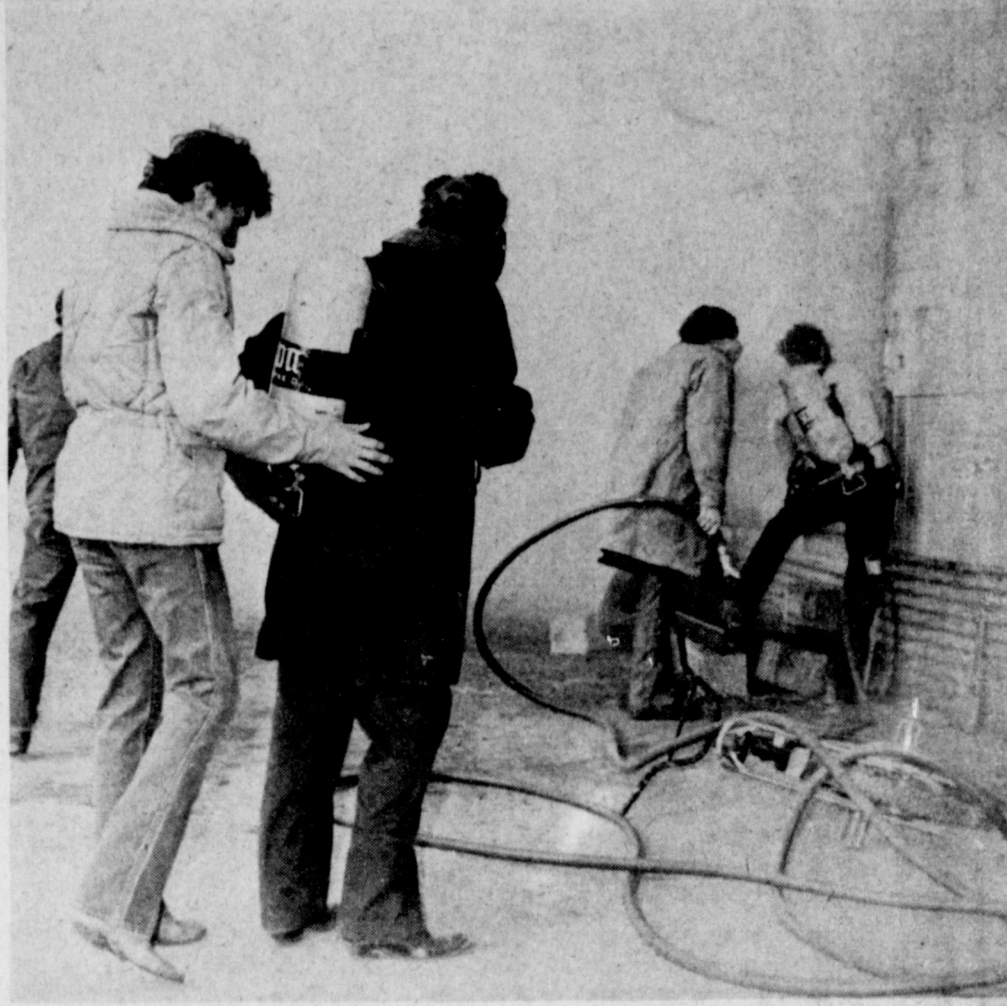
A juvenile from the Maple community was taken to Plainview for an evaluation process preceding her trial on December 22 on a charge of theft of a watch.

Fire Destroys Home, Family Is Homeless

A young Muleshoe couple, who are the parents of three children, returned to their home after a brief absence Wednesday morning, to find that they had no home.

Firemen had been summoned to the home around 11 a.m. Wednesday, after a passerby, James Meason, noticed smoke pouring from the mobile home four miles west of Muleshoe on FM1760.

Responding firemen found the mobile home beyond saving when they arrived, although they did extinguish the blaze within a short time after arriving at the fire site.

Residents of the home, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Wayne Murphy, had come into town, and did not know their home was soon to burn.

Adding to their troubles, earlier in the summer, Murphy, who was at the time an employee of an irrigation company, received a rattlesnake bite which left him partially disabled.

Just recently, Murphy had been able to start back to work on a limited basis, while still receiving treatment and attempting to recover from the near fatal snakebite.

Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department Chief H. E. Reeder said the family lost all of their linens, furniture and clothing in the fire which almost gutted the inside of their home.

He said a few kitchen items, which were behind closed kitchen cabinet doors, escaped the fire. The firemen donated Scott Air Packs and sent into the home to remove smoldering mattresses, bed linens and furniture in an effort to save as much of the family's property as possible.

Mrs. Murphy, who is employed at the Ranch House Motel secured temporary quarters for the family in a rental mobile home at the motel. They are seeking new quarters at this time.

Contributions of clothing for the family are also being sought. Billy is seven and wears a size 10 shirt; eight regular pants; size six underwear; eight shoes.

Eagle Death Investigation Conducted

James Mangum, a special agent for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, from Fort Worth, was in Bailey County this week investigating the death of a golden eagle.

A farmer found the body of the eagle near the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge south of Muleshoe, and notified Wildlife Refuge Manager Al Jones, who reported the shooting death to Fort Worth.

Mangum said the bird had been shot perhaps within several hours to a day when it was found. The special agent also said both legs had been removed from the eagle.

He reminded that golden eagles are protected under the Bald Eagle Act and the maximum penalty for conviction on a first offense is \$5,000 fine and one year in a federal prison. Mangum also said there are other penalties which boost the fine amount.

He also said that under the Eagle Act, the U.S. Government will pay a reward to the person reporting such offenses, upon conviction of the violator, of an amount of one half of the fine assessed, not to exceed \$2,500.

The special agent asked that anyone with information about the golden eagle killed near Muleshoe please call the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge at 946-3341. Or call Cleta Williams at the Journal, 272-4536. The name of the informant will be kept confidential, concluded the special agent.

Royce Clay's Achievements Are Recognized

Halfway through speech competition for the school year, Odessa College's Royce Don Clay, a freshman from Muleshoe, has helped lead the OC forensics team to top honors.

Clay, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Clay of Big Spring, former residents of Muleshoe, is a member of the debate team.

The debate team has placed in the top three awards for all tournaments entered this fall. Honors include a third at North Texas State University, a second at Bethel College in Kansas, a first in competition at Eastern New Mexico University, a fourth in varsity competition at Midwestern University and a fourth at Oklahoma Christian College.

Clay won district and regional interscholastic league competition in debate during all four years in high school in Muleshoe, under leadership of Kerry Moore.

Jubilant members of the Muleshoe Housing Authority finalized all paper work on the agricultural housing a few days ago, and officially accepted the completed project on East Sixth Street in Muleshoe.

Chairman Harmon Elliott late last week commented, "It took a joint effort of farmers, businessmen and city and county officials, all working together, to make this project work."

"Agri-businessmen and farmers played the key role in the early stages of the project by establishing the need for the project," he continued.

"Lonnice Merriott at the Texas Employment Commission spent a lot of time working on the project and the Chamber of Commerce was very helpful."

Elliott said the Housing Authority received high praise from Farmers Home Administration officials and the architects and engineers, Whitaker and Hall of Lubbock, for the diligence of the board members. Elliott said all the housing authority attended the meetings, and that their conduct and approach was beyond reproach during the entire nearly three years of the project.

The first meeting to work toward a housing project for agricultural workers was on March 24, 1976. It was attended by Clinton Kennedy, Max King, Glen Williams, Lonnice Merriott, Houston Hart, Tim Campbell, Loyd Williams, W.H. Lee, Ernest Locker, Royce Turner and Harmon Elliott.

Following the initial meeting the Muleshoe Housing Authority was formed, with Elliott named chairman. The group started visiting area agricultural housing projects, and gaining ideas for such a project in Muleshoe.

Following many meetings, an option on several acres of land was acquired from Lubbock Cotton and Oil. Eventually, the land was purchased and the architects started drawing plans for the project.

Financing was secured through the Farmers Home Administration, with \$810,000 of the one million dollar construction cost being in the form of a federal grant. The \$90,000 loan is to be repaid from income from the housing during the next 30 years.

A total of 48 housing units, from a one bedroom efficiency apartment, to a three bedroom housing unit, have been constructed, and the unit is partially occupied at this time.

Jim Hartline was chosen as manager of the complex, and he and his family reside in one of the units.

When construction started, Tusha Builders of Lubbock had some setbacks, when vandals started breaking windows on the partially completed project.

tein is low but its digestibility will likely also be low. Young stock, like steers and heifers, may not be able to physically eat enough of this hay, even with protein supplementation, to meet their nutritional requirements. Instead, such hay should be fed to dry, mature cows and should be supplemented with a protein source. The six percent crude protein hay will not provide enough nutrition to maintain herself without additional protein.

ject. In time, however, the vandalism ceased, and construction was completed, along with paving. The units are rented on a weekly basis, with the size of the unit, and the renter's income determining the rental price. A small coin-operated washateria has been included to assist persons who reside in the housing unit. With the completion of the agricultural housing at this time, Elliott reminded that sufficient acreage is still available to expand the size of the project in the future, if necessary. Elliott also said the housing authority board will now get into an intensive effort to obtain suitable acreage and a suitable site to construct a senior citizen housing project. He said the members are currently checking potential sites and will be working exclusively on the senior citizen project until it can be completed. The chairman of the Muleshoe Housing Authority said he would like to personally thank all the persons who helped the agricultural housing complex become a reality.

View From The Plains

**COYOTE
FRIEND & VILLAIN**
Traditionally cast as a villain, the coyote stands condemned of killing cattle, sheep, goats, chickens and desirable wildlife. However, studies have shown that the coyote is an effective rodent and rabbit control which helps the landowner harvest and store more food and produce more meat for the table.

The abundance or scarcity of the coyote's natural food such as rabbits, rodents, and other prey determines how frequently a coyote will visit a chicken house or raid a sheep pen. When times are hard, visits by the coyote may be often, but during times of high rabbit or rat populations, the coyote pays his way.

The coyote has been trapped, poisoned, show runner, chased and harassed for many years. While this attempt to eradicate the coyote has failed to reduce his numbers, it has reduced the old, weak, and foolish from his ranks resulting in a swift and cunning animal producing more of their kind while expanding their range nationwide.

The coyote can add another determined hunter to the list of his pursuers as the price of coyote pelts continues to increase in value.

Hunting coyotes with sight dogs or trail dogs has been a sport for years, but the use of a predator call and an accurate rifle is relatively new spanning about the last 20 years.

The expense of handling, feeding and transporting hunting dogs has been a deterrent to the new coyote hunter, while the cost of a predator call is within every hunters reach.

The coyote or predator call has improved over the years with many brands and varieties on the market. The new calls are not necessarily more effective, however.

Early predator hunters used converted duck calls or fashioned their own

reeds to sound like a rabbit in distress.

The experienced predator caller is most successful when an area holding coyotes is found and scouted prior to the first call.

Ideal coyote country can be pastureland, river or creek bottoms, or even weed patches. Since the coyote hunts at night when the rodents are out feeding, it is hard for the predator hunter to find them at night.

Once an area is found, the hunter can pick a hill or mound overlooking a tract of land with cover and place himself along the side of the hill which breaks his outline.

Movement and sound are two things the coyote will notice first. Do not slam vehicle doors, talk, smoke or make quick movements in the potential calling area.

Once you are set up, call for several minutes while watching for movement in the area. Slowly move your head scanning the trees, brush, weeds in front and behind you for a coyote slipping up on the "imaginary" rabbit.

The coyote has an uncanny ability to come long distances directly to your location. Whether you are hunting or photographing the coyote, be prepared before the coyote gets into range.

The sound of coyote howling, his diligent control of destructive rodents, and insects, and the sport and monetary value to the hunter help compensate for the damage he does.

Aside from being useful, the coyote is one of the few remaining symbols of a wild, free, self-reliant breed that is not here on earth because of man but in spite of man.

**PEASANT
POPULATION GOOD**
Texas hunters should find about the same number of ring-necked pheasants during the Dec. 9 - 24 season as last year according to surveys and comments from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel in the Panhandle.

A slight decrease in the number of birds counted on survey lines, could be the results of heavy rains, hail storms, or failure of some hens to nest twice. The daily bag limit of two cock birds will be strictly enforced as will the restric-

tion on pheasant hens. Hunters are reminded to leave the head and feet attached to the pheasant carcass until the bird is delivered to its final destination. The three areas of high pheasant populations including the Hereford - Dimmitt - Friona region; Stratford - Dumas region; and the Plainview - Kress region, are again expecting large numbers of hunters. Many sportsmen are finding good bird hunting in the less publicized areas where grain, wheat and cover are available.

Most successful pheasant hunters bagged one bird during the 1977 season on the first day. Hunters that were successful on the second day or later in the two week season hunted the heavy cover, fence

Christmas Tree Selection Takes Some Planning

Do you have difficulty selecting the right Christmas tree for your den, living room or large picture window in your home? Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers some guidelines to aid you in making that selection.

First of all, select the right sized tree. Christmas trees on the lot generally appear smaller than they actually are.

Look for a tree with a uniform triangular taper. Check to see that it is free of weak, broken or unduly long branches. The tree should have a well filled out appearance. Shake or bump the base firmly on something solid to determine if the needles are firmly attached. If only a few needles drop, the tree is undoubtedly fresh and is more likely to retain its needles throughout the holiday season.

As soon as you get the tree home, saw an inch or two from the butt end to facilitate moisture uptake. This is essential to maintain the fresh appearance of the tree. Then place the cut end into a container of water and store the tree in a cool, shady place until you are ready to bring it indoors. Add water to the container daily to replace that taken up by the tree. A five or six foot tree may use as much as several pints of water a day. The low humidity found in most heated homes increases the difficulty of keeping the foliage fresh. Use a tree stand that allows the base of the tree to remain in water or wet sand when brought into the home.

Locate the tree so that it is not in the air stream of heating vents or near other sources of heat such as a stove, radiator, fireplace or television set. Also, replenish the water in the tree stand frequently.

As part of a safety program, always check the condition of electrical cords and lights before placing them on the tree. Christmas trees are extremely combustible and a short in the wiring can cause a serious fire. And always turn off tree lights when leaving the house or when retiring for the night.
