HUERTA WILL BE EXECUTED

Law Known as Maximilian Will
be Enforced Against
Him.

Eagle Pass, Tex., May 16.—Dr. Francisco Vasquez Gomez concluded his conference with Governor Carranza this morning and left immediately for San Antonio. The governor declined to give any information as to the result of the meeting.

Gov. Carranza has issued a decree declaring that the law of January 23, 1862, popularly known as the law of Maximilian, will be enforced against Huerta and his associates when they are captured. This is the law enacted under President Juarez, as an answer to a decree of Emperor Maximilian, which provides that any person making any attempt on the life of the chief magistrate of the republic or any of his ministers, engaging in a seditious uprising against the legal authorities or inviting the invasion of foreign troops, shall suffer the penalty of death. Under this law Maximilian was executed.

MILES MEN BUY OUT OWL DRUG STORE AT ANGELO

A change in the management of the Owl Drug Store, 114 South Chadbourn, was completed this week, when R. D. Holmes and R. R. Holmes, brothers of Miles, bought out M. J. McDonald. The new owners say they expect to make a number of improvements and to enlarge the force. Another prescription clerk will be employed, making two instead of one.—San Angelo Standard.

WEST TEXAS BOY IS WINNING BIG HONORS

New York, May 16.—The State of Texas will probably get back on the athletic map this summer thru the medium of Gwyn Henry, the former 100-yard national champion. Henry, who is at present living in Oklahoma, has read of the great running done by Howard P. Drew, the colored boy, who wears the colors of the Springfield high school, and he wants to meet Drew at the 100-meter distance. Henry has written a local athletic enthusiast to this effect, and further that he intends to come East this summer in hopes of meeting Drew in a special match race.

Henry's letter reads: "I see that Howard Drew is the whole show in the sprint events down East. Well, I'd like to take a crack at him, and if I can but hold my present form I am confident that I can show Drew the way in a sprint race. Personally I'd like to make the distance 100-meters, as I think that 110 yards is my best distance. A New York club has promised to make an effort to arrange a three-cornered race between Alvah Meyer, Drew and myself some time in June, and if the others are willing to run I'll come to New York ready to run the race of my life." Henry inclosed clippings crediting him with doing 9 4-5 seconds for 100 yards twice on the track of the Oklahoma Baptist College.

Ballinger athletics will remember Gwyn Henry as he has been in our city several times and also attended the Howard Payne college at Brownwood a number of years.

MOB VIOLENCE IN FORT WORTH

Citizens Storm Jail in Effort to
Get Negro Who Shot
Policeman.

Fort Worth, Tex., May 16.—State troops are still on guard at the Tarrant county jail and will remain at their posts through the day to prevent any re-occurrence of Thursday night's rioting. Property damage was not estimated. However, it will run into thousands of dollars. Practically every building on East ninth street occupied by negroes or frequented by negroes, has been wrecked. Big bontires, made up of fine liquors, etc., were started this morning after midnight. Hard fighting by owners of buildings prevented the spread of these fires.

Judge Swaine of the seventh district court has ordered his grand jury to indict Tom Lee, negro, who slew Policeman Ogletree and Walter Moore, wounded three others and then shot himself yesterday.

The whereabouts of Lee is still a mystery. Officers claim that he was spirited away to Weatherford in an automobile last night the mob surrounded the jail. The mob leaders deny this, claiming he is still in the jail here.

Sheriff Rea, who was injured last night by a brick hurled by the mob is better today and issued a warning to the public to stay away from the county jail.

COURT ADJOURNED.

The commissioners' court who had been in session in Ballinger since last Monday in their regular May term, adjourned at noon Saturday and the commissioners returned to their respective homes. The court will convene here second Monday in June in called session to pass on unfinished business and such other new business that may come before them.

Ewing, as president of the Parent-teachers Association against Mayor Campbell for his refusal to place women on the school board, this organization has split wide open. When the body met to elect officers a majority disapproved of Mrs. Ewing's course and named Mrs. George Heyer to succeed her. The Ewing faction then bolted and perfected an organization of their own known as the United Mothers' club. Women of the city prominent in public affairs, and indirectly in the fight for the ballot are now at war, feeling is intense between the factions and further lively developments are expected.

The Progressive Farmer.

Women, after all, are the chief molders of civilization. It is the man's place to supply its material basis, but its finest flowering is the product of women's activities. Rural civilization has lagged largely because farm women, of all classes, have had least opportunity for united effort least organization and co-operation—and alas! too often, least education.

Saddest of all is the fact that the educated woman in the country, finding conditions in the community unattractive, has too often run away from them to town instead of setting out to improve them, has run away from her God-given opportunity for service. Now, of course, one woman cannot, single-handed, remake a community, but there are thousands and thousands of neighborhoods (perhaps the very one in which you live,) in which one earnest, consecrated, tactful woman could rally her sisters to her and with their aid literally revolutionize community life.

For one thing, be sure the woman's club would help get larger and better schools, for if there is anything a mother is interested in, it is the education of her children. Then, too, the club would doubtless work out the idea of having the school become a social center—a place for neighborhood gatherings, lectures, debates (a debating club is a great help to any neighborhood,) entertainments, special meetings, to discuss local shows for exhibits of farm crops, woman's work, the boys' corn exhibits, the girls' canning work, etc., etc. You may be sure, too, that the women would work for better roads and rural telephones and county fairs and a better public health service and school libraries and reading rooms and a score of other needed improvements that your community

may go without for another generation, if we depend on men alone to do the job.

Men and women were meant to do team work—side by side, pulling together. Men's organizations can do a great deal alone, but they can do four times more if the power of women's organizations is added to theirs.
