monly regarded as one of the best paying pursuits in the state. The furs consist mostly of th pelts of muskrats and similar animals.

The bill gave the trappers the right to keep pelts after the season had been closed provided they had been rendered for taxes and marked. Under the old law, trappers were required to dispose of the furs within 10 days after the close of the season. This caused buyers of the pelts to force the prices down, leaving the trappers little opportunity to dispose of their catches at good quotations. The bill gave them the opportunity to hold them as long as they wished so that now they may take advantage of any increase in prices which usually results after the close of the trapping season.
