It situated almost at the limits of the Torrid Zone and within a degree of the Tropic of Cancer General ly speaking there are three seasons (strictly speaking, six) namely: The hot season, lasting from the middle of March to the setting in of the rains in June; the rainy season, beginning about the middle of June and lasting till the end of September; and the cold season from November to the early part of March.




