NO MORE EXPRESS LIQUOR SHIPMENTS

Dry Territory to be Cut Off From Booze After July

Following is the text of the Allison liquor shipping bill passed by the last legislature and which becomes a law on July 31.

Section 1. Except as otherwise provided in this act. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, or any officer, agent or employe thereof to deliver to any other person, firm, or corporation, or any officer, agent or employe thereof any intoxicating liquor for shipment, transportation carriage or delivery from any point within this state to any other point within this state.

Section 2. Except as otherwise provided in this act, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, or any officer, agent or employe thereof to receive from any other person, firm or corporation, or any agent or em ploye thereof, any intoxicating liquor for shipment, transportation, carriage or delivery to any other point within this state.

Section 3. Except as otherwise or employe thereof, to ship, trans- parts, if any, so held to be invalid port, carry or delivery any in- unless the entire act shall be held toxicating liquor from any point invalid. within this state to any other person, firm or corporation thereof, within this state.

Section 4. Nothing in this act shall be construed as relating to interstate shipment and transpor-Tonight and Sunday increasing tation of intoxicating liquors, or to the delivery of same to any perment or transportation.

> Section 5. Nothing in this act carry or deliver intoxicating li- piness that married life contains. quors to any person within the limits of the county or subdivision thereof within which such dealer is licensed or authorized under the laws of this state to pursue such business.

Section 6. Nothing in this act shall make it unlawful for any person to the use of himself or the members of his family residing with him to personally carry intoxicating liquors from any point within this state to any other point wiihin this state.

Section 7. Nothing in this act shall make it unlawful for any person authorized or licensed under the laws of this state to sell spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, from shipping or delivering intoxicating liquors to any other person within this state licensed under the laws of this state to sell spirituous, vinous or malt liquors.

Section 10. Any corporation which shall violate any of the provisions .; this act shall for each such violation forfeit and pay the sum of \$500 which may be recovered by any individual in the name of the state of Texas, in any court of competent jurisdiction in this state, but no compensation shall be allowed such citizen, and he may be required to give security for costs and it shall be the duty of the county attorney or district attorney to prosecute for the recovery of the same.

Section 11. All laws and part of laws in conflict with this act are hereby expressly repealed.

Chicago, April 18.—Inhuman conditions at "baby farms" in Chicago were revealed today in the Illionis House committee's investigation of maternity homes and other institutions where children are kept. They were such as to bring from Chairman Thomas Curran the assertion that the barter of flesh has not ceased and that dealing in babies is "the most dastardly business existing."


