Over \$450,000 is Allocated **By FHA For Area Programs**

Carbon, Eastland County, Texas, 76435

Loan and grant funds totaling more than \$450,000 were approved last week for three rural community water and sewer systems in this area, according to announcement by the U. S. Farmers Home Administration through Congressman Omar Burleson.

Area projects were: City of Moran - \$150,740 for water improvements.

Morton Valley Community of Eastland County - \$98,500 loan and \$81,000 grant for water system construction.

City of Carbon — \$130,000 for a water system Building program. The Congressman said the

Mr. Harrison farms and lives between Desdemona and Gorman where he is active in farming and ranching.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District was created by local landown* ers some 27 years ago. It was created by and for local people to work together in stopping erosion by wind and water and in improving land resources. The program and plan was developed by local people and put into operation by local landowners and operators in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service. All of our natural resources, soil, water, and plant resources were getting away at a rapid rate, and agriculture, as a way of life, was at a low ebb in this area. Solving the problems of water and wind erosion, flood damages, no conservation equipment, poor roads, livestock water needs, farm credit, and other physicial, economic, and social conditions, have resulted in stable soil, increased yields upstream

al budget. Modernizing water and sewer services is an indis-pensable first step toward reviving rural communities and making them more attractive places to live, to work and locate new industry. Benefits of this program are measured not only in terms of rural progress, but in easing the flow of distressed people to the cities."

The rural community facilities programs are carried on through the Farmers Home-Administration, a Department of Agriculture agency, for rural towns of up to 5,500 and areas of the rural countryside. Projects, are developed through Farms Home Administration county offices.




