Individuals can guess the protein content of hay from physical characteristics, but may miss the actual value by several percentage points. Low quality hay can be distinguished easily from high quality hay, but the true feeding value can only be estimated. This is where a forage test comes in, emphasizes

Tanksley. A forage analysis is a chemically determined value of the protein content of the hay. The result of a forage test is a protein feeding value that can be used to determine the feeding and supplementation needs for each class of animals fed.

For example, six percent crude protein hay does not compare in feeding value to hay with 12 percent crude protein. Each type of hay should be fed differof protein might indicate the types of animals that could be fed with the two hays, notes Tanksley.

A six percent crude protein hay is low in quality not only because the pro-

Eagle Death joyous news of the long-awaited birth of Christ," Investigation role in the early stages of the project by establishing Conducted

James Mangum, a special agent for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, from Fort Worth, was in Bailey County this week investigating the death of a golden eagle.

A farmer found the body of the eagle near the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge south of Muleshoe, and notified Wildlife Refuge Manager Al Jones, who reported the shooting death to Fort Worth.

Mangum said the bird had been shot perhaps within several hours to a day when it was found. The special agent also said both legs had been remov-

ed from the eagle. He reminded that eagles are protected under the Bald Eagle Act and the maximum penalty for conviction on a first offense is \$5,000 fine and one year in a federal prison. Mangum also said there are other penalties which boost the fine amount. He also said that under

the Eagle Act, the U.S. Government will pay a reward to the person reporting such offenses, upon conviction of the violator, of an amount of one half of the fine assessed, not to exceed \$2.500. The special agent asked that anyone with information about the golden eagle killed near Muleshoe please call the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge at 946-3341. Or call Cleta Williams at the Journal, 272-4536. The name of the informant will be kept confidential, concluded the special agent.

COYOTE FRIEND & VILLAIN

Traditionally cast as a villain, the coyote stands condemned of cattle, sheep, goats, chickens and desirable wildlife. However, studies have shown that the coyote is an effective rodent and rabbit control which helps the landowner harvest and store more food and produce more meat for the table.

The abundance or scarcity of the coyote's natural food such as rabbits, rodents, and other prey determines how frequently a covote will visit a chicken house or raid a sheep pen. When times are hard, visits by the coyote may be often, but during times of high rabbit or rat populations, the coyote pays his

The coyote has been trapped, poisoned, show runover, chased and harassed for many years. While this attempt to eradicate the covote has failed to reduce his numbers, it has reduced the old, weak, and foolish from his ranks resulting in a swift and cunning animal producing more of their kind while expanding their range nationwide.

The coyote can add another determined hunter to the list of his pursuers as the price of coyote pelts continues to increase in

Hunting coyotes with sight dogs or trail dogs has been a sport for years, but the use of a predator call and an accurate rifle is relatively new spanning about the last 20 years.

The expense of handling, feeding and transporting hunting dogs has been a deterrent to the new coyote hunter, while the cost of a predator call is within every hunters reach.

The coyote or predator call has improved over the years with many brands and varieties on the market. The new calls are not necessarily more effective, however.

reeds to sound like a rabbit in distress.

The experienced predator caller is most successful when an area holding coyotes is found and scouted prior to the first call.

Ideal coyote country can be pastureland, river or creek bottoms, or even weed patches. Since the coyote hunts at night when the rodents are out feeding, it is hard for the predator hunter to find them at night.

Once an area is found, the hunter can pick a hill or mound overlooking a tract of land with cover and place himself along the side of the hill which breaks his outline.

Movement and sound are two things the coyote will notice first. Do not slam vehicle doors, talk, smoke or make quick movements in the potential calling

Once you are set up, call for several minutes while watching for movement in the area. Slowly move your head scanning the trees, brush, weeds in front and behind you for a coyote slipping up on the "ima-ginary" rabbitt.

The covote has an uncanny ability to come long distances directly to your location. Whether you are hunting or photographing the coyote, be prepared before the coyote gets into range.

The sound of covote howling, his diligent control of destructive rodents, and insects, and the sport and monetary value to the hunter help compensate for the damage he does.

Aside from being useful, the covote is one of the few remaining symbols of a wild, free, self - reliant breed that is not here on earth because of man but in spite of man.

PHEASANT

POPULATION GOOD Texas hunters should find about the same number of ring-necked pheasants during the Dec. 9 - 24 season as last year according to surveys and comments from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel in the Pan-

handle. A slight decrease in the number of birds counted on survey lines could be the results of heavy rains. hail storms, or failure of

some hens to nest twice. The daily bag limit of two used converted duck calls cock birds will be strictly or fashioned their own enforced as will the restriction on pheasant hens. Hunters are reminded to leave the head and feet attached to the pheasant carcass until the bird is delivered to it's final des-

tination. The three areas of high pheasant populations including the Hereford -Dimmitt - Friona region; Stratford - Dumas region: and the Plainview - Kress region, are again expecting large numbers of hunters. Many sportsmen are finding good bird hunting in the less publicized areas where grain, wheat and cover are available.

Most successful pheasant hunters bagged one bird during the 1977 season on the first day. Hunters that were successful on the second day or later in the two week season hunted the heavy cover, fence

Christmas Tree Selection Takes Some Planning

Do you have difficulty selecting the right Christmas tree for your den, living room or large picture window in your home? Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers some guidelines to aid you in making that

First of all, select the right sized tree. Christmas trees on the lot generally appear smaller than they actually are.

Look for a tree with a uniform triangular taper. Check to see that it is free of weak, broken or unduly long branches. The tree should have a well filled out appearance. Shake or bump the base firmly on something solid to determine if the needles are firmly attached. If only a few needles drop, the tree is undoubtedly fresh and is more likely to retain its needles throughout the holiday season.

As soon as you get the tree home, saw an inch or two from the butt end to facilitate moisture uptake. This is essential to maintain the fresh appearance of the tree. Then place the cut end into a container of water and store the tree in a cool, shady place until you are ready to bring it indoors. Add water to the container daily to replace that taken up by the tree. A five or six foot tree may use as much as several pints of water a day. The low humidity found in most heated homes increases the difficulty of keeping the foliage fresh. Use a tree stand that allows the base of the tree to remain in water or wet sand when brought into

the home. Locate the tree so that it is not in the air stream of heating vents or near other sources of heat such as a stove, radiator, fireplace or television set. Also, replenish the water in the

tree stand frequently. As part of a safety program, always check the condition of electrical cords and lights before placing them on the tree. Christmas trees are extremely combustible and a short in the wiring can cause a serious fire. And always turn off tree lights when leaving the house or when retiring for the

rows and playa lakes.

Low Cotton Prices End Week

High Plains cotton prices slid around \$5 per bale the week ended December 7, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services Office in Lubbock. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 around 58.35 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 brought about 53.25 cents, Dickson said.

Gins paid growers \$115 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed.


High Plains Marketing Services Offices graded 170,000 samples week, bringing this sea-son's total to 398,000. This compares to 2,000,000 graded by December 8 last

Staple lengths were mostly staple 31 at 27 percent, staple 32 was 40 percent and staple 33 accounted for 14 percent.


