Our friends in the malaria district of Texas are sweltering under that depressing atmosphere that makes a man feel that he is down and out and that life for some cause is robbed of its fancies while in this country the pure cool breezes are wafting a song of health and prosperity. The weather here is all that one could wish for, and those that are not satisfied should spend a few days in the low lands of Texas and get a sample that would make them appreciate our climate.

The howl of the high cost of living is nothing but pessimism, and is uncalled for. **A GOOD LAW.**

A recent law passed by the legis-

lature of Colorado provides for a state wide automobile license tax. Visitors touring the state are however allowed to travel for ninety days without the necessity of securing a license. One of the principal benefits to be derived by the visitors under this law is the fact that they will be allowed to use their car in Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo and other cities without having to secure a separate license in each place.

The revenue derived from this state tax will be used for the improvement of Colorado roads. One half of the tax goes to the counties in which the cars thus taxed are owned, while the other half revert to the state road fund.
