this winter due to a lack of fall rain. Small grain, of course, like the cool season grass has not yet got its roots down to subsoil moisture.

As a result, overgrazing of rangeland at this time can be extremely hazardous to the conservation of both grass and land. The successful conservation rancher knows that he can never afford to run out of grass. He also knows that he must keep the good grass litter he has on the land on through the winter until next spring to absorb the heavy rain to be expected each spring. Even though there is some subsoil moisture the odds are against enough rain and warm weather before next spring for much grass or small grain growth. Only the forage now on the land is all that can be depended upon.

Examination and clipping tests in this vicinity show that ranges which were deferred or stocked relatively light fast summer still have enough forage on the land to winter some livestock and still keep the cover needed on the Ranges which were overgrazed last spring and summer barely have the cover needed for the protection of the soil. Many spots do not have enough cover to allow moisture penetration when the next rain comes. Continued overstocking of these ranges can only be at the expense of the land and next summers grass

### Several Exams **Are Scheduled** By Civil Service

New examinations have been announced by the U.S. Civil Service Commission for Pharmacist, for filling positions paying from \$4,980 to \$8,330 a year in Veterans Administration offices throughout the country; and for Engineer, for filling positions paying from \$4,-490 to \$12,770 in various Federal agencies in the Washington, D. C. area. Positions in some of the optional fields of engineering will also be filled throughout the United States.

To qualify for the pharmacist positions, applicants must have completed appropriate college study in pharmacy and be currently registered as a pharmacist in one of the States or in the District of Columbia. For positions paying \$5,985 and above, they must also have had professional experience. Applications must be filed in accordance with the in-structions given in civil service

announcement No. 212 B.

To qualify for the engineer positions, applicants must have completed a 4-year college engineering course or have had at least 4 years of professional experience in technical engineering. They may also qualify on the basis of a combination of college study and experience. For positions paying \$5,430 and above, pertinent graduate study or professional level experience in a specialized field of engineering is required. Further information about the requirements and instructions on how to apply are given in civil service announcement No. 211 B.

### Opportunities In Research Exist In Federal Agencies

Opportunities in research in the fields of Chemistry, Mathematics, Metallurgy, and Physics now exist in various Federal agencies in the Washington, D. C., area, the United States Civil Service Commission has announced. The salaries range from \$4,490 to \$12,770

a year. To qualify, applicants must have completed appropriate college study leading to a bachelor's degree. In addition, for positions paying \$5,430 and above, graduate study or professional experience is required. College graduates may also qualify for positions paying a beginning salary of \$5,-430 a year if they have a superior scholastic record or through pass-

ing an appropriate written test. Further information regarding these positions is contained in Announcements 209B and 210B. The announcements and application forms may be obtained at the Cisco Post Office, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications will be accepted by the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, National Bureau of Standards, Washington 25, D. C., until further notice.

### **Completion Work** Is Underway In Lake Oil Project

Completion work was continuing Saturday in the G. A. Bloomquist No. 1 Schlaepfer, Lake Sand oil prospect for the Lake Cisco area, according to information here. Swabbing operations were in progress following perforations and treatment of the production

It was expected to be several days before the well is completed and ready for a potential test. Lake Sand oil showed in good quantity in a drill stem test from

3,417-50 feet last week. Elsewhere, the W. M. Jarrell No. 1 Henry Exall et al, wildcat Ellenberger test six miles northwest of Cisco, was drilling below 3,800 feet Saturday in a 4,000 foot test. Drill stem tests were run Friday night, but results were

not available. Five miles southwest of Cisco, the Jimmie Keil et al No. 1 Cozart was drilling at about 3,400 feet. Tests have been run in the Caddo and Lake Sand formations. Results were not announced. This well is a western outpost location in the Jo Keil Pool.

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

#### **Vets Questions And Answers**

Q - Is there a grace period for late payments of installments on GI loans?

- No. Veterans should make their GI loan payments on or before the date they are due. An extra charge may be made by GI lenders when payments are received late.

Q - A neighbor of ours, the widow of a war veteran who died of a service-connected cause, has a 15-year old son who has a physical impairment. Would this boy have to wait until age 18 to start training under the War Orphans Education program?

A - No. Recent changes in the law now make it possible for physically handicapped children who are otherwise eligible to begin special types of War Orphans training when they reach age 14.

Q - I have a disability I believe is traceable to my service in the Armed Forces. Is there any deadline for filing a claim for disability compensation with VA?

A - There is no deadline. You may apply any time. However, if you apply within a year from




service, payments may be backdated to your first day as a civilian. If you apply after a year, you may be paid only from the date your application was filed.



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
