DRY TERRITORY BILL.
 Austin, Texas, March 18.—The bill to regulate shipments of liquor

into local territory was then called up and passed to engrossment, although a measure absolutely prohibiting such shipments was passed a short time ago. Lane, of Tarrent, an anti, offered an amendment providing that before a person could take a package of wet goods from the express office in a local option precinct he should sign for it in the presence of four reputable citizens. This amendment was adopted and the bill was engrossed, some pros voting for the amendment and some against it. The pros seemed puzzled as to how they should vote on the amendment.

SHIELDS CASE ON TRIAL.

KING OF GREECE ASSASSINATED

King George Shot Through The Heart by Man Who Says He is Against Governments.

Saloniki, March 18. — King George of Greece was assassinated while walking in the streets of Saloniki this afternoon. The assassin was a Greek of low mental type, who gave his name as Aleko Schinas. He shot the king through the heart.

The king was accompanied only by an aide de camp, Lieut. Frangoudis. The assassin came suddenly and fired one shot from a seven chamber revolver. The tragedy caused intense excitement. The assassin was overpowered.

The wounded king was lifted in to a carriage and taken to the Papafion hospital. He was still breathing when placed in the carriage.

Prince Nicholas, the king's third son, and other officers hurried to the hospital.

Arriving first, Prince Nicholas summoned the officers, and speaking in a voice choked with sobs said:

"It is my deep grief to have to announce to you the death of our beloved king and invite you to swear fidelity to your new sovereign, King Constantine."

Crown Prince Constantine, who succeed King George is at present at Janina. He is expected to come here with all possible haste.

The assassin of the king is an evil looking fellow, about 40 years old. He refused to explain his motive for the crime. He declared his name was Aleko Schinas, and in reply to an officer who asked him whether he had no pity for his country, announced that he was against governments. Schinas maintained a perfectly impassive demeanor which was suggestive of his being irresponsible for his actions.

Notwithstanding the rapidity with which the king received attention he was dead on arriving at the hospital. Precautions at once were taken throughout the city and perfect order is being maintained.

REBELS AND FEDERALS CLASH TODAY

Mexican General With 400 Regulars Will Give Battle. Conflict Expected Today.

Naco, Arizona, March 18.—Surrounded by nearly 2,000 state troops who are rapidly closing in against Naco, Sonora, Gen. Ojeda today admitted he was in a serious predicament. Intent on preventing a recurrence of the federal victory of last Saturday, Col. Juan Cabral is taking time and pains to hem the small federal garrison here, leaving an only exit over the international border to the north where the troops of the ninth and fifth U. S. cavalry await the expected border battle.

"I am hemmed in and must find some way to cut my way out," Gen. Ojeda admitted. "Despite my former victory I feel humiliated to fight to the last ditch. I have 400 trained soldiers behind

Chicks properly started on a good food are the ones that mature first. Chick Food is the right food for chicks, mixed ready for use, consists of cracked grains, small seeds, grit shells, bones and beef scraps (to take place of bugs and worms.) Directions: Begin feeding Chick Food when the chicks are 48 hours old. It should be scattered in a litter of straw, and the chicks in scratching for their food will get exercise which will keep them in a healthy condition, feed no more than they will eagerly pick up, but every few hours at first, gradually increasing the quantity and not feeding quite so often, until the chicks are old enough to be fed three times a day.



FT. STOCKTON MAN IS MURDERED

Automobile, Hat and Revolver Found But Body is Missing. Had \$500 in Cash.

Alpine, Tex., March 18.—There is every reason to believe that Judge N. Q. Tranquary, of Fort Stockton, was murdered on Thursday, March 6, by an unknown assailant, within five miles of Alpine, as he was on his way to an irrigation dam about 15 miles northeast of town.

Judge Tanquary, who was a well known lawyer, of Denver, had a school land ranch 15 miles south of Fort Stockton, near Tranquary, on the Orient railroad. On Tuesday, March 4, he left home in his motor to visit the ranch of a friend named Murphy, on which a dam was being built under his supervision.

He came to Alpine on Tuesday drew \$500 from the State Bank, with which to pay the workmen on the Murphy ranch. He left Alpine on that day, but when he did not get back to his home on Sunday as he had planned, Mrs. Tranquary became alarmed, and on Wednesday, unable to quiet her fears, she went into Fort Stockton and got Mood Mendel to start to Alpine in his car to make inquiries along the way.

Mendel met a man, who had left the Murphy dam on Tuesday of this week, who said that Judge Tanquary had not been there. Mendel came at once to Alpine to consult with Brame Hillyard, a connection of Tanquary's.

On Friday morning, Mendel, guided by Samuel Harmon, and with a large posse, headed by Deputy Sheriff Phelps, started along the Fort Stockton road. As the motor party returned to Alpine after a fruitless search, they discovered Judge Tanquary's car ditched at some distance from the road, near Measday's poultry ranch, about five miles from town. In it were his hat, his bag and his revolver, with four chambers empty. There was no trace of the man.

The body has not yet been found, but the supposition is that Judge Tanquary was held up at a nearby gate, led off and murdered and that the murderer then returned, drove the car off the road and ditched it. A careful search for the body is being made.

Judge Tanquary was a man about 50 years old and a lawyer of high repute in Denver. He came to Fort Stockton a little over two years ago and took up eight sections of school land near the ranch of his son, Neal Tanquary. He was a man of fine character and of genial manner, very popular and influential in Pecos country, where he was recently a candidate for the office of county judge.

He is survived by his wife, a son, Neal, who lives near Fort Stockton and three daughters, Mrs. Sydney Hillyard, of Halyon, Calif., Miss Ruberta Tanquary and Miss Lillian Clemens Tanquary, of San Luis Obispo, Calif.

CHANGES LOCATION.

STOCK LAW NOW IN EFFECT

Stock Law Now Applies to Three to Three-Fourths of County Com. Precinct Nos. One, Three and Four.

For the benefit of the Banner-Ledger readers, we publish below the law governing the running at large of stock in the commissioners precincts of the county that adopted the stock law. The elections were held in commissioners precincts Nos. 1, 3 and 4, and the law was adopted in all three precincts, and the result declaring same and making the law operative by law, and the stock law is now in full force and effect. Following is the law:

Impounding Stock.
If any stock forbidden to run at large shall enter the enclosed lands, or shall, without being herded, roam about the residence, lots or cultivated lands of any person other than the owner of such stock without his consent, in any county or subdivision in which the provision of this chapter have become operative in the manner provided in the preceding article, the owner, lessee or person in lawful possession of such lands may impound such stock and detain the same until his fees and all damages occasioned by said stock are paid to him.

No animal shall be impounded unless they have entered upon the enclosed lands or be found roaming about the residence, lots or cultivated land of another, and, whenever any stock is impounded, notice thereof shall be given to the owner, if known, and such owner shall be entitled to their possession upon payment of fees and damages.

Fees for Impounding
Any owner, lessee or person in lawful possession of enclosed lands shall be entitled to the following stock, to-wit: 25 cents per day per head for horses and mules, 15 cents per day per head for cattle and 10 cents per head for jacks and jennets. The damages done by such stock, if any fees due to the take-up of stock, if any may be assessed by any three disinterested free holders of the subdivision in which said stock is taken up, who shall upon the application of the taker-up of the stock be appointed by the justice of the peace of the precinct in which such sub-division is situated.

A LETTER FROM CALCUTTA INDIA

Former Ballinger Ladies Write Letter From Far Away India. Tells of Heathenism in Dark India.

Calcutta, India, Feb. 11-13. Editor Ledger:

I am persuading myself to believe that I have friends in and around dear Old Ballinger in West Texas State, who would like to get a few lines from me since I have become a resident of a strange land and among a strange people. This dark land of India, I say dark for it is indeed so, not understanding the fact that it is under English rule and there are such officials on her soil but there are some things civil government cannot or does not do. Some changes it does not make, but it takes the Great God of all to permeate the heart of a nation to give liberty and light.

When I left you Oct. 12, 1912 having been hard at work thru the heat and over the plains of dear Old West Texas, I had lost much flesh and strength as you who knew me best saw plainly. But the great ocean voyage over the mighty Pacific, thru the inland seas of Japan the yellow waters of China sea, the following waters of the southern straits. Thru the Indian ocean and up the sacred waters of the Ganges, where the pilgrims so often bath to be made free from sin and fit for Heaven. All this sailing of 7 weeks and one day, brought back my lost flesh, gave me a ravenous appetite which would only be satisfied I think by good old Southern cornbread and biscuits, the like of which I have not had since leaving my dear mother's home. So I am quite well in body inspite of the intense heat, which we are now beginning to have.

We have had a very pleasant winter since landing on Dec. 8, 1912, but nothing like your West Texas northers which come whistling over the plains, cracking and blowing and freezing, making your clamor for the life, school boys and girls fuss to stand out in the cold. Inmates of every home sit close by the grate. None of this have we had occasion to do, it has been so warm, we have never had a fire to warm by yet. It is now growing so warm until all the boats and trains will be filled with Europeans leaving this great city not to return until October and November after the rains and the last hot month, Sept.

The islands of Japan were beautiful indeed. But first I shall not fail to tell you that after six days sailing from San Francisco, we again found ourselves under Uncle Sam's flag for the last time perhaps for ever. We reached the beautiful Hawaiian islands early in the morning and spent the day there. I wish I might tell you of our visit there, but time and space will not permit. Sailing on, the great old boat landed us in two weeks in Yokohama Japan. By that time having crossed the mighty Pacific, I had decided that there was enough of water in the world, even if there was not much in the plains of West Texas. Not even enough to make the cotton crops yield. Everything was very new, but beautiful in Japan. The little, yet mighty Japs are indeed proud of their country and why not. It is beautiful both in soil and climate and the people are to be loved by all going that way. We visited in the capital city, Tokio. Saw the grounds of the Imperial city, surrounded by the beautiful moat visited the great museum and to our delight our eyes fell on a native animal of the plains of the "Lone Star State". Our means of conveyance were the little "generickshas" pulled by the men. We made some three or four stops in Japan, enjoying all, and especially Kobe, where we saw the beautiful water falls hidden away in the hills near the city. The sailing thru the inland seas was beautiful, indeed, watching from our deck the many little islands with cultivation all over their hills. The saddest things in Japan we saw, was our first real idol "worshippers" ringing the bells to wake up the gods, paying their penance, praying, but in vain to turn away with a sad heart.

We next anchored in China sea for the night, to await our taking a smaller boat to run up the river to Shanghai on the morrow. To our delightful surprise we anchored near two of Uncle Sam's "men

of war." Our own boys, our own stars and stripes, how good they looked to us waving off the stern of those two ships. The next morning we set our feet on China soil. The newly made Republic, the fast history making nation. We spent one day there. Seeing men made veretable beasts of burden. Among the poorer class of the Chinese. We returned to our ship, but the Pilot would not take us out during the night, so we were not moving when we awoke the next morning. But soon in the sea thru the breezes we heard the sound of music, Oh, it was a familiar hymn which goes like this:
My country 'Tis of Thee,
Sweet Land of Liberty
Of thee I sing
Land where my fathers died
Land of the Pilgrims pride
From every mountain side
Let Freedom ring.

It was "our boys" playing the National hymn from the "man of war" nearby. We saw them drilling on deck also. Never before had this hymn such melody to us. We spent eight days in Hong Kong China waiting for our next ship. Here we learned the Chinese better and as we came to know them more the more we cared for their souls. Oh that these heathen nations knew God. Many changes would be made. Freedom of spirit. Liberty of body of soul would be where there is now awful slavery. We came on, stopping at Singapore, a very hot place, later at Penang and tho having enjoyed the voyage very much we were anxious to reach the land of our life's work. Dec. 8 that never to be forgotten sabbath, we set our feet first on the soil of "Dark Dark India." A land of heathenism, with all this means, slavery, sin, superstition, darkness beyond description. Among a people who worship gods but know not Him who can save.

The most deplorable conditions of India are such as child marriage. All girls marry before their twelve or thirteen years old, their fathers marry them to grown men. To be taken and make him a wife. If they bear sons they are respected and (maybe) loved if girl babies, they are hated beaten and often put aside or sent away by cruel husbands. Again child widows, if husbands dies, these little girls can never marry again but are dispised widows for ever. With all that this means in India (you people of America do not know.) They having committed the sin that caused the husbands death. Thus they would kill following husband. In shame and disgrace they are held forever.

Education laws, culture, refinement will not break it down. Only the Great and marvelous power of the Almighty God. It is in His Name we're here to day, giving our lives for this lost people. You who pray, please remember us in your prayers. We have a blessed work of about 125 little Indian widows and small boys. With Indian workers, preachers and bible women. Our work is know as "Hallelujah Village" consisting of Hope school, Homes for workers and missionaries home for six American missionaries now here. May His blessings rest upon this paper and all its readers, with all the staff, is our prayer.
