DIES WHILE READING DAUGHTER'S LETTER

Man Found in Criticial Condition Near Miles and Brought to Bal linger Some Time Ago Dies Near Angelo.

Several weeks ago this paper published the account of the finding of an old man near Miles, who when found was in a critical contion. At that time he could give no account of himself, and it was thought that he had met with foul play. After being under the care of physicians for a few hours he was revived and was able to tell something of himself and his people. A relatives was phoned for and came and accompanied the stranger to San Angelo where was placed in a hospital. Nothing more was heard from him until today when the San Angelo Standard published the following:

While reading a letter from his daughter, William Joseph Hall, age 60 year, dropped dead on the Llano ranch Monday evening. Though he has only been out of the hospital for a short while his condition was not thought to have been serious.

He had waited patiently all day for the coming of the mail and was reading the letter from his daughter eargerly when death came. During the past ten days he has been staying on the ranch with Mr and Mrs. Latto, who are distant relatives.

Mr. Hall came here from Marble Colorado, in search of employment. He has always been a locomotive engineer and was looking for an opening on the roads here

About two months ago, while coming from Ballinger to San Angelo eh was the victim of foul play and was robbed of his suit and over, an adventure which al lised his death at the time

When found he was lying frozen in a pool of water beside the road near Miles and was taken out for dead. He revived, however, and remained in the pospital in this city until he was taken to the Llano ranch about ten days ago.

The body is held for instructions by the Angelo Undertaking parlors. Mr. Hall was an Elk in good standing and the Elks of this city will have charge of all arrangements, which will be announced later. He has a wife and daughter at Marble, Colorado.

There is only three farms on this land, but it is all good land and Mr. Gross will sub-divide it in to small tracks and sell it to farm. ers. The land is all in the Ballinger trade territory and the settling of same means more farmers and a more thickly settled county.
