# Twenty-five Trains of Soldiers in

Glveston, Tex., Feb. 26.-Notwithstanding that the latest reports from Mexico show considerable improvement, the United States is rushing many troops to Texas. Four trains of twelve cars each have arrived here, and twenty-one trains are now en route to this point and to other points along the border. In addition to this a number of compaines of Texas militia have been ordered in to service and are being rushed to Brownsville. A vast army of soldiers are being rushed to a common center, and in case Mr. Wilson desires to call Mexico to time when he goes into office he will have things ready.
