## 300 TONS OF DYNAMITE EXPLODE

50 Dead and Many Wounded By Terrific Explosion. Pupils In Schools Miles Away Injured.

Baltimore, March 7.—It is believed at least fifty men have been killed and an equal number injured by the explosion of 300 or more tons of dynamite that was being transferred to the steamer Alum Chine in the lower Baltimore harbor this morning.

Many of the victims were members of crews of vessels anchored near the Alum Chine when the dynamite, intended for use in the Panama canal zone, let go.

Scores of vessels hurried to the explosion scene. Floating bodies were drawn from the wreckage and some of the injured were rescued from the debris. Thirty or more badly hurt men were brought to Baltimore hospitals.

The Alum Chine had been here since March 1 and was finishing the loading of a cargo of high explosives for the Panama canal. This morning a lighter with four vessel's side and the task of loading was expected to be finished in a few hours.

### Puff of Smoke Warns.

Nearby were the tug Atlantic and several launches. Suddenly a puff of smoke came from the Alum Chines' hold. One of the crew noticed it and appreciating the imminent danger, by as many men as had time to escape.

Right alongside of the Alum Chine was the launch Jerome into which leaped fourteen of the British boat's crew.

The men on the lighter made every effort to escape. The captain of the tug Atlantic was too far from the dynamite boat to render any assistance and too close to escape its coming down. When the fleeing bunch was 200 feet from the Alum Chine the explosion came.

There was a deafening roar as hundreds of tons of explosives let go. Columns of flames shot out from every portion of the vessel and the air was filled with flying debris. Fragments of machinery and portions of the hull of the boat weighing tons were shot hundreds of feet into the air.

Pieces of iron and steel three feet long and weighing fifty pounds were found three and four miles from the explosion scene.

Flying debris included still unexploded boxes of dynamite and

it is believed that the falling of these on the decks of the Jason and tug Atlantic was responsible for damage and life loss on these vessels.

The superstructure of the naval collier Jason was swept away and her side was riddled by metal fragments hurled from the demolished steamer.

One of the exploded boxes of dynamite, hurling through the air

struck a portion of the upper works of the Jason and exploded. Several men were killed outright and thirty more who were on the collier were frightfully injured.

Another box of dynamite exploded on the deck of the tug Atlantic. The explosion was followed by fire and three men lost their lives there.

The shock was felt as far away as Reading, Pa. 100 miles from Baltimore. It was recorded also at Atlantic City. People at first thought an earthquake had occurred. A school house at Sparrow Point, several miles from the scene of the explosion, was partly destroyed and several children injured. Baltimore itself was shaken as if by a powerful earth trembling. Tall buildings in the center of the city rocked.

### D. REEDER BUYS DRUG STORE

A deal was made Thursday whereby D. Reeder of Ballinger became the owner of the City Drug Store of this place. Elo will be in charge of the store for a few days and will probably locate at a larger place. ITEMS OF INTEREST TO MISSION WORKERS

Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the first president of the provisional republic of China, is a Christian.

He is a product of a missionary school maintained by the church of England in Honolulu. He is the chief organizer of the new republic, having worked for it steadily for twenty years.

The man who did the chief work of framing the tentative constitution for the republic is a Christian and the son of Chinese clergy man of the Church of England Mission. He is a graduate of Yale.

The secretary of the late Board of Foreign Affairs at Peking, W. W. Yen, is a Christian and a churchman. He is the editor of the standard Chinese English Dictionary. He is the secretary of the Chinese Legation at Washington. He is a graduate of St. John's University, Shanghai. The graduates of two great church universities in China, St. John's at Shanghai, and Boone, at Wuchang—are centers of influence.

Mrs. MacDonell, corresponding secretary of the Home Department, says that Ruth Hargrove Institute, Key West, carries the largest enrollment of any school in the Home Department; that Wolff Mission is in better condition than ever before; and that Vashti school, at Thomasville, Ga. is fulfilling its mission of character-building. Forty-four Italians have been brought into the second church, New Orleans, within the last three months. In Galveston our immigrants' Home is superseded by a government institution but Mr. Reifsnider will be retained as a missionary among the immigrants.

The Indian work was passed to the Home Department at the close of the September quarter.

The third annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Council will be held at First church, Birmingham, Ala., April 9-16 1913.

**THREE MEN ARRESTED CHARGE OF BURGLARY ONE MAN CONFESSES.**

Three arrests have been made by Sheriff Futch and Constable W. O. Purell in connection with the burglary of Calvin Jones, house about nine miles northwest of Coleman. The theft is supposed to have occurred Saturday night while Calvin was in Coleman visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Jones. When he returned to his camp Monday morning his household effects were missing, together with all provisions, a quantity of oats and kaffir corn, 100 oat sacks, a 40x40 winchester, a 12-gauge shotgun, in fact everything that had any material value was stolen, the value of the stolen goods approximating \$100. When Calvin discovered the deficit he rode to the nearest telephone, which was at the Gay ranch, and notified the officers. Sheriff Futch and Constable Purell went immediately to the scene to make an investigation and ascertain if possible the guilty parties.

As a result of the officers' investigation a portion of the stolen goods were recovered and three arrests made. The names of the parties arrester are: John Beal, Emery Stovall and Albert Rister, each one being a man of family and living in the neighborhood a few miles from the scene of the burglary. John Beal confessed to the officers and implicated Stovall and Rister, the two latter maintained their innocence of the charge. Rister waived examination and was released on \$750 bond to await action of the grand jury. Stovall was held in jail and had not made bond up to Thursday morning.

### TRUSTEE'S SALE.
