BALLINGER LADIES WRITE FROM INDIA

**Missionaries in Foreign Field
Write Interestingly of Hindoo
Religion. Thankful for
News and Offerings
From Friends.**

Bally Gunge Calcutta, India, April 9.—To friends in Ballinger and especially to those who have sent offerings to us thro the church. Greetings from "Dark India".

First inspite of the intense heat which makes it very hard for many in India at this time. We are keeping very well, and tho we suffer very much from the heat, we believe that this extreme southern Texas blood will stand the test. So for this reason, besides many others we are not sorry that we are natives of the "Lone Star State."

Most all Europeans, business men with families, also missionaries leave the great city of Calcutta during these months, the former go mostly to England and other Northern countries, while many of the missionaries go to the hills of India.

Last month we wrote you something of the population of India and especially did we mention some of the beautiful things of this city, and now we wish to tell you something of the late puga (worship) the annual festival of Krishna, which has just recently been on. If one does not know the time of the year this festival occurs they may find out by every man who does this worship, being painted red, both body or head and clothes.

The Hindoos believe in a triad or three grand divisions among the gods. The first is Brahm the god of creation, the second Vishnu the god of preservation, the third Siva, the god of destruction. Each one of these has a great number of incarnation and wives with their incarnations. So that in Hindoo mythology, the gods are represented as going to war, practicing polygamy and becoming intoxicated. Vishnu and Siva are both spoken of as lying, stealing adultery, an devery other sin committed by man.

Krishna is the 8th incarnation of Vishnu. It is said that Kansa of Muttra was a great enemy to Cows and Brahms. Concerning this the gods sought the assistance of Vishnu, who listening to their request, plucked of two hairs from his head, which he said would assume incarnations and destroy Kansa. The white hair became Balarama, the black one Krishna. His childhood was

Before his body was shipped, Mrs. Morgan died and the two bodies were shipped together.

And took by force the herdsman's wife. He is said to have had eight queens and sixteen thousand wives. His history is full of accounts of evil and sensuality, and is often spoken of as the profligate god. The annual festival of Krishna is so vile and degrading that in many parts it is impossible for ladies to appear on the streets without being insulted. Some of the most disgusting and filthy circumstances take place in the temples dedicated to his honor. It is said whoever sits in the holy shrine, the place where Krishna pursued his sports, are liberated from all sin. To these temples are dedicated innocent babes, little girls who become the dancing girls of the temple. They are bred to this life of profligacy, from their infancy. Are taken from many castes and are often of respectful birth. This is often the result of vows made by the mother before the child's birth. This infamous life to which the daughter is destined, brings no disgrace on the family, for all is done in the name of religion. Just think of licensed sin and profligacy sanctioned by Hindoo religion. All this and much more that cannot be mentioned, is done in honor of Krishna who is also preached in certain cities of America, to large companies as the true Savior.

We read with delight and interest "The Ledger" when thro the kindness of father and mother Mangum it reaches us, having completed its long journey across the seas and come to our mission home in this dark land.

We are trying to diligently apply ourselves to the study of the language, so that we may be used of the "Dear Lord" to bless this people.

ARE WE IN A DRY DISTRICT

**Liquor Shipping Laws Leave
Doubt as to Real Meaning.
Express Agents Notified
Not to Deliver
Booze.**

When the last legislature passed the Allison bill which prohibits the shipping of liquor from a wet into a dry county in Texas, the bill was so framed as not to prohibit the interstate shipment of liquor. In other words it was the general opinion that a man in Ballinger could order his booze from Kansas City, or any point outside of Texas, and he would receive it, but he could not order booze from San Angelo, or any other place in Texas.

The question has since been raised as to the real meaning of the Webb law, which was passed by the National congress and which prohibits the shipping of booze from a wet state into a dry state, territory, or district. It is claimed tha the term district applies to the District of Columbia, while others claim that the district as specified in the bill means a dry county, or subdivision of a county, or any dry district of any county. Leading attorneys all over the United States are debating this question, some taking one view and some another, and until the matter can be settled the express companies will take no chances and have notified all agents not to receive or deliver booze in dry towns, and they are instructed to return all booze shipped to the shipper, collect.

This will apply to Ballinger, and Express Agent Stokes will comply with the law as directed by his company and after July 1st no more booze will pass through the local office, until the question is thrashed out in the court and

Following is the Law:
"The shipment or transportation, in any manner or by any means whatsoever, of any spirituous, vinous, malted, or other intoxicating liquors of any kind, from one State, territory or District of the United States, or place non-contiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, into any other State, territory or district of the United States, or place non-contiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, or from any foreign country into any State, territory or district of the United States, or place non-contiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, which said spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor is intended, by any person interested therein, to be received, possessed, sold, or in any manner used, either in the original package or otherwise, in violation of any law of such State, territory, or district of the United States, or place non-contiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, is hereby prohibited."

"If there is any good reason why 1913 should not be a good year for the people of this county we do not know of it.
